The new bakery will be open seven days a week, and during the two day grand opening will feature many get-acquainted specials. The first one hundred and fifty ladies to come in on either day will be presented with an orchid. All guests during the Grand Opening will be invited to sign up for a valuable door prize.

In addition to their regular line of breads, cakes and cookies, the Pegge Lee Bakery will make special occasion cakes on only 24 hour notice.

FRUIT GROWING POSSIBLE IN ALASKA


PALMER: Some fruit production is possible in Alaska. A bulletin on the subject has been published by the Alaska Agricultural Experiment S,ation called "Tree Fruits in Alaska" and is available at the Extension Service office, and Experiment Station office, in Palmer, according to Leland Cade, District Extension Agent.

The bulletin reviews the potential for tree fruit production in Alaska and describes a number of varities that bave been tested.

"Folks who would like to grow fruit should plant nothing but the most hardy of the tested varities", Cade said. Winter survival is a lim-

Winter survival is a limiting factor in getting fruit plants to grow and some success has been obtained with the varities listed.

The bulletin also provides information regarding the importion of plant stock from other states and Canada.

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


