DUMP OPENING DELAYED

EAGLE RIVER: The opening of the new Sanitary Fill (dump) will be de-layed, according to John Grasse, contractor for the Fill.

Grasse blamed the delay on the lack of sufficient funds to complete the road into the dump. He said the funds which were to be made available by the Division of Lands, were not cash, but in the form of land scrip, with a total face value of \$990.

In order to converte this into cash, a buyer must be found, and sale of land scrip is usually discounted, in this case the amount that could probably be realized from the sale of the scrip would be around \$800, Grassee said.

He added that this would not be enough to complete a passable road, He said that the State is trying to come up with additional funds in or-der that he might be able to complete the road.



FORT RICHARDSON, ALA-SKA — Young men who enlist in the Army for the first time from the State of Alaska can now be guaranteed assignment to their choice of overseas commands (Europe or Far East), thanks to a recent decision by the Department of the Army. The option to select an over-

The option to select an overseas assignment at the time of enlistment was formerly available to non-prior service enlistees living in the south 48, and did not extend to those in Alaska.

Under the new system, Alaskan youths who long to travel need only report to the nearest U. S. Army Recruiting Station, pass the Army entrance tests, state their choice of foreign assignments, and be on their way.

DUMP OPENING DELAYED


