

How Did Your Garden Grow?

Did you have a good gardening year? We are near the end of the growing season and it's a good time to take a look at your garden, lawn, shrubs and to figure out what problems you had.

Fall is the best time to take a soil test and send it in to the Extension Service. With the soil test results you can plan next year's planting at your

leisure during the long winter.

March before thinking about soil testing, you may find dig-ging pretty hard. It may even be difficult to find the garden among the snow drifts! By sending in a sou sample now, you will be able to order the right kind and amount of fertilizer early in the season and be all ready to go when

For her second recipe, Kristina gives her own special meatballs. She says the meat for this dish must be ground very fine, and suggests that one ask the butcher to put it through the grinder at least four or five times.

MEAT BALLS
1 1/2 lbs, ground beef or caribou 1/2 lb, ground pork shoulder 2 cups dry bread-crumbs Dash of ground cloves /4 cup tomato catsup 2 eggs l cup milk 1/4 cup chopped onlons 2 tsp. salt 1/8 tsp. Allspice 1/4 cup chopped green pepper

COMBINE all ingredients MIX thouroughly FORM into very small balls DROP from spoon into skillet with 2 tbs, of hot fat.
BROWN on all sides

REMOVE to casserole make gravy by adding 1 1/2 Tbs flour 1/2 tsp salt

1/2 tsp petter to fak in skillet. POUR in 1 3/4 cups water GOOK until thickened POUR gravy over meatballs COVER casserole BAKE for one hour in 350 degree oven.

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

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

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

This disease effects the kidneys and liver of the animals and can be transmitted to humans.

Pet owners are warned that even an animal that has recovered from the disease often will act as a carrier for some months afterward.

The disease is passed on by the urine of the animal.

Mrs. Hansen stated that anyone wishing to secure immunization for their dogs or cats call her to determine at what time and on what day the veterinarian will be at the kennels. kennels.

Immunization is secured through a series of two injections taken two weeks apart. The cost of the im-munization is five dollars per injection.

GASOLINE STORAGE ADVISE

PALMER:

Storage of gasoline can be Storage of gasoline can be costly unless proper attention is given to the container and location of the container, according to Leland Cade, district Extension agent in Palmer. Evaporation losses can run as high as seven per cent or seven gallons for every 100 gallops purchased.

gallons purchased.
Gasoline stored in a light colored tank will minimize temperature increases during the day. White is the best color for a storage tank, aluminum is nearly as good, and darker colors such as red or black re-sult in the greatest tempera-ture increases and the greatest

Any tank above ground should be shaded, regardless of the color. A shade should be constructed to keep the sunshine from the tank, and so that ventilation is possible, but so that it can't be forced. Wind will siphon vapors from

Gasoline losses are greatest when small containers are used. For example, losses from 55 gallon drums will be double that from 300 gallon tanks, other things being equal.

A pressure-vacuum release vent will cut storage losses in half. Such a vent minimizes the exchange of air as temperatures change. They allow for the entry of air as gasoline is removed. Such a vent also minimizes the amount of moisture that may get into a tank.

Proper fuel storage may

mean getting up to seven per cent more for your fuel dollar Cade concluded.

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
