BIRCHWOOD: The permanent closure of the public dump on the Birch-wood Road is planned for the near future, according to Clark Roager, of the maintenance division of the

Department of Highways. According to Rogers, the first step of the eventual closure has already been taken with the piling of dirt along the edge of the embankment over which the public has been dump-ing over the period of years.

Rogers said that a small area at the end of the dump has been left op-en for dumping until the opening of the new Sanitary Fill across the Eagle River bridge, which he believes should be ready in ten days to two weeks. He said that persons who dump their refuse over the bank at the point which has been left open He said that persons who will not be prosecuted for illegal dumping.

He explained that the dirt which has been used to block off the area which been used to block off the area which had been used fro dumping was taken in the process of widening the ditches at both approaches to the Peters BCreek Bridge, a routine proceedure. Signs which indicat that the dump been closed, and warning that viol-ators will be prosecuted will not be placed until the dump is completely

placed until the dump is completely

closed. The new dump is under the jurisdiction of the Chugiak Benefit As-sociation, and has been leased under contract to an Anchorage firm, who will maintain it as a Sanitary fill, and in turn will charge a dumping fee.





If you plan to have your soil tested before planting next spring, now is the time to take the samples before the ground freezes.

You will also have lots of time to send your samples in to the Soil Testing Service, University of Alaska, College. If you wait until spring to send in soil samples, the test-ing laboratory will be rushed, it will be too both the test of the service of the ser

will be too late to order fertilizer and get it on before planting, etc.

you send your samples in now, you can get the results and have all winter to do a good job of planning and get your fertilizer ordered. Then, in the spring you'll be ready to go when the first robin shows up. Now is the time to write in

information about your gar-den while you still remember the plants you had trouble with, the areas of the garden that failed to produce as you expected, and the other kinds of problems you had. Send the notes in with your soil samples and the Sourdough Gardener can do a much better job of helping you fertilize

your garden correctly. If you don't know how to take a soil sample, ask your District Extension Service agent for a copy of "Sampling Soils," publication number 33. The Extension office also can supply you with paper cartons especially made for soil samples



VOTERS TO BE SHOWN SAMPLE BALLOTS

CHUGIAK: Sample ballots for the up coming Greaker Anchorage Area Borough election set for Tuesday, Oct. 6, will be circulated throughout the borough this week. All voters will have the opportun-

ity of casting their callots for three Borough School Board members. Voters of the six sections located outside the city will select Borough assemblymen for Sections 3, 4, and 6.

On the ballot, also will appear

three propositions. Proposition "A", TO BE VOTED ON BY ALL LEGAL VOTERS OF THE B:ROUGH, will appear on the ballot...."Shall the Greater Anchorage Area Borough exercise areaorage Area Borough exercise area-wide basis within the borough the public health powers and functions presently exercised by the Greater Anchorage Health District? The mill rate for the exercise of this power for the calendar year 1965 shall not exceed one (1) mill." Proposition "B" will be voted on by ONLY LEGAL VOTERS OF THE SIX SECTIONS OUTSIDE THE CITY and will rea....."Shall the Greater Anchorage Area Borough exercise outside cities the powers and funct-

outside cities the powers and functions concerning severs and inter-ions concerning severs given to first-class cities under the laws of the State of Alasla?". Proposition "C" will be voter on BY ONLY LEGAL VOTERS OF THE SIX SECTIONS OUTSIDE THE CITY,

and will appear on the ballot ... "Shall the qualified voters of each borough section in the Greater Anchorage Borough in subsequent elections of assemblymen vote only upon the can-didacy of candidates residing in that section?"

Any voter who voted in the primary Any voter who voted in the pininary election of the State of Alaska in 1964 or in the general election of the State of Alaska in 1962 and has been a res-ident of the precinct for 30 days, shall be deemed a registered voter until November 20, 1964. Any qualified voter may register up to the alaster of the polls on October

to the closing of the polls on October 6, 1964.

Proposition "A" proposes to add health powers as a boroughwide service in addition to the three manditary boroughwide services of schools, planning and zoning and tax collecting and assessing. Assemblyman Glenn Briggs, from

Section one said that at present the State provides the limited health powers outside the Greater Anchorage Health District, whose authority is confined largely to the limits of the City... The State has indicated it intends to force the Borough to prointends to force the Borough to pro-vice health services and permit the State to withdraw from the field. Briggs went on to explain that Prop-osition "B", proposing theexercise of sewers powers outside the City, and to be voted upon only by the vot-ers of the sections outside the City, is being presented to the voters with the hope it will be passed, thereby enabling appropriate action aimed at a solution of the sewer and drainage problems acute to the areas bounding problems acute to the areas bounding the City on the east and south over which the City has no jurisdiction. Briggs observed that this is a prob lem which can be solved only on a local service area basis involving (next col)

the fringe area of Anchorage from Muldoon Road south and west. The problem does not exist in the Greater Chugiak Area and the local area will not be effected one way of the other transformed the dots other regardless of the decision made by the voters on Proposition "B" at the polls.

Briggs concluded by saying that "There are good arguments for and against the election of assemblymen by Section rather than at large; dec-ision of which will be made by the voters October 6 when they cast their vote on Proposition "C".

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK TO BE MARKED BY HOME DRILLS

CHUGIAK: Chuglak Fire Chief John Kuphaldt announced today that home fire drills have been scheduled thr-oughout the State of Alaska for October 6th, in observance of Fire Pre-vention Week,

The plan is for each family in the State to prepare for and hold a fire drill in his home at a given signal, The drills are schedued to start

7:00pm the evening of October 6, 1964

All pre-planning and instructions to be given prior to the time set. Five minutes before the 7pm time, everyone is to go to their bedroom and close the door. Upon hearing the signal, they will carry out the fire drill instructions that have been

given to them. given to them, leaving their room

by way of emergency exit. Where possible, actual evacuation should be made. Of course, where escape would necessitate jumping from a second story or breaking a window, the drill should be simulated.

The reasons which are given for this plan are enumerated as fol-lows: (1) to live for the future. (2) fifteen persons have died in fires in Alaska since January 1, 1964. (3) Eight children under the age of five have died in fires so far this year. (4) Chidren and elderly adults are the most frequent victims of fire. (5) Every fifteen seconds, a fire. (5) Every fifteen seconds, a fire breaks out someplace in the United States. (6) Every forty-five minutes a fire takes a human life. (7) Pre-planned escape (7) Pre-planned escape measures would save up to 35% of all lives lost in h;me fires.

The following measures are recommended for preparation for the home drill ; (1) Family discussion:

(a) (b) How fires start

Where fires start How smoke and gases kill.

(c) (d) How to escape.

(2) Draw floor plans:(a) Use block arrows to show

regular exit routes from rooms. (b) Use red arrows to show em-ergency exit route.

(c) Designate doors that should be closed at spreading of fire. (d) Use broken if at night to stop

Use broken lines to designate porches that may be used as emergency routes.

FIREMANS BALL SET FOR SATURDAY

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




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ANCHORAGE: The semi-annual Federal Impact survey will be taken Tuesday, October 6th, by the Anchorage Borough School District.

Results of this survey determine the amount of federal assistance the school disctict will receive to ease the financial hardship posed by substantial numbers of federally connected students.

nected students. Every public school student will carry h;me a Federal Impact Survey card on that day for parents to complete and return the following day, Wednesday, October 7th. The impact card requests the fol-

The impact card requests the following information; parents' name, parents' employer or employers, property location of parents employment as of Tuesday October 6th, 1964. This information should represent the situation as of October 6 in all respects. Changes taking place before or after this date do not effect the survey. All parents, whether Federal employees or not, should complete and return the form. Federal Impact ald takes two forms. Public Law 815, provides periodic assistance for the construction of classrooms for districts with a specific percentage of additional new pupils, whose parents either work on or live on federal property and who face a classroom shortage, public Law 874, provides annual financial aid to districts which have a minumum number of pupils whose parents either work on or live on federal property. These funds may be used for operation of the annual school program. The funds represent the loss of local




(impact funds) To be eligible for elser form of aid, the Anchorage Borough School District must have on file an auditable signed Federal Impact Survey card for every pupil in the district.

Depending on the cooperation of the parents in completing and returning these cards, the school district could receive as much as One million eighty thousand dollars for the 1964-65 operation of the school district and a possible additional sum for school construction.



#### REGULATIONS GOVERNING FISHING SOLICITED

#### JUNEAU:

Walter Kirkness, Commissioner, department of fish and game, has announced that proposals for specific changes in the regulations for commer-cial fishing, sport fishing, and cial fishing, sport fishing, and beaver trapping are now being solicited. Such proposals must be received by the department of fish and game, Subport Building, Juneau, Alaska, no later than 5:00 p. m., October 9, 1964, in order to be considered by the board of fish and game at their fall adoption meeting.

The law requires that the proposals be consolidated, ad-vertised, and widely distribut-ed at least thirty days before the Board meets; therefore, the deadline date of October 9 has been set in conformity with the statutory requirement.

The public is invited to sub-mit its views on regulation changes. The proposed changes should be as specific as pos-sible and should cite the rea-sons why such a change is de-sirable. In the past, changes of a general nature have been of a general nature have been propsed and could not be act-ed upon as the intent was not known. A good example of such a general proposal would be one received from a specific locality asking that the sport fish limit on silver salmon be three. It does not specify Tish limit on silver salmon be three. It does not specify whether this limit was propos-ed for that locality, area, re-gion, or Alaska as a whole. Whenever possible, cite the particular section, such as 109.-og Weakly fishing seried 06, Weekly fishing period.




