LOCAL ASSEMBLYMAN DRAWS THREE

YEAR TERM

ANCHORAGE: Glenn Briggs, Borough Assemblyman from Section One (which includes the area from Eagle River Bridge to the Knik River Bridge) will serve a three year term of office as the result of a drawing held at the Borough Assembly meeting last Monday night.

The term which Briggs will serve will end in October of 1966.

Terms of other assemblyman are; one year terms, ending October 1964, Jerry McCutcheon, Section 3, William M. Shear, Section six; two year terms, ending October of 1965, Walter Jerde Section 2, and Mable Crawford, of Section 5. The remaining three year term was drawn by John Gill of Section 4.

A report from borough Chairman Asplund told of the results of the studies and conferences of the nine Alaska borough Chairmen held recently in June. Eighteen meetings held with legislators, local Affairs Agency and Local Affairs Committee resulted in recommendations to the Legislature for fifteen changes in the Borough Act.

Borough Assessor Glenn McKee reported that his full staff of six assessors are in the field for the task of assessing the real property heretofore not on the tax rolls. No speculation was made as to length of time which will be required to complete this assessment.

claimed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, in 1938.

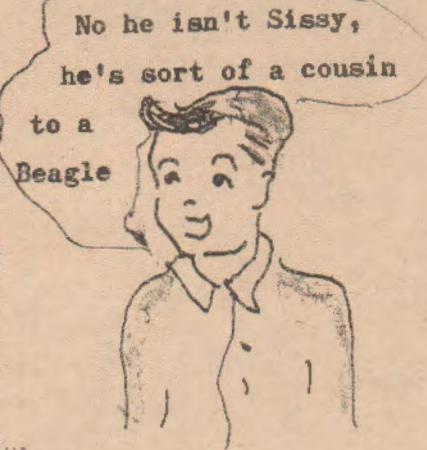
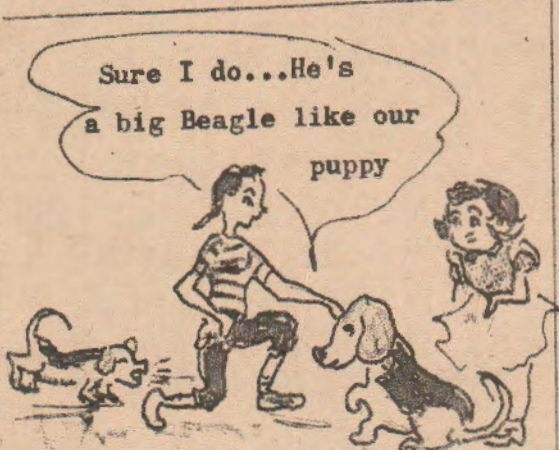
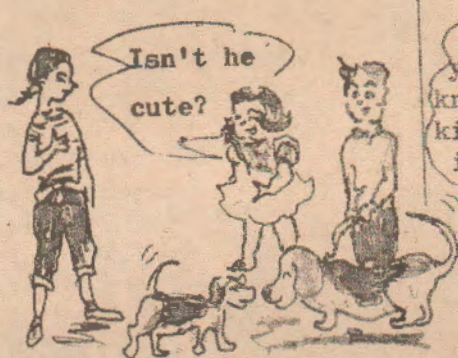
Since that time it has annually focused public attention on the importance of natural resource conservation, and has also highlighted specific conservation issues.

THE COOK OF THE MONTH

When we learned that our cook for March was Italian born we looked forward to some authentic Italian recipes, but Daniela Adams confessed that when she came to America three years after her marriage to Frank Adams she didn't even know how to make coffee.

It was a great change from her city life near the border of Italy and Austria and Yugoslavia and the remote Montana ranch that was her first American home. It was here that Danny learned to cook ... American farm style. Any Italian recipes she may now offer us come from the many Italian magazines to which she subscribes.

Although Danny is now a professional cook and dietitian at the Eagle River School where she is lunch room manager; she trained as a professional photographer and worked at her trade up until the time she came to America. Now she considers photography just a hobby.

The Adams family came to Alaska in 1957, and after a brief stay in Homer, came to the Chugiak area where they made their home in the Tedrow subdivision in Eagle River.

The Adams children are six in number, Claude 21, John 16, Frank Jr. 15, Pat 13, Mary 11 and Betty 10. Five still live at home with the sixth married with two children, making Danny a very youthful grandmother.

Alaskan life for the Adams' included a period of homesteading in the Chickaloon area, where the pioneer cooking methods that Danny learned in Montana proved very useful.

Being active in community life is important to Danny, and she helped organize the first girl scout troop in the Eagle River area and has assisted the school nurse and is active in PTA and in the St. Andrews Altar Society.

Our March Cook has been able to accomplish so many different things because she

firmly believes that a person can accomplish anything just by trying hard enough.

We feel that this philosophy is one we all might benefit by following and hope we can learn from Danny as we spend the next month in her kitchen.

For her first recipe, Danny offers an Italian spiced swiss steak that will give an added ZING to that moose or even to beef.

ITALIAN SWISS STEAK

- 2 pounds lean round steak
 - 2 tbs. bacon drippings
 - 5 medium sized onions
 - Marjoram-thyme, garlic salt and pepper
 - 1/2 cup condensed beef bouillon
 - 1 cup red wine
 - 1 cup mushrooms
 - 1/2 tbs flour
- FRY onions in heavy skillet with bacon drippings until brown
REMOVE to separate dish

REMOVE all gristle and fat from meat
SAUTE in same dripping until browned on all sides
SPRINKLE flour and a generous pinch of salt and other spices over browned beef
ADD bouillon and wine
STIR mixture well
SIMMER over low heat for 2 1/2 hours
(If necessary to reduce heat use an asbestos mat under skillet)
ADD more bouillon and wine as liquid cooks down.
ADD browned onions and mushrooms after 2 1/2 hours.
COOK additional 30 minutes.

DANGERS OF DETERGENTS EXPLAINED

PALMER: "There has been a national concern regarding detergents for the past five years and at least ten states have been considering legislation that would prevent use of detergents of the higher foaming kind", Miss Agnes Sunnell, Home Economics leader for the University of Alaska Extension Service stated at a meeting of homemakers club leaders in Palmer last week.

It isn't that the detergents are bad its their after effects that are causing difficulty.

Detergents are such effective washing compounds that manufacturers are working on research that will improve their decomposition time so that the undesirable effects that cause foaming faucets will be corrected.

Even though Alaska does not so far have the problems that have been found in densely populated areas; Alaska should be concerned about its water supply.
