HIGHWAY HEARING TO BE JANUARY 16



EAGLE RIVER: Location of the Federal-aid primary route 42 from Eagle River to Peters Creek on the Glenn Highway will be the subject of a public hearing in the multipurpose room of the Eagle River School at 8pm on Thursday, January 16th, according to David Fritz of the Department of Highways.

The reason for the hearing, which will be held by the State Department of Highways, is to assess the economic impact of two basic alternative routes which have been studied for engineering feasibility.

The "A" route would run through the Lower Fire Lake area and the Birchwood residential area.

"D" route follows the present highway quite closely, cutting to the north of the present route between Old Chugiak and Peters Creek.

Maps showing both of the proposed routes will be presented at the hearing.

Representatives from both the Department of Highways and the Bureau of Public Roads will be present at the hearing.

duce new features, purchase more and better equipment etc.

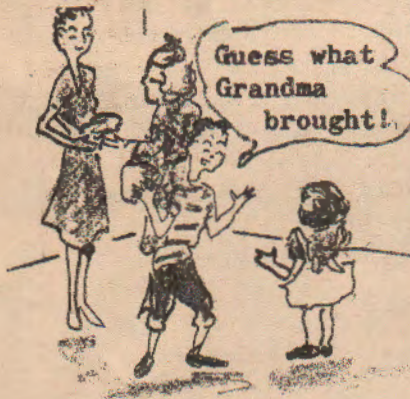
Those who have been readers of the Courier ever since that first crude mimeographed sheet appeared over six years ago, are aware that we have not broken our resolution.

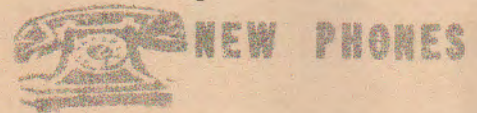

ALIENS MUST REPORT

JUNEAU: All aliens in the United States must report their addresses during the month of January, Keifer L. Gray, district director of the United States immigration and naturalization service stated this week.

Forms on which to make the report will be available to all post offices and offices in the immigration and naturalization service during the month of January. Gray urged all aliens to comply with the reporting requirements, saying that willful failure to do so may lead to serious consequences.

The director estimated that 3,000 aliens will report in the state of Alaska.

Gray said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status, foreign representatives of certain international organizations and those admitted temporarily as agricultural laborers, are required to fill the address report.

Willful failure may result in a \$200 fine, imprisonment for 30 days, and deportation.

Although sand trucks were called for, none arrived that night.

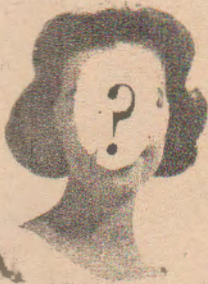
The hazardous conditions persisted until continuing thawing and military vehicles with chains succeeded in breaking through the glare ice and providing better traction for traffic.

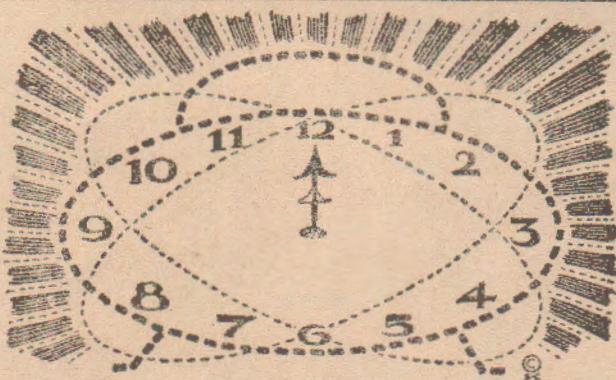

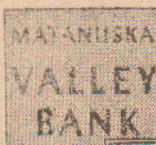

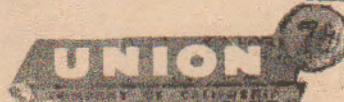
