

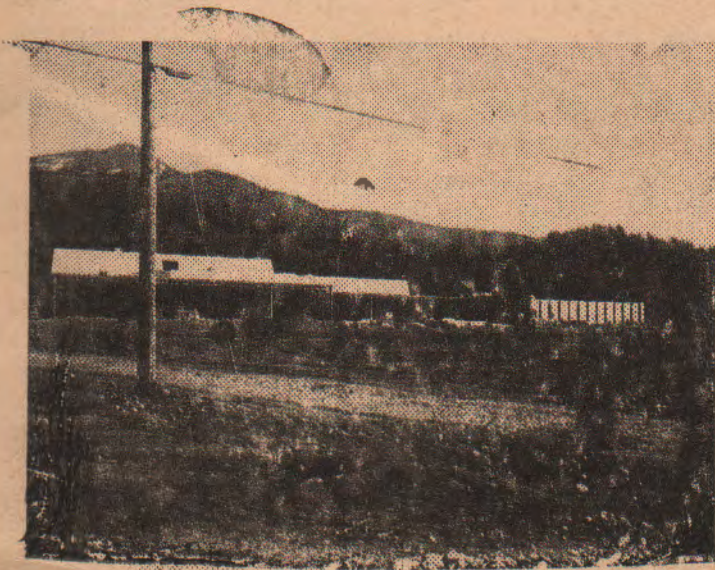

BRIGGS SAYS TO DISREGARD TAX NOTICES

ANGELS TOP TEAM SO FAR!

CHUGIAK: The Eagle River Angels continued their winning streak by downing opponents Wednesday, Friday and Monday to lead the Knik Little League with a 4-0 win-loss record.

In Wednesday night's action, the Angels defeated Team No. 4 (which has now chosen the name Chugiak Panthers for their team) in action at Eagle River.

The Yankees downed the Eagles 7 to 5 in their game at Chugiak.

The half-way point in the first round was completed Friday night with the Angels walloping the Eagles at Eagle River and the Yankees outlasting the Panthers 23-17 in a game which darkness threatened to end at Chugiak.

FIRE COMPANY BOOTH SET UP AT CHUGIAK POST OFFICE

CHUGIAK: Members of the Birchwood Loopers Homemakers Club are manning a collection booth at the Chugiak Post Office for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company.

The Loopers will be at the booth every day until the July 1st deadline in a last ditch attempt to help the Fire Company raise the \$3,000 which they have set as the amount needed to continue to function for the coming year.

The membership fee is \$10 per year per family, which the Loopers point out is less than 3¢ per day for Fire Protection.

At present approximately 30% of the amount

CHUGIAK: Glenn Briggs, Borough Assemblyman from Section one has advised anyone in the area receiving a form for personal property tax to disregard it for the time being.

Briggs has re-affirmed his stand of opposition to the payment of personal property tax by residents of this area during the interim period from July 1st to October 31st.

Briggs said that all indication is that when presented with the opportunity of choosing between a sales tax or personal property tax at the October referendum, the voters of the area appear to be overwhelmingly in favor of the sales tax.

Briggs therefore feels it would be unwise to establish the precedent of levying a personal property tax against local residents even for that short a period.

However, Briggs has asked that this not be interpreted as an attempt on the part of the residents of this area to avoid the payment of their fair share of the taxes needed to make up the difference between the amount to be provided by the state of Alaska and that needed to meet the budget for the area schools as set forth by the Borough School Board.

Instead, Briggs offers the following solution; instead of a 9 mill tax rate on real property tax, Briggs suggests instead a 10 mill rate, the ad-

BOROUGH ASSEMBLY REPORT

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Area Borough Assembly met in special session Monday June 15, primarily to consider and act on the school budgets of the Anchorage Independent School District, the Greater Chugiak Area and Girdwood for the year 1964-65.

Assistant Superintendent Don Fridley and Borough School Board President Frank Reed appeared to summarize and present justification for budgeted items (next col)

Reed and Fridley prefaced formal presentations of the budgets of the AISD and Greater Chugiak school systems with a note of urgency that both be approved at that meeting with full knowledge that the millage rate on which they were based could possibly be reduced when final determination of the extent of special quake Federal fund for schools is known. 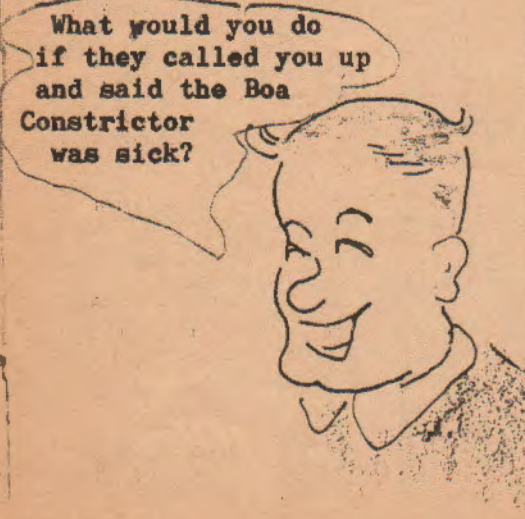
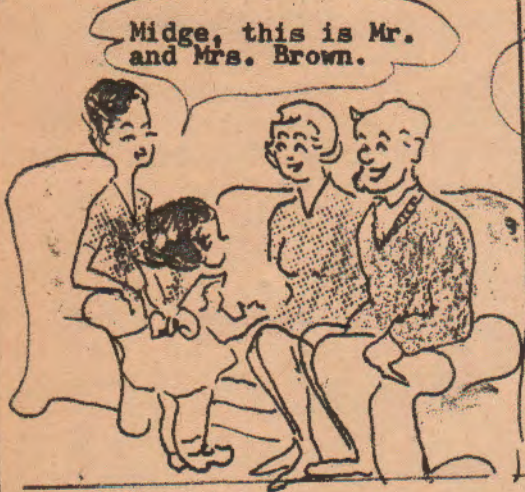

SON OF LOCAL RESIDENT SURVIVES ATTACK BY BEAR

ANCHORAGE: Jack Lee, (son of F.S. Lee of Swanee Slopes) well known Big Game guide and bush pilot, has completely recovered from an attack by a brown bear last month.

Lee had flown a client from Tuscon Arizona to an area near Cold Bay on the Alaska Peninsular.

Lee and his hunter were stalking a bear, when Lee decided to move to another position after telling his hunter to remain stationary.

Unknown to Lee, the bear had also moved, and he was not aware that the hunter had become the hunted until the huge animal charged him.

Lee was able to fire two shots at the bear, one striking him in the chest and the other in a front leg breaking it.

The wounded animal then attacked Lee, knocking him down and biting him in the face. Lee said in an exclusive interview to the Knik Arm Courier, that he believes that the fact that the bear had a broken leg had saved his life. The animal was unable to stand on one front leg and claw him with the

other. Lee was able to thrust his arm down the bear's throat causing the beast to gag and retreat. However, when Lee attempted to move, the animal attacked him a second time biting his severely in the legs. By this time the hunter had heard Lees cries for help and arrived. He fired at the bear and the animal, now badly wounded vanished into the brush.

With the assistance of his hunter Lee returned to his airplane where he radioed for help.

Lee was returned to Anchorage where he was treated by Dr. Marcell Jackson. Lee had been badly bitten in the face and legs and had had his abdomen ripped open where the bear had raked him with the claws of his uninjured leg.

Despite being severely mauled, Lee was not hospitalized and although the incident occurred on May 10th, less than a month later he is back flying with no visible scars.

When asked whether he believes the bear might still be alive, Lee said he doubted it, the animal had been gravely wounded.

Lee is a former local resident having at one time lived at the old Eklutna Hydroplant housing.

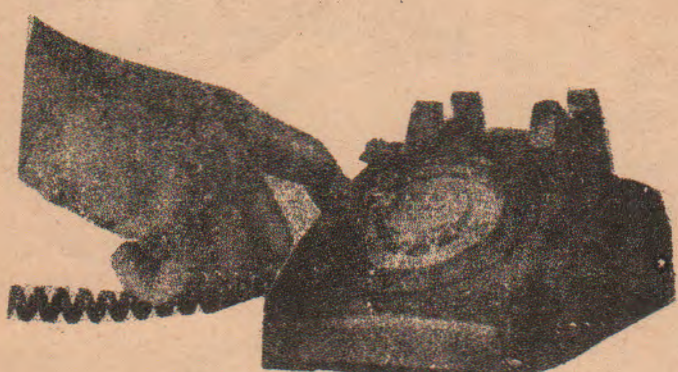

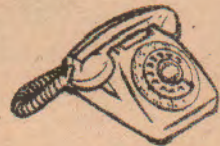

 the AISD budget with the assurance from the school administration that a final recommended budget would be presented to the assembly for review after the present unknown factors are resolved, and before the final mill rate required to support the budget is determined.

The mill rate on real and personal property of the AISD to support the \$5,102,250.00 local-source revenues requires a 1 1/2 mill levy unless additional Federal funds become available.

For the transition from State to Borough the State and Federal governments will provide \$679,055.00 of the total budget of \$748,355.00 required for the operation of the Chugiak and Eagle River Schools for the school year 1964-65.

The \$69,300.00 deficit between State support and budget requirements is to be made up by taxes from the Greater Chugiak Area largely to bring the salaries of administrators, teachers and operating personnel up to the standards of AISD.

Real and Personal property evaluation of the Greater Chugiak Area has been established at \$11,000,000.00; real property at \$7,000,000.00 and personal property estimated at \$700,000.00 which for tax purposes has been given 70% evaluation of the above figures. This at a nine mill tax rate provides the required additional \$69,300.00.

The budget as recommended by the Borough School administration was approved by the Assembly.

Girdwood will continue (next col.)

(borough)

to operate as a city school supported entirely by its local taxation until such time as the Greater Anchorage Area Borough takes over the responsibility of all schools of the Borough for the school year 1965-66. At that time property evaluation and the tax rate for schools, planning and zoning and assessing will be uniform throughout the Borough.

As a formality the Assembly approved the \$35,474.00 1964-65 budget recommended by the Girdwood School Board, the GAAB School administrators serving as advisors.

Mr. Wayne Crabtree, resident of Birchwood appeared before the Assembly to express his personal opposition to a personal property tax and favoring a sales tax as being more equitable and more readily collectable.

The interim advisory Planning and Zoning Commission for the Borough will meet at 8pm Monday June 22 and the Borough Assembly June 29th at the Administration Building on Romig Hill.

All meetings of the Assembly and Commission are open to the public and residents are urged to attend and express their views on matters coming before these bodies.

For those who like foods with an Oriental flavor, Pegge suggests this different way of fixing Moose or Caribou short ribs.

SWEET-SOUR SHORT RIBS

- 2# short ribs
- 2 tbs fat
- 3/4 cup water
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 2 tbs cornstarch
- 1 tsp salt
- 1 cup Pineapple Juice
- 1/3 cup vinegar
- 1 tbs soy sauce
- 1/2 cup green pepper strips
- 1/4 cup thin sliced onions
- 1 No. 2 can pineapple chunks drained (liquid may be used where pineapple juice is called for

BROWN ribs in hot fat
 ADD water
 COVER and cook slowly til tender (2 hrs.)
 ADD more water if necess.
 DRAIN off fat
 COMBINE sugar & starch
 ADD salt, pineapple juice vinegar, and soy sauce
 COOK over low heat until thick
 POUR over hot ribs
 LET stand 10 minutes
 ADD green pepper, onion and pineapple
 COOK 5 minutes
 SERVE over hot rice.

aska, Rep. Robert A. Everett (D-Tenn.) this week placed in the Congressional Record some information about the 1811 earthquake at Reelfoot Lake Tenn., which was described as "perhaps the most severe earthquake of recorded time" and "even worse than the recent Alaska quake."

The Reelfoot Lake earthquake, also known as the New Madrid earthquake (for the little town across the Missouri border whose name was pronounced new Madrid, unlike old Madrid in Spain), "sheared bluff off the west end of the state and hurled them into the Mississippi River" which "sloshed out of its banks from side to side like coffee in a tilted cup."

Although the claim is made that "No quake in recorded history covered a greater area or lasted as long," it affected only 20,000 acres and killed only two persons. But the material presented by the Tennessee congressman said shocks strong enough to toss people out of their beds came every eight minutes for three hours, followed by two months of "strong quakes and six years in which "strong ones alternated with lighter ones.
