

## CBA VOTES TO TAKE OVER NEW DUMP

PETERS CREEK: The Chugiak Benefit Association last night voted to accept the responsibility for sponsoring a new sanitary fill (dump) for the Greater Chugiak Area.

Attending the CBA meeting which was held at the home of Russell Oberg at mile 21½, was Mr. Bruce Adams and Mr. McInnes of the Alaska Department of Health.

Adams outlined the requirements which would be necessary to meet in order to withdraw the necessary land from the Bureau of land management.

CBA appointed a special committee which would compile suggestions on how CBA would administer the contracting of dump management to a private individual. Members of this committee are Dale Briggs, Mrs. Jack Stewart and Russell Oberg. They will meet within the next two weeks, and be ready to present their findings at the next CBA meeting.

Three individuals have filed their intention to bid on the dump management pending formal advertising of bids. They are Norris Tiensvold representing the Country Service Co. Mr. Leo Robinson of mile 23, and Mr. Stuart of Anchorage who presently has the contract for operating the Anchorage City dump.

CBA also voted to have the electricity turned on at the Carnival Hall and make that building available for use of local organizations. This will be done within a week and any local groups wishing to use the building should contact either CBA President Bruce

Term of office for two of the present six assemblymen for the areas outside the Anchorage City limits will expire October 1964, two in October 1965 and 2 in October of 1966.

Terms of assemblymen thereafter will be for three years. Lots drawn for the three terms will take place at the next assembly meeting.

Ordinance number three established the term of office for Borough Chairman for three years. The term of present Chairman John Asplund will expire in October of 1966.

Ordinance number four set the election of borough school board members for October 6, 1964. Terms of office for school board members have not yet been established.

The second formal reading will take place at the next regular meeting of the assembly. If passed again they will become effective thirty days later.

The Anchorage Independent school board, also elected borough school board requested that the assembly approve in the near future the transition of the schools of Anchorage Independent School District, the Greater Chugiak Area and the Girdwood Area into the borough system in order to prepare for the 1964-65 school year.
