

CHUGIAK: Voters in the Greater Chugiak Area will be voting in three separate precincts next month. This announcement was

made by George Smith, Chairman for the joint Democratic Caucus for the area.

According to Smith, the former Chugiak precinct will be divided at Peters Creek, with all those who live between the creek and the former Eagle River-Chugiak precinct boundary voting in the new precinct, which will be known at the Birchwood precinct.

The Chugiak precinct will now include all that area north of Peters Creek as far as the Knik River.

This includes the former Eklutna precinct which has been eliminated as a separate precinct according to Smith.

Polling place at the Eagle River precinct will be the Eagle River School, in the new Birchwood precinct, voters will cast their ballots at the Chugiak School.

Due to the lack of any public buildings in the area now known as the Chugiak precinct, a polling place there has not yet been designated.

Swith said that he is attempting to locate an acceptable place and will announce this as soon as it has been confirmed.

Smoth said that the reason he was given for the change was an anticipated vote of over 500 in the area formerly known as the Chugiak precinct.

FIRE COMPANY RAFFLE TICKETS ON SALE


