ROAD RE-AIGNMENT PLANS UNCHANGED BY QUAKE

ANCHORAGE: Plans to re-align the Glenn Highway along the "A" and "D" routes should not be affected by the recent earthquake, according to Floyd Grant, acting District Highway Engineer for the Anchorage District.

Grant said that the proposed routes would be inspected to see if any major faults had occurred that might make present plans inaccurate, but he believed that there would be no delay in the scheduled re-alignment.

He said that Federal Aid primary and secondary road projects would proceed unaffected by the recent disaster and funds allocated for them would not be diverted to make repairs to damaged areas.

FIRE DESTROYS TRAILER HOME

EAGLE RIVER: A trailer and lean-to, belonging to the Lonnie Ryan family of Eagle River was completely destroyed by fire Monday night.

The blaze, which apparently had been caused by a defective stovepipe broke out at approximately 1:30 am.

Ryan, his wife and their seven children escaped injury, but were not able to save any of their belongings.

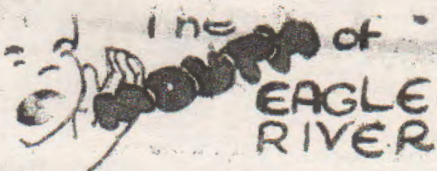

GRADE 7B: This week we had a movie. It was on Petroleum. We also had a movie on Dinosaurs.

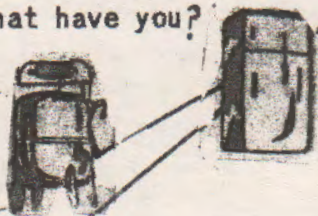

TAX BREAK FOR QUAKE LOSSES

PALMER: If you sustained a loss due to the Good Friday earthquake, you may claim such losses on either your 1963 or 1964 income tax returns, according to economist Dale Saunders of the Alaska Agricultural Experiment Station.

The income tax law provides that where a loss results from a disaster in an area subsequently determined by the President of the United States to warrant assistance by the Federal Government, you may elect to deduct that loss on your return for the year just closed.

The due date for your return is the regular due date; the period during which the disaster must have occurred does not include any extension of time for the filing of the return, Saunders said. If you use the calendar year and you had a disaster

School will not be resumed until water service can be restored to the school. Efforts to repair the plumbing damaged by the earthquake had resulted in the dropping of an undetermined amount of pipe into the well.

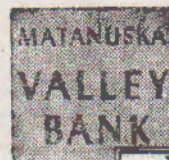

The bill being considered also provides that the legislature would determine the use to which the tax monies thus raised would be used.

As a result of the Assemblies consideration of the proposed bill, they went on record as being in favor of such permissive legislation with the stipulation that amendments be made to provide for the repeal of any existing personal property taxes without a referendum and that the local government and not the legislature would determine for what purposes the taxes collected would be used.

Don Fridley, assistant superintendent of schools, appeared before the assembly to point out the fact that approximately 25% of the tax base of the borough has wiped out by the earthquake and that funds to meet the schools budget must be forth-

coming to make up the loss suffered to the tax base.

As yet no one knows what Federal Aid can be obtained to meet the minimum requirements of private individuals, businessmen, city utilities or schools of areas affected.

The permissive legislation being considered would be used to provide a new tax source in the event that Federal or other fund source are not made available sufficient to meet the minimum financial requirements of the local governments. It was believed that to meet the school budget required an equivalent of a 4 to 5 mil tax increase on the remaining real and personal property tax base would be required.

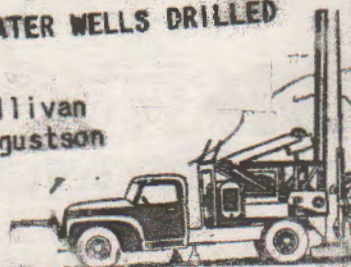
