> LOCAL TAX RATE TO BE LOWER

ANCHORAGE: The tax rate for those residing outside the city of Anchorage and the Anchorage Independent School District will be lower than first planned, according to Assembly Glenn Briggs from Section one. Section one.

Briggs explained that the 41/2 mills that had been originally set for the six month period ending December 31, had been based on an estimated appraisal of real property at 10,000,000 dollars. The actual appraisal was found to be almost 15,000,000.

Since the original budget had been made up on the basis of the estimate, the 41/2 mill rate is now more than is necessary to meet this budget and has been reduced to 3 1/2 mills for the same six month period.

ANCHORAGE: Dale Pierson, loc-al candidate to the Borough School Board, was given a green light by the Borough Assembly Monday night when they passed an emergency ordinance ammending Borough Ordinance #6, regarding transitional registration.

Pierson had been declared in-eligible as a candidate due to the ruling which stated that each candidate must have on his petition at least 50 signers who had pre-regis-tered for the Borough Election. With registration in the Greater

Chugiak Area being opened late on September 15th, and deadline for filing being midnight of that same day, Pierson had in effect only a few hours in which to obtain the fifty signatures. According to Pierson he had assumed that anyone who did pre-register before the September 25th deadline would be counted as a registered voter. The inter-pertation that the voter must pre-register prior to the filing deadline made some of his signers ineligable.

The Borough Assembly feeling that Pierson had been treated unfairly, amended the Ordinance to read as follows: "Any voter who voted in the Primary Election of the State of Alaska, 1964, or in the General El-ection of the State of Alaska 1962, shall be deemed a registered voter under this ordinance until November under this ordinance until November 20th, of 1964.

It was further ammended by adding the following paragraph. "Any qual-ified voter may register during the period between the effective date of this ordinance and the closing of the polls for the borough election on October 6th, 1964. The borough clerk shall maintain facilities for registration at each polling place in said election, and registration at the polls shall be administered by the election clerks and judges assigned to the polls. period between the effective date of to the polls.

Pierson had filed for the one year seat on the borough School Board.

PALMER:

Motor vehicle accidents are Motor vehicle accidents are the leading cause of death among youthful drivers, Leland Cade, district Extension agent, said this week. Young drivers have the highest accident and death rate of any driver group—an accident rate that is double the rest for the adult popble the rate for the adult population.

More youthful drivers than ever are now driving on the nation's roads. During last nation's roads. year youthful drivers account-ed for 15 per cent of all vehicle

ed for 15 per cent of all vehicle accidents, even though the y accounted for only 8 per cent of the driving population.

A number of reasons account for the high accident rate of young drivers. The two main reasons are the absence of exreasons are the absence of ex-perience and emotional immaturity. This expresses itself in terms of speed, breaking var-ious traffic rules, and lack of consideration for others.


