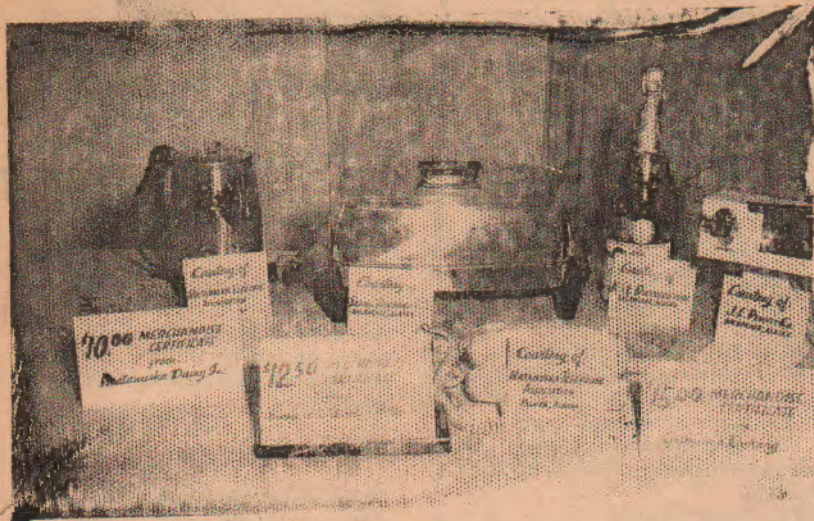

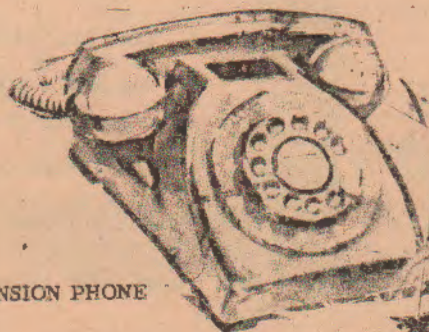

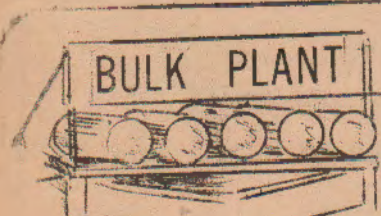

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SPORTS REVIEW

The Chugiak Mustangs played two games against the Wasilla Warriors.

In the first game at Wasilla High School, both games would have been a bit closer if sanctioned referees had been available.

In the Varsity game, Wasilla, with its rebounding and shooting power, took a 46-33 halftime lead. Finally at the end of the fourth quarter, had stretched their lead to 89-63. High scorers for Chugiak were Lester Stephens with 25, James Smith with 12 and Alan Phillips with 11.

The Junior Varsity game was lost due to poor referees and poor score-keeping (on the part of the official scorekeeper from Wasilla). The JayVee Mustangs trailed 27-31 at alltime, came within striking distance many times, but still lost 9-56. High scoring members from Chugiak were Steve Brooks with 5, Dan Bust, Howard Ness, Ted Baker and Harveny Pullen all with 5 and Bob Mielke with 5.

The Varsity game at Chugiak was a different occasion, however. The quarterly scores were (all in favor of Wasilla) 9-18, 22-27 and 31-40, and on several occasions the Mustangs came considerably close to surpassing the Warriors. But still the end score was 45-61.

Again it was the Junior Varsity that provided the most excitement.

The JV Mustangs led 15-17 at the end of the first quarter, and at several occasions extended their lead as far as 11 points. But as the game went on, the Warriors caught up, and so the score at the end of the fourth quarter was 38-38. This meant that the Mustangs and the Warriors would go into a 3 minute overtime. Finally the Warriors pulled through to a 38-43 victory. High scorers for the Mustangs were Ted Baker with 12, Dan Bust with 7 and Dan Werre and Bob Mielke both with 6. GOOSE BAY HOMESTEADER GETS STIFF FINE

ANCHORAGE:

A thousand-dollar fine for making false statements on his homestead final proof form was imposed on Joe F. Kelly in federal court in Anchorage last week by Judge Raymond E. Plummer.

Kelly had stated under oath in the final proof filed in the Anchorage Land Office on June 19, 1961, that he had resided on his homestead claim at Goose Bay. The trial revealed that he had moved to the homestead but had continued to live in Anchorage during the period in question. His homestead entry was filed on Nov. 15, 1958.

The making of false statements on a government document is considered a crime under Section 1001 of Title 18 of the United States Code. It is punishable by up to 10 years in jail or up to a \$10,000 fine or both.

This is the charge under which Kelly was tried, and the federal court jury found him guilty. As a result of this conviction, the homestead entry is being canceled by the bureau of land management, according to James W. Scott, manager of the Anchorage district and land office.

ISSUE OF CENTENNIAL
STAMP AT SITKA**

JUNEAU: Governor William A. Egan has written Postmaster General John A. Gronouski requesting that the first day issue of an Alaskan centennial postage stamp be scheduled at Sitka on October 18, 1967. It was at Sitka on October 18, 1867 that the formal transfer of Alaska from Czarist Russia to the United States took place.

"It has come to my attention that the United States Post Office is expected to issue a postage stamp in the Alaskan centennial year of 1967, commemorating the purchase of Alaska from Russia," Governor Egan wrote Gronouski.

"Since Sitka, Alaska, was the site of the transfer and since Sitka was the first capital of the former District and Territory of Alaska, it would be most appropriate that the first day issue of this important stamp be October 18, 1967, at Sitka, Alaska."

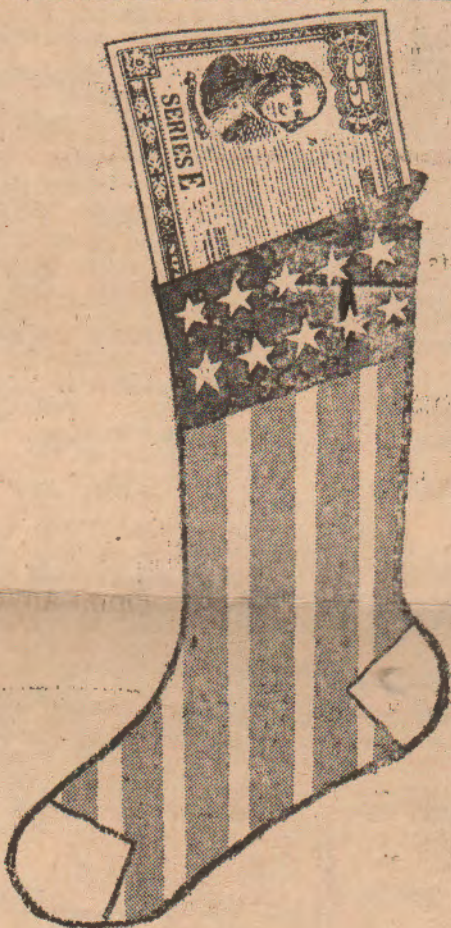
