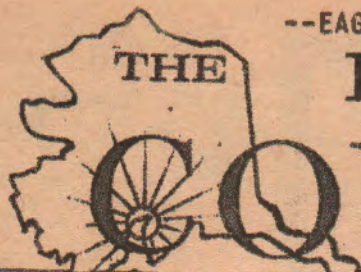

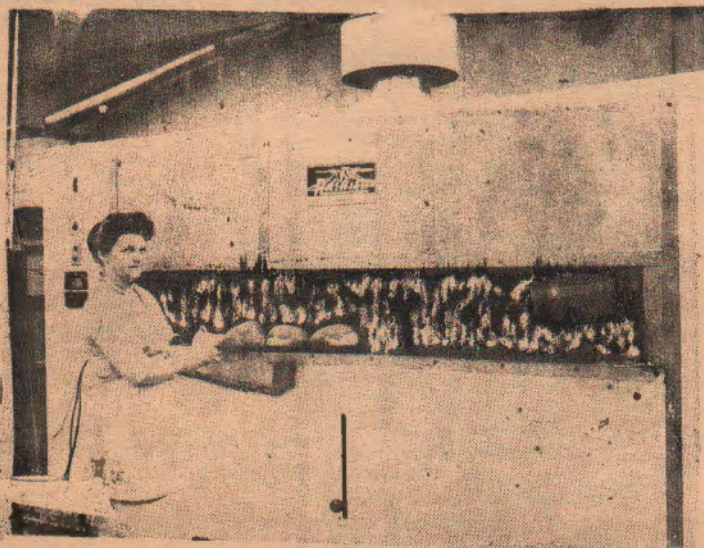

OCHS PLANS VICTORY CELEBRATION

EAGLE RIVER: The executive board of Operation Chugiak High School, (OCHS), held a special meeting on Sunday, September 6th at the home of Chairman Dale Pierson in Eagle River.

A meeting of the twenty six original local clubs and organizations which compose OCHS has been scheduled for Friday, September 11th, at 7:30pm at the Chugiak Methodist Church at mile 18.

The twenty-six organizations will be contacted by mail or phone and asked to send a representative to that meeting to help make the plans for the celebration.

CLINIC FOR DOG IMMUNIZATION PLANNED

BIRCHWOOD: A clinic for the immunization of dogs and cats against the disease "Leptospirosis" is planned in the next week to be held at the BIRCHWOOD Kennels, according to the Kennels manager Margaret Ha

This disease which has stricken many dogs in the Anchorage area, has also been found among dogs in the Greater Chugiak Area.

BOROUGH ELECTION PRE-REGISTRATION TO BEGIN

CHUGIAK: Pre-registration of the residents of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough will begin locally on September 15th and last through the 19th of the month.

Two groups of local women will be manning pre-registration booths, one to be set up at Valu City and the other at the Chugiak Post Office.

Residents of the area may register at either of the two booths regardless of which voting precinct they may live.

Also any of the registrars may pre-register a voter at any time other than at the prescribed booths.

There will be a registrar at the Valu City booth from 4pm until 7pm on the weekdays and from 11am until 7pm on Saturday. The hours of the booth at the Chugiak Post Office were not known at this time.

Anyone who does not have the opportunity to register at any of the two booths, may register with any of the registrars at her home or at any pre-arranged location. Registration deadline is September 25th.

CHUGIAK: A team of inspectors from the State Department of Education, conducted an inspection of the classroom and office facilities of the new Chugiak High School last Monday and declared them ready for occupancy.

Local school administrators are busy the rest of the week moving school furniture and equipment into the new building in preparation for the opening next Tuesday, September 15th.

Frank Cline, High School Principal, stated that an inspection of the remainder of the building, which consists mainly of the multi-purpose room and the Gymnasium and related facilities will take place on September 17th.

He said that there would be no hot lunch program at the High School during the first week of school, and reminds all students to bring a lunch.

He said that the High School facilities might be a little crowded during the first week of school, until the remainder of the building is put into use.

He also requested that any High School or Elementary School Students who failed to register last week, please do so anytime during the present week. Registration may be made at either of the grade schools or the High School between the hours of 8:30am and 4:30pm.

Cline also reminds high school students to be thinking of selecting school colors, team name, mascot, student government etc.

School will begin at all three of the local schools on Tuesday, September 15th; at 8:30am for the Elementary Schools, and at 9:15 for the High School.

School will be in session for a full day on the first day.

FLINT TO FILL SCHOOL BOARD VACANCY

ANCHORAGE: Virgil Flint, of Eagle River, has been appointed to fill the vacancy on the Greater Anchorage Area School Board which was created by the recent resignation of Willis Avery.

According to a spokesman for Dr. Dafeo, Superintendent of the Borough School System, this is a temporary appointment until the October 6th election, at which time the vacancy will be filled by a candidate chosen by the voters of the Borough. Mr. Avery term would not have expired this year had he not resigned.

The appointment was made by Frank Reed, Chairman of the Borough School Board.

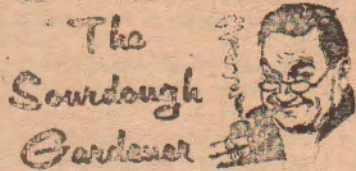

How Did Your Garden Grow?

Did you have a good gardening year? We are near the end of the growing season and it's a good time to take a look at your garden, lawn, shrubs and to figure out what problems you had.

Fall is the best time to take a soil test and send it in to the Extension Service. With the soil test results you can plan next year's planting at your leisure during the long winter.

If you wait until next March before thinking about soil testing, you may find digging pretty hard. It may even be difficult to find the garden among the snow drifts!

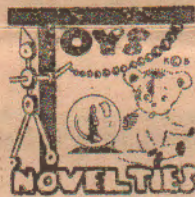
By sending in a soil sample now, you will be able to order the right kind and amount of fertilizer early in the season and be all ready to go when the snow melts next spring.

Send your soil sample to your district Extension agent, or to the Cooperative Extension Service, University of Alaska, College. If you are

in doubt as to how to take a good soil sample, ask your extension agent for a leaflet on how to take one.

COOK OF THE MONTH

COOK FOR SEPTEMBER
KRISTINA TALLMAN

For her second recipe, Kristina gives her own special meatballs. She says the meat for this dish must be ground very fine, and suggests that one ask the butcher to put it through the grinder at least four or five times.

MEAT BALLS

- 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef or caribou
- 1/2 lb. ground pork shoulder
- 2 cups dry bread-crumbs
- Dash of ground cloves
- 1/4 cup tomato catsup
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup milk
- 1/4 cup chopped onions
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. Allspice
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper

- COMBINE all ingredients
- MIX thoroughly
- FORM into very small balls
- DROP from spoon into skillet with 2 tbs. of hot fat.
- BROWN on all sides
- REMOVE to casserole
- make gravy by adding 1 1/2 Tbs flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp petter to fak in skillet.
- POUR in 1 3/4 cups water
- COOK until thickened
- POUR gravy over meatballs
- COVER casserole
- BAKE for one hour in 350 degree oven.

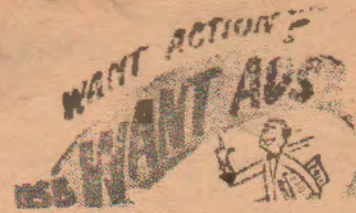
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The mother of the bride wore brown lace street dress with brown accessories. Her corsage was of yellow roses.

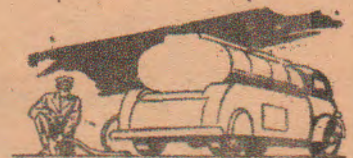

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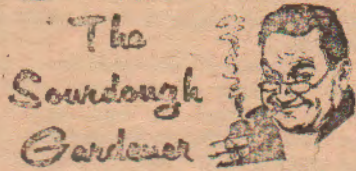


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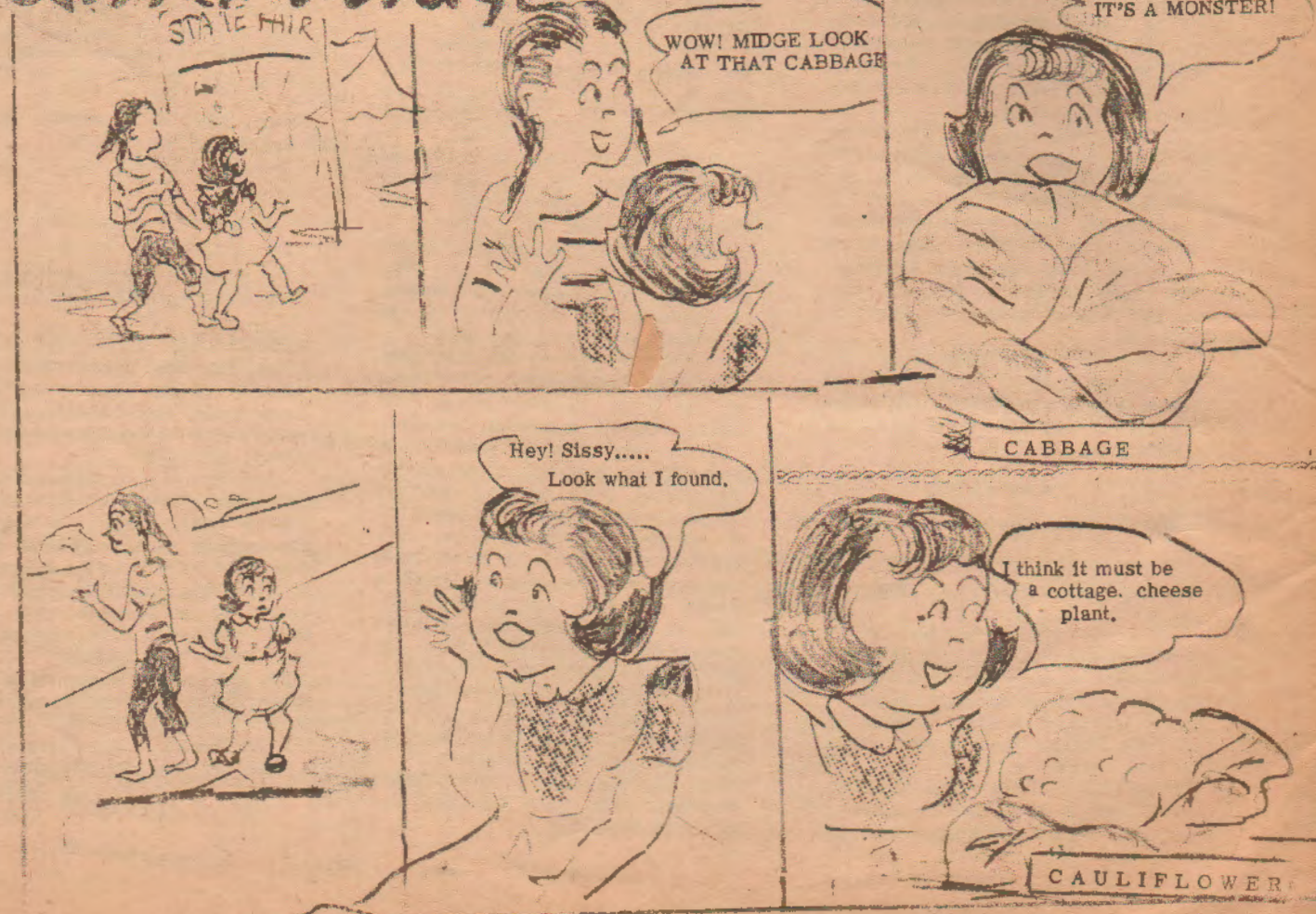

This disease effects the kidneys and liver of the animals and can be transmitted to humans.

Pet owners are warned that even an animal that has recovered from the disease often will act as a carrier for some months afterward. The disease is passed on by the urine of the animal.

Mrs. Hansen stated that anyone wishing to secure immunization for their dogs or cats call her to determine at what time and on what day the veterinarian will be at the kennels.

Immunization is secured through a series of two injections taken two weeks apart. The cost of the immunization is five dollars per injection.

VFW BUDDY POPPY DAYS SCHEDULED

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak VFW Post has announced that they will hold their "Buddy Poppy" sales on September 11 and 12 throughout the area.

The sale of the Poppys, traditionally held in the spring, was postponed this year because of the earthquake.

The Poppy's will be on sale at the Eagle River Shopping Center, at the Mina Mart in Birchwood, at the F & L Service Station on the Birchwood Road and at the Peters Creek Shopping Center at mile 23.

SCHOLARSHIP OFFERED

COLLEGE:

A "Noel Wien Scholarship" to the University of Alaska was established last week commemorating Noel Wien's 40 years of pioneering in Alaska aviation.

BIDS INVITED

JUNEAU:

An estimated \$200,00 project covering an addition to the Corps of Engineers Administration building, Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska, is being advertised for bids.

The work includes relocating a prefabricated metal building to replace an existing extension. The relocated building will have exterior walls insulated, furred and finished with gypsum wall board. Heating and lighting fixtures, as well as framing alterations are also included.

GASOLINE STORAGE ADVISE

PALMER:

Storage of gasoline can be costly unless proper attention is given to the container and location of the container, according to Leland Cadé, district Extension agent in Palmer. Evaporation losses can run as high as seven per cent or seven gallons for every 100 gallons purchased.

Gasoline stored in a light colored tank will minimize temperature increases during the day. White is the best color for a storage tank, aluminum is nearly as good, and darker colors such as red or black result in the greatest temperature increases and the greatest losses.

Any tank above ground should be shaded, regardless of the color. A shade should be constructed to keep the sunshine from the tank, and so that ventilation is possible, but so that it can't be forced. Wind will siphon vapors from a tank and increase losses.

Gasoline losses are greatest when small containers are used. For example, losses from 55 gallon drums will be double that from 300 gallon tanks, other things being equal.

A pressure-vacuum release vent will cut storage losses in half. Such a vent minimizes the exchange of air as temperatures change. They allow for the entry of air as gasoline is removed. Such a vent also minimizes the amount of moisture that may get into a tank.

Proper fuel storage may mean getting up to seven per cent more for your fuel dollar Cadé concluded.
