EAGLE RIVER BOWLIS ROBBED

EAGLE RIVER: Approximately \$600 in cash was stolen from the office safe at the Eagle River Bowl sometime, early on the morning of February 69.

The theft was discovered by an employee, Mrs. Jack Stewart upon her arrival for work on the morning of the sixth.

Entry had been made by prying open a side door and the safe and file cabinet of the office had also been pryed open.

Of the money taken approximately \$272 were tournament funds that had been placed in the safe for safekeeping.

SECOND GROUP PETITIONS FOR ROUTE "A"

CHUGIAK: A second group of local property owners and business men are circulating a petition asking the Department of Highways to build the proposed Route "A" rather than the Route "D" which would be located along the present Glenn Highway.

Route "A" as shown at a public hearing held last month at the Eagle River School, follows a survey line that is located for the most part along public lands in the Birchwood area.

The petitions for Route "A" that by choosing that route it would result in the least loss of private property and would cause the least inconvenience to

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. has reinstalled its EMERGENCY phone system.

The EMERGENCY phone number is the same as in the past, 674-5555, in case of fire or need of an ambulance for all residents of Old Chugiak, Birchwood, Peters Creek and Fire Lake.

The emergency phone numbers for Chugiak listed in the current Anchorage directory are now obsolete, so it would be wise to cross them out and write in the current EMERGENCY number, 674-555. DO IT NOW PLEASE!

In the near future all residents with phones in the area served by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. will receive red stickers inscribed with the EMERG-ENCY 674-5555 number.

These stickers whould be placed on your telepbone so that the proper number may be dialed without loss of time, in the event of an emergency when time is of the utmost importance.

The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. used to have thie EMERGENCY phone system in the past, but as the cost of this phone system is approximately \$50.00 per month, or \$600.00 per year, it eventually had to be taken out of service for the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Co. could not afford to pay for it, due to lack of financial support from the community.



IMPORTANT VITAMIN SOURCES NAMED

PALMER: Many important and inexpensive sources of vitamin C have been named by Myrtle Bang, Home agend for the District Extension of the University of Alaska in Palmer.

Miss Bang says, "Most people think orange juice is our only source of vitamin C.

That comment was made recently at a and started a good discussion on sources of this vitamin.

Whole oranges, grapefruit, and grapefruit juice, strawberries, broccoli and green pepper belong in the group with orange juice.

Other sources that we whould keep in mind are tangerines, or tangerine juice, brussels sprouts, raw cabbage, kale, kohlrabi, mustard greens potatoes and sweet potatoes cooked in the jackets, spinach, tomatoes or tomato juice and turnip greens.

Here in Alaska we will not want to overlook the summer squash such as zucchini, turnips, sauerkraut, peas, dandeline greens, cauliflower, blueborries, raspberries, rhubarb and the low bush cranberries.

A few comparisons will belp make decisions. One potato peeled after baking or boiling will give us one third as much vitamin C as one orange. One cup of broccoli spears have more of vitamin C than an orange.

A cup of coleslaw gives as much vitamin C as a half cup of canned unsweetened orange juice. Our summer squash raised here have more vitamin C than the winter squash such as hubbard that we get from the other states. A cup of raw % raspberries will give as much vitamin C as % cup of orange juice.

All fruits and vegetables have some vitamin C".

The 250 refunds totalod \$6,800.37--an average of \$27.20 each--and were mailed by the Department of Administration.

Stevenson announced the record mailing while reainding Alaskans the due date for filing of 1963 Alaska individual income tax feturns will be April 15, 1964.


