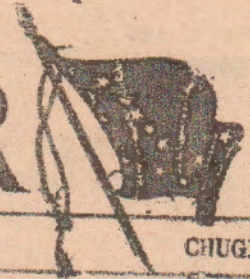

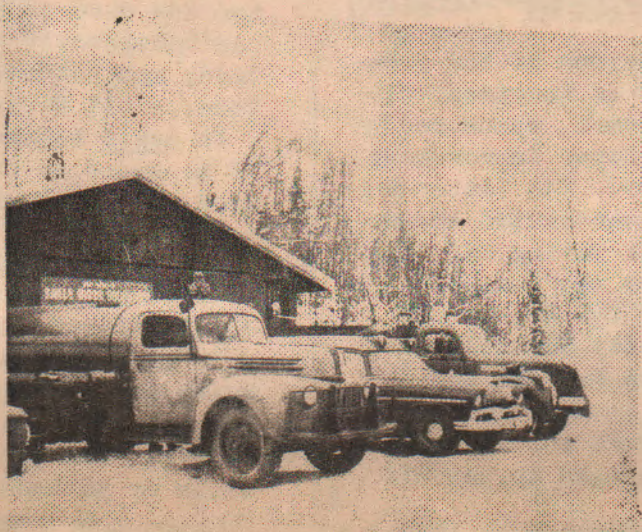

FIRE LEVELS HOME IN BIRCHWOOD

BIRCHWOOD: An early morning fire completely destroyed the Birchwood home of Mr. and Mrs. Berton Gibson last Sunday morning.

Mrs. Gibson was awakened by the barking of their small dog, and upon discovering the house was on fire rushed to the home of a neighbor, Lester Juhnke to call the fire company.

When she was unable to raise the Chugiak Fire Company, she called the State Police who in turn notified the Eagle River and the Chugiak Fire Companies who both responded.

The fire had progressed beyond the point where anything but a few personal

The meeting had been called for the specific purpose of determining if the stockholders would authorize the Board of Directors to sell the assets of the corporation at the best price obtainable.

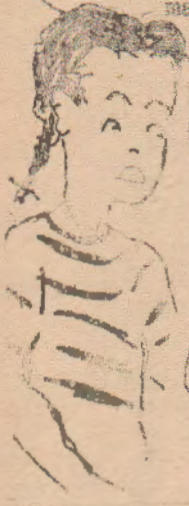

Margaret's career as a poet began back when she was a child. Her first published poem was when she was in the seventh grade in her home town newspaper.

Since then she has had many poems appear in print including some in the Ladies Home Journal and other national publications.

Margaret and her husband John came to Alaska in 1940 from Montana where they both taught on Indian reservations.

They lived on Elmendorf Air Force until October of 1962 when John retired from Civil Service and they moved onto their homesite in Lower Peters Creek Delta.

Margaret raised six children in Alaska, the two oldest girls are now married and she can now boast of eight grandchildren.

Margaret is very proud of her family. Her twin sons Bob and Bill attend East Anchorage High School and are looking forward to attending Chugiak High. They have both been playing on the Community Basketball team, getting experience toward playing on Chugiak's first varsity. Her youngest son Frank is in the eighth grade at the Chugiak School.

Margaret still has one unmarried daughter who is presently attending Montana State University in her first year.

Margaret has not been in the community long enough to be in any local clubs, but is

WASHINGTON DC: In Alaska, only 2.8 per cent of the total population consists of persons 65 years of age and over, the Social Security Administration reported this week.

This is by far the lowest figure for any state (Hawaii with 5.2 per cent, Nevada with 5.6 and New Mexico with 5.7 being next) and second only to Guam with 1.7 per cent among all government units under the U.S. flag.

For the nation as a whole, 9.4 per cent of the population is 65 and over.

"Oldest" states are Iowa, with 12.1 per cent of the

RADIO CLUB

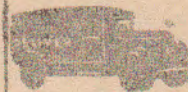

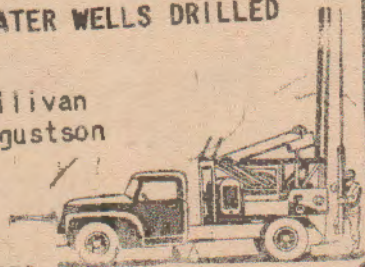

son left (with fire extinguishers) to help Mr. Gibson, who was trying desperately to save some of their belongings.

When neither 674-5555 nor 674-5233 responded to repeated ringing, I called the State Police at Eagle River, approximately 4:30am. He and the Eagle River Fire Company lost no time in arriving at the scene and for this they deserve high commendation. The Chugiak Fire Company also came after being notified. But the time lost when Time was essential created a great loss for Mr. and Mrs. Gibson.

In calling several of my friends and neighbors I have discovered a great many people do not know that the corrected numbers given us by your paper are no longer correct. Those numbers are disconnected.

I was informed that MTA had enclosed notices of the correct numbers on a "pink slip" with the telephone bills. I did not receive a pink slip nor did several of my neighbors.

I am not saying that the Gibson home could have been saved. I do not know. I can only assume Time was a major factor.

I am saying that whenever Emergency numbers are disconnected or changed the public should be so informed in big, black, bold type, public notices in stores etc. and any other available means.

A person could die at the telephone while trying to reach help via a disconnected number.

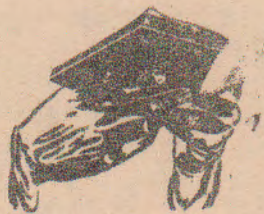

FEWER THAN HALF A ALASKANS VOTE

WASHINGTON DC: In the first presidential election in which Alaska participated, only 45.5 percent of the civilian population of voting age cast ballots, the Presidents Commission on Registration and Voting Participation reported last week.

In Hawaii, 51.3 percent of the civilian population of voting age did vote in the first presidential election opportunity of the 50th State.

The National total was 63.8 percent voting.

High states were Idaho where 80.7 per cent voted Utah with 80.1 per cent,

power of areawide taxation which obviously cannot come until after all property is assessed and on the taxrolls. As yet there is no way to determine whether this can be accomplished in time for the 1964-65 school year.

In any event, the Greater Chugiak Area schools will be administered by one of the other during the 1964-65 year, since the State will be supplying funds for the operation for the coming year.

It will be necessary for the borough to supply approximately \$45,000 in addition to state funds to provide for additional cost of increase in staff salaries, school nurse, and special service of speech and hearing therapy, psychologist, visiting teachers, and audio visual consult- and for the Greater Chugiak Area Schools.

Representatives of the City of a realtors committee and two individuals expressed their general views on the direction, scope and timing of boroughwide planning and zoning.

It was the tenor of all who spoke that this is one mandatory power which should not be assumed by the borough until after exhaustive study of the whole area has been made.

Forty persons signed up, signifying a desire to serve on an advisory planning and zoning board for the Greater Chugiak Area.

Last spring the pumper was pulled out of Walt Pipple's cellar for the last time. The firemen convinced Betty and Shirlee that a volunteer fire company operated on its own and independent of the Eagle River Improvement Association would be more practical and effective. With this transfer the Eagle River Improvement Association as a community organization became inactive.

Dedicated to a cause and without fanfare, the new organization moved fast gathering support of the community as it moved.

The Eagle River Lions Club purchased and donated a Plymouth ambulance. Raymond Tedrow provided use of land for a new fire hall. A 1946 Ford Tanker and a 1952 GMC pumper were acquired and put into operation condition. General Supply Co. designated and furnished materials for a new fire hall at cost with funds brought in from donations and fire protection memberships.

During three week-ends late November the fourteen active firemen and some volunteer community help erected a 28'x40' fire station, insulated and heated.

On Thanksgiving day the pumper, tanker and ambulance were backed into the new quarters ready to respond to the first fire and emergency call.

During the calendar year 1963 forty-one fire runs, including brush fires and 18 ambulance runs were made. Fire company meetings are held the first Tuesday of each month. Skull practice consumes only a part of the peeting time of Fire Chief

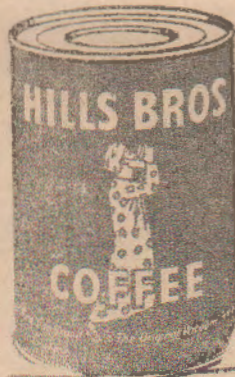

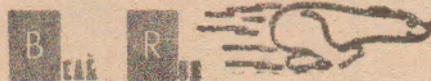
