OLD CHUGIAK: An Eskimo dog musher from the village of Kasigluk near Bethel is the guest of the Ollie Walker family of mile 17½ while he is in the Anchorage area to compete in the World Championship dog races this weekend.

Nickolai Pavilla was the winner of an elimination race in his village in which approximately one hundred teams competed. The Kasigluk championship race was a two day affair with 35 miles raced each day.

Also a guest of the Walkers is Sinkna Hurd of Kasigluk Pavilla's handler.

Pavilla will be running a nine dog team in the big race. His lead dog is named Brownie.

ANCHORAGE: Floyd Grant, acting District Highway Engineer for the Anchorage District said today that two petitions from the Greater Chugiak Area had been turned into his office.

One petition was turned asking that the State construct the "A" route as described at a hearing held at the Eagle River School last month.

This petition was turned in by Charles Richner of Birchwood and Dan Bell of Eagle River and contained a total of 584 signatures. A second petition, also asking for construction of the "A" route, was also turned in this containing 200 signatures; making a total of 784 signatures for the "A" route.

Grant also said that he had been informed that a third petition had been sent to the Juneau office of the Department of Highways this one asking for the construction of the "D" route. This petition contained 300 signatures, according to Grant.

Grant went on to say that these petitions along with the opinions expressed at the public hearing and those of persons who had visited his office during the past month would be considered as a package in reviewing the two routes and arriving at the final decision.

Grant said that he expected a final decision to be forthcoming soon.

Mrs. Prichard said that she was hopeful for even wider participation by artists and craftsmen throughout Alaska than

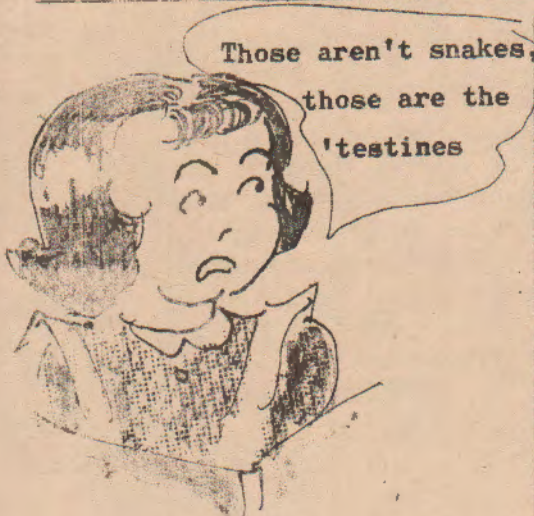
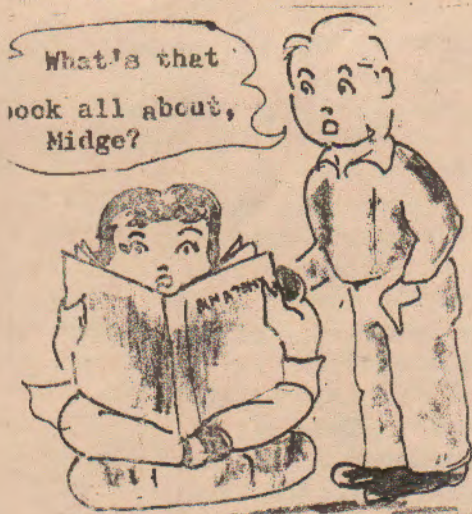
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was experienced last year. She said that there were entries from 17 cities in 1963.

If you are of a mind to fix something special for dessert on George Washington's Birthday, what would be more appropriate than

QUICK CHERRY PUDDING

2 cups biscuit mix (mixed as directed on pkg. or use own favorite biscuit dough)
1 can (well drained) pie cherries

MIX cherries into dough (press in with fingers where necessary)

SHAPE into 9"x10" baking pan

MIX:

½ pkg cherry Kool-Aid
Juice of canned cherries + water to make 1½ cups
¼ pound oleo
½ tsp almond flavoring
1 tsp cinnamon

HEAT until oleo melts
POUR mixture over unbaked dough

(May appear "soupy" but will bake into flavorful syrup)

BAKE as for biscuits and serve hot.

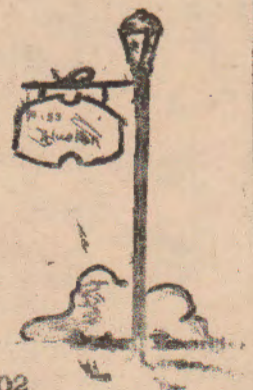

OLD CHUGIAK: In observance of the 13th annual Women's Missionary Council Day, ladies of the Chugiak Chapel of which Rev. Bernard Tewell is pastor, will present a special program at the Evening Service at 7pm Sunday February 23rd.

"NOW is the time!" the theme of the service will be emphasized by visual demonstration and special music. The local group is one of more than 6,000 throughout the nation and other countries who will join in similar services.

Begun in a single church in 1925, the Women's Missionary Council was organized on a national level in 1951. The present membership exceeds 75,000 women. Missionettes, girls' auxiliary of the WMC have some 30,000 girls in 2,850 clubs. The local Missionette club will have part in the Sunday morning service.

Both divisions of the organization are active in five areas of service, home and foreign missions, benevolence institutional projects, district and local community needs. Their combined giving for the past six years has exceeded \$1 million annually.

Mrs. Julia Huling is president of the local group which participates in the national program.
