PROCLAMATION CALLS FOR SPECIAL SESSION OF LEGISLATURE

JUNEAU: Governor William A. Egan today issued a proclamation calling for a special session of the Alaska State Legislature on August 31, to consider legislation appropriating \$5,500,000 as the State's share of a federal-state plan to purchase mortgages of homes severely damaged or destroyed in the earthquake and seismic sea waves of last March 27th.

The special session would begin at 10am, Juneau time. Letters and copies of the proclamation went out today to the 60 State legislators.

Governor Egan also invited the presiding officers and majority and minority leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives and the Finance Committees of both houses to meet in Juneau on August 28th, to begin consideration of this special legislation.

The Congress of the United States on Saturday approved the Alaska Omnibus Act, which authorizes the mortgage purchase plan, and sent it to the White House for President

Section 57 of this act provides for federal grants of \$5,500,000 to match on a fifty-fifty basis, money to be provided by the State of Alaska to pay the costs of retiring or adjusting the mortgage obligation on private homes destroyed, or severely damaged.

The State's share would be provided from existing disaster authorizations. A post-earthquake session of the Legislature authorized the issuance of \$50,000,000 worth of bonds to provide financing for reconstruction of the State.

Board members who will continue to serve are: Dorothy Fetrow of Old Chuglak, Dorothy Armstrong of Birchwood, Joan Kennedy of Upper Eagle River and Maude Pemberton of Eagle River.

Jeanette Beatty of Eagle River continues as Trustee.

The board elected as their officers for the coming year: Robert Fleming as President, Valerie McKenzie as Vice President, Shirley Mauldin as treasurer and Dorothy Fetrow as Secretary.

WARNING OF DOG DISEASE EPIDEMIC

BIRCHWOOD: Mrs. O.D. (Margaret) Hansen, manager of the Birchwood Kennels warns local dog owners of a disease which is approaching epidemic proportions in the Anchorage area.

The disease is known as "Leptospirosis" and can effect humans as well as animals. It is a disease of the kidneys and liver, and an increasing number of cases has been discovered in dogs within the past 2 to 3 weeks.

Mrs. Hansen advises all dog owners to have their pets vaccinated for this disease immediately.

CHUGIAK: The completion date for the new Chuglak High School has been announced today, according to Frank Cline, Principal.

The administration and classrooms are scheduled to be completed and available for occupancy by September 1st, 1964.

The kitchen will be completed and ready for use by September 8th, and the gymnasium and locker area will be ready by September 15th.

Mr. Cline has resumed his duties, and is temporarily located at the Eagle River School.

He expects to be able to occupy his office at the high school soon after the September 1st acceptance date.

BOROUGH ASSEMBLY PASSES NINE RESOLUTIONS

ANCHORAGE: The Greater Anchorage Borough Assembly at their Monday night meeting passed on nine resolutions, tabled two and disapproved one.

Tabled was a request to assume the powers of animal control on a boroughwide basis. This was proposed by Fannie Hoopes, and tabled pending the recommendation of administration procedures and estimated cost of such a program by the Society of Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

x Also tabled, was action on Ordinance No. 9, which would exempt from taxation household furniture and effects. This was tabled pending further investigation of tax revenue loss.

Passed was the ratification of school bond sale; a public hearing and action on Ordinance No. 7, an ordinance regulating junk yards, a public hearing and action on Ordinance No. 8, a ordinance establishing planning commission, Resolution No. 19, a resolution to amend Resolution No. 4, authorizing and directing the bonding of certain Borough officers and employees, Resolution No. 20, a resolution approving petition to the Local Affairs Agency concerning exercise of sewer powers, Resolution No. 22, a resolution approving assumption of the powers of the Anchorage Independent School District and the Spenard Public Utility District, and Resolution No. 23, a resolution directing assumption of tax collection powers from the city of Glen Alps. Also passed on was old business, concerning the Land Evaluation Committee.

The assembly did not pass Resolution No. 21, a resolution approving petition to the Local Affairs Agency for reclassification as

COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR AUGUST

Pat Simpson

The recipe which Pat gives us this month is one she has had since she was in the 9th grade and working in southern Minnesota. She got this by trade from a woman from LaCrosse Wisconsin.

PEANUT CAKE

- 1/3 cups butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 2/3 cups flour
- 2 1/2 tsp. baking powder

CREAM butter, eggs and sugar
SIFT dry ingredients together
COMBINE with egg mixture alternating with milk
BAKE at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.

FROSTING:

- 3 cups powdered sugar
 - 1/2 pound butter (or oleo)
- MIX together until all lumps are out.
ADD small amount of cream until proper consistency for spreading.
CUT cake into squares
FROST each piece on all sides
ROLL in ground peanuts (approximately one pound, use peanuts in shell if possible)

PLAN EXHIBITS FOR THE FAIR

PALMER: Gardeners who plan to exhibit at the fair will find the bulletin entitled "Vegetables - Select them - Show them" helpful in selecting and preparing exhibits. The bulletin is available at the Extension office.

A number of rules apply to all vegetable exhibits, according to Leonard Cade, district Extension agent.

Exhibits should be clean, depending upon the vegetables they may be washed, brushed, or cleaned with a moist cloth.

When several items are required for an exhibit, they should be uniform in size, shape, color and quality. Ordinarily the type most desired by the consumer is the ideal for fair exhibition purposes.

Exhibits should be free of blemishes, such as mechanical damage, cracks, discoloration, insect damage, and fungus and bacterial infection.

A fair exhibit should represent the product that producers would like most to sell and that which consumers are most satisfied in buying.

An exhibit should be representative of the variety. Proper preparation is important and is described in the bulletin for each vegetable, Cade concluded.

REPORT OFFICIAL TO THE SCHOOL BOARDS IS INCORRECT

CHUGIAK: A report, which appeared in both Anchorage daily newspapers, to the effect that an official tour for the benefit of the press and other interested persons would be held at the new Chugiak High School last Friday proved to be incorrect according to a spokesman for Dr. Don DeFoe, superintendent of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough.

Apparently the misunderstanding arose as a result of a remark made at a meeting of the GAAB school board last week. One of the school officials was reported to have said that he had an appointment to meet with the architects at the school on Friday and suggested that any members of the board who might like to "look over" the new building accompany him. This was misinterpreted by press representatives present at the meeting to be an open invitation for an official tour and appeared as such in both of the Anchorage papers.

According to Dr. DeFoe's office the new building is not scheduled to be turned over to the borough before September 1st, and no official open house was planned until that time.

WATERFOWL SEASON OPENS SEPT. 1

JUNEAU: Tuesday, September 1, is opening day for ducks, geese, jacksnipe, brant, and cranes, the Alaska Department of Fish and Game announced today. The season continues through December 14 on ducks and geese.

The Aleutian and Pribilof Islands (Game Management Unit 10) are an exception; there, the season opens October 15 and doesn't close until January 15. Waterfowl flights to these areas are considerably later than to other parts of the State, according to Division of Game Director On the Department's recommendation to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which sets maximum seasons and bag limits on migratory birds, the closing dates on cranes and jacksnips were extended from last year's Sept 30, to Oct. 15 respectively, to Oct. 15 for cranes and Dec. 14 for jacksnipe.

These closures apply to all of Alaska, including the Aleutians and Pribilofs.

Bag limits are unchanged from last year Brooks said: five game ducks, two cranes, six geese (only three of which may be Canada geese or white-fronts) three brant, eight jacksnipe, 15 coots, and 15 "sea ducks". Possession limits are the same as daily bag limits on jacksnipe, coots and brant, and double the daily limit on the other species. Copies of the 1964-65 waterfowl regulations will Brooks said.

Rev. Tewell will be replaced by Rev. Edgar MacElhannon, who has been the Pastor to the Assembly of God Church in Cordova Alaska.

Rev. MacElhannon is married and has three children. He will assume his duties in Chugiak about September 1st.

Acting as temporary pastor at the Chugiak Chapel, is Paul Huling a student pastor, who will leave on September first to resume his studies at Springfield Missouri.

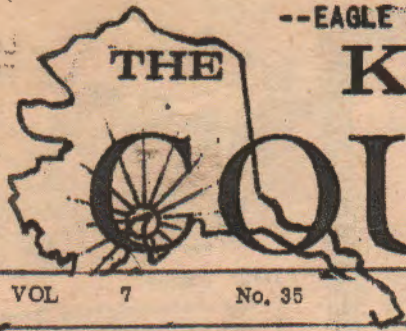

JUNEAU: Dr. Thomas R. McGowan, health officer of the Southcentral region since March 1963, has been appointed director of the Division of Public Health.

The announcement was made today by Dr. Levi M. Browning, commissioner of the Department of Health and Welfare.

Dr. McGowan will assume his new post on August 24, Dr. Browning said.

He succeeds Dr. Edwin Wicks who resigned July 15 to become director of the New Mexico Health department.

After completing his graduate work, Dr. McGowan served as assistant professor of pathobiology on the Johns Hopkins staff, and as administrator of the International Center for Med

Use Your Garden!

About now vegetables of all kinds are hitting their peak. All of the garden truck you plan to save by freezing and canning should be picked and processed just as fast as it becomes ready.

Don't wait another week or two hoping there will be a bigger amount to do at once. If you do, some of the produce will be a little over-mature and some hardly ready. The result will be poor quality.

Broccoli matures fast and goes by quickly. It is at its very best while the head is still tight and smooth. Once unevenness and yellow color start to show, it is past its prime for preserving, although it is often eaten much later than this.

Cauliflower is a little later and does not develop quite as rapidly. Small, white heads are best. Uneven, yellow heads are of poor quality. It is the unopened flowers that are being used, so don't wait for it to bloom!

Brussels sprouts develop later than the other vegetables in the mustard family, yet many are lost by over-maturity. The sprouts mature at the bottom of the stalk first. They should be picked when about one inch in diameter. They grow tough very rapidly once the sprout starts to open.

Maybe you've wondered about removal of the bottom leaves on Brussels sprouts. Don't remove them until they become old and yellow or when you have picked the sprouts near them.

Swiss chard, New Zealand and other greens are tender when the leaves are young and crisp. Pick greens early and often, and don't delay between picking and processing.

Remember young beet and turnip tops make fine greens, but they grow tough and strong when the root matures.

Many of the root crops can be canned and frozen, although people often consider them for cold storage only.

Maybe it would be worthwhile to review USDA Home

JUNEAU:

The Alaska department of fish and game this week reminded moose and sheep hunters that they must obtain harvest tickets prior to hunting these two species. The harvest tickets may be obtained from any license vendor without charge.

The postcard portion of the harvest ticket must be filled out and mailed within 15 days by successful hunters. The other part of the harvest ticket must be attached to the animal immediately after it is taken. Persons holding harvest tickets, but not having a chance to hunt, and unsuccessful hunters have until 30 days after the close of the season to mail in the postcard portion of the harvest ticket.

Housing In Alaska

Putting In The Floor?

If you are putting in a wood floor you are in a position to make some long-lasting mistakes. A well-laid wood floor is easy to keep clean, comfortable to walk on, and is an important part of the decorative scheme of the interior of the house.

However, a floor that has cracks and irregularities is unsightly, catches dust and dirt, and is a lasting source of annoyance and disappointment.

Since cracks do not usually appear in a new floor until several months after the house is occupied, tearing it up and re-laying it is not very practical.

The thing to do is to know how to do the job right the first time. A U. S. Department of Agriculture publication, "Preventing Cracks in New Wood Floors," will tell you in detail how to prevent the problem. It is leaflet No. 56. Ask for it from your local Extension Service office or the Bulletin Office, Cooperative Extension Service, College.
