EAGLE RIVER: A meeting of stockholders of Bush Lanes, Inc has been scheduled for Tuesday, February 4th at 8pm at the Eagle River Bowl, at which time two resolutions recommending dissolution of the corporation and sale of all assets will be voted up-

The resolutions were adopted by the board of directors on December 23 after determining that re-financing could not be secured.

An affirmative vote of two-thirds of the outstanding shares of the Corporation is required for the adoption of each resolution.

Stockholders unable to attend the meeting are urged to vote by proxy. If stockholders do not specify a person to vote their shares, they will be voted by the present board of directors in favor of the resolutions.

"It appears that there is no alternative to the sale of the assets", a letter to all stockholders states. "If we do not do it in an orderly manner, obtaining the best prices available, the assets will be sold under mortgage forclosures or bankruptcy proceedings, and thus we could not anticipate anything for dis-

PROBLEM....WHICH PTA

Next year, parents in Greater Chugiak Area will be faced with a new problem.

The problem will be caused by the fact that one family could have children attending in three local schools at the same time, making

it necessary (if the parents are conscientious, and anxious to participate in PTA activity) for them to belong to three PTA groups at the same time.

This could happen if the parents should have one or more children attending the lower grades in the Chugiak School, a seventh grader, who next year will have to attend the Eag18 River School and an eighth grader or high school student who will be attending Chugiak Righ School in Birch-wood.

In order not to neglect any of their childrans scholastic interests, parents will either have to find time to attend meetings of all three organizations, or attempt to consolidate these groups in some manner so that responsible parents may maintain PTA relationship without having to apand too much time at meetings which can very likely be duplicating their efforts.

Some solution will need to be worked out, and it should prove interesting to see how the parents solve this.





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

NEW PHONE RATES

PALMER: The Matanuska Telephone Association has announced that offective February 1, 1964, two classifications of long distance telephone service either stationto-station or person-to person, will be available within Alaska.

Up to this time only a single class of service has been available in making long distance calls within Alaska.

On a person-to-person call, the calling party specifies the individual by name with whom he wishes to speak. The toll charges start when the converstion begins with the called party.

Station-to-station service permits the calling party to place a long distance call to a distant telephone number and talk with anyone who may answer the called number, at which time charges begin.

"Station-to-station is defined as that service where the person originating the call gives to the toll operator the telephone number of the desired telephone, and does not specify a particular person to be reached.

Person-to-Person is defined as that service where the person originating the call specifies to the Toll operater a particular person to be reached or a particular station, department or office to be reached through a branch exchange attendant. Appointment calls will be classified. as person-to-person.






