Some 570 persons were killed - not to mention the injured suffering aud financial loss.

Last year, automobile accidents took the lives of some five people each hour for a total of something like 42,000 deaths. No wonder our automobile insurance rates are so high. Let's all drive carefully, and expecially so when we pass through our school zones.

I imagine there are mixed emotions concerning the abbreviated school holiday; parents glad to have the kiddies out of the way part of the day, and the kids wishing they could stay away from classes a little longer. I sometimes feel it is a little tragic that we learn to appreciate an education only after we are far removed from the formal process and opportunity of acquiring one.

Christmas was pleasant, happy and gay, expecially for the children. The friendliness and warmth of the people of this are are almost unique. But one sour note occurred in the form of a person, or personstaking ornaments from the lovely little tree placed in the Chuglak Post Office. I feel such action comes under no other heading than that of stealing, and although I don't know that it could be considered a Federal crime, it is certainly a moral offense.

MEASLES CAN LEAD TO COMPLICATIONS

WASHINGTON:

The November-December issue of World-Wide Abstracts of General Medicine reports that one child in 15 suffers a potentially serious complication as a result of common measles. This figure was arrived at by examining records of more than 53 thousand English children who contacted the disease in the 1963 English epidemic. Some 3,500 had complications, 12 of whom died.

One child in 1,000 suffered encephalitis or "impaired conssciousness" as a complication. Thirty-eight in 1,000 developed pneumonia or bronchitis and 25 in 1,000 middle-ear infection. Three in each 1,000 developed neurological disturbances short of encephalitis or "impaired consciousness."

DON'T FORGET CHILD LABOR REGULATION

MINEAU:

"Now, when many teen-agers are seeking holiday work, employers and teen-agers alike should be aware that the Alas-ka child labor law has some restrictions placed upon the employment of minors." Gil Johnson, commissioner of the department of labor, issued this word of caution in view of the many school students who will

seek holiday jobs this year. Federal and state child labor laws prohibit certain hazardous or undesirable jobs and also dictate the number of work hours permitted in addition to legal working hours. Minors under 16, for example, may not (child labor)

be employed between the hours of 7 p.m. and 6 a.m. and not over 23 hours a week, with few exceptions; and children under 14 are not to be employed in most occupations.

There are prohibited occupations that tend to threaten the health, morals, education and future welfare of minors during their formative years, for example: mining work handling explosives, the operation of various machinery, certain phases of logging operations, construction work, electrical jobs and others.

Johnson advised employer to get and keep evidence that the minor is of legal age for the given job. "If either employer or teen-ager is in doubt about any job under the child labor law, check with your nearest office of the state employment service or the depart-ment of labor, Juneau," Johnson said.
