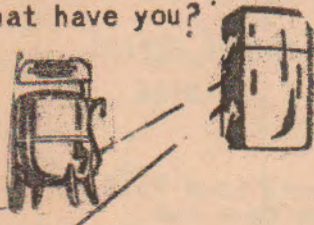

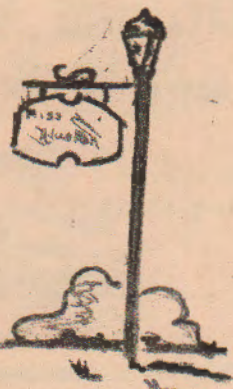

LIONS CLUB REPORT

EAGLE RIVER: Lion Vice-President Roger Williams in the absence of Lion President Flint who is on the sick list, called thirty members of the Eagle River Club to order Thursday in the first meeting of the new year.

NEW LONG DISTANCE RATES TO GO IN EFFECT

PALMER, The Matanuska Telephone Association has received word that the Air Force 1929 Communications Group, which operates the Alaska Communications System, announces that effective February 1, 1964, two classifications of long distance telephone service, either station-to-station or person-to-person, will be available within Alaska.

In making this announcement, Lt. Colonel Alexander Alvarado, Commander of the 1929 Communications Group, stated that up to this time only a single class of service has been available in making long distance calls within Alaska.

On a person-to-person call, the calling party specifies the individual by the name with whom he wishes to speak. The toll charges start when conversation begins with the called person.

Station-to-station service permits the calling party to place a long distance call to a distant telephone number and talk with anyone who may answer the called number, at which time charges begin.

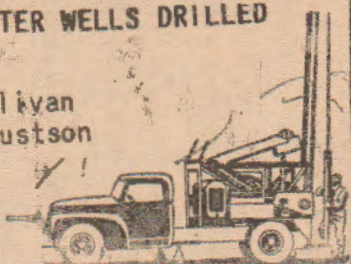

Effective February 1, 1964, the charges for the new station-to-station service will be substantially lower than the present rates for the single class of service.

The rates for the first three minutes of station-to-station call will be approximately one-half the rate for a person-to-person call. The charges for night and Sunday calls will continue at proportionally lower rates than those in effect for day calls. The night charges apply from 6pm to 4:30am, of the morning following and all day Sunday.

A station-to-station call should be placed by giving the operator the telephone number of the called location or if the number is not known the residence address or the listed name of the telephone subscriber should be given. If a specified individual's name is given, in addition to the telephone number, the call becomes a person-to-person call.

The introduction of this additional service on February 1, 1964, will apply only within Alaska. No change in classifications of service or rates are scheduled at this time on long distance calls between Alaska and the other States and Canada.

However, discussions have been entered into with other connecting carriers with a view of extending the classified service beyond Alaska.

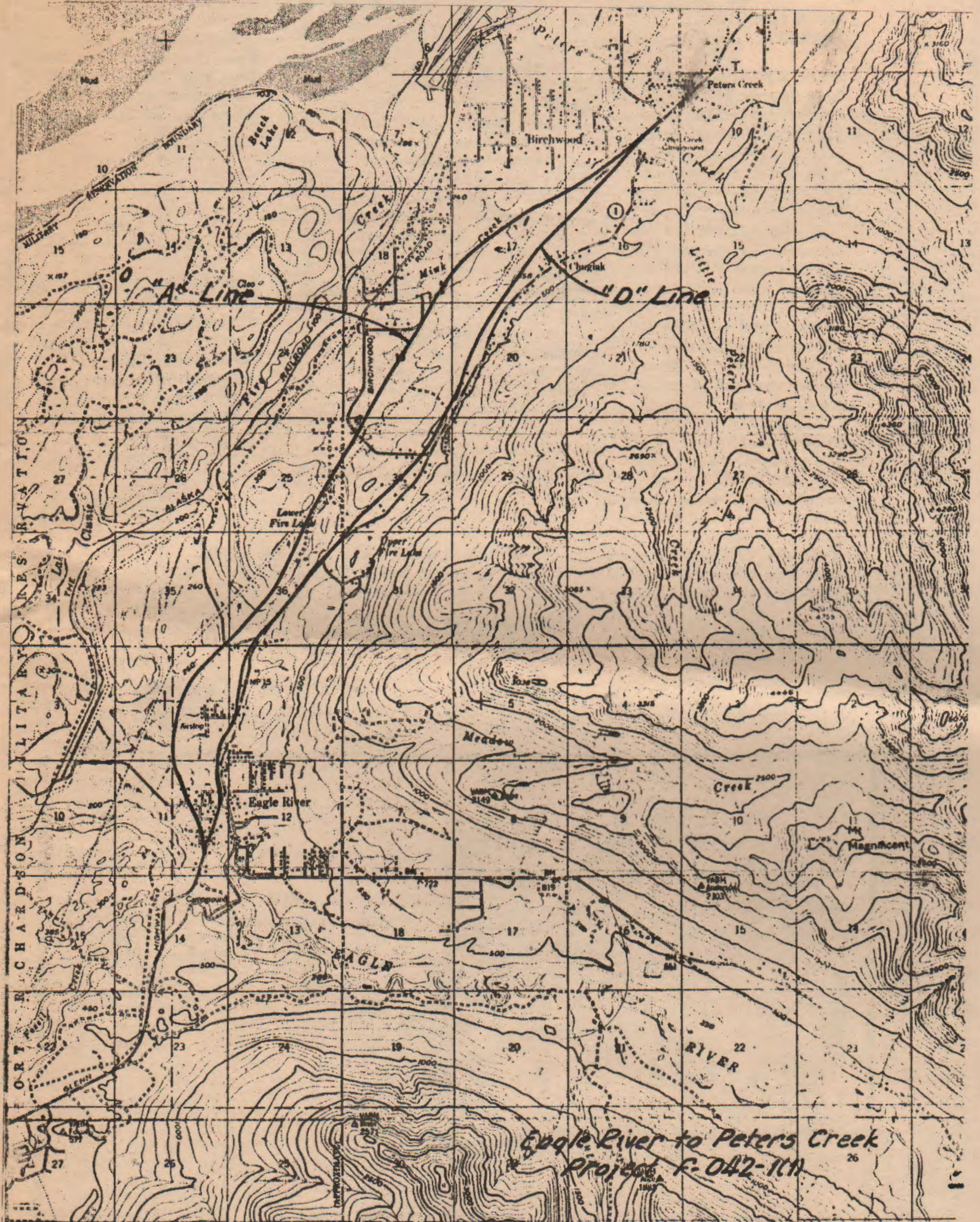
