RIVER SCHOOL SUFFERS GREATEST

HOME BURNS FOLLOWING QUAKE

BIRCHWOOD: A private home located off Inlet Drive in Birchwood burned to the ground following last Friday's earthquake.

The home belonged to Ed Beatty, who had left it only minutes before to go check upon a neighbor, to determine if she had been injured in the quake.

Beatty said that he had turned off the fuel oil leading to his heater before leaving. When he re-

BOROUGH BUDGET MUST BE RE-EVALUATED

ANCHORAGE: The Assembly of the Greater Anchorage Area dorough met on Monday evening along with members of the Anchorage ity Council and representatives of the Borough School Board.

It was agreed that the entre proposed budget must be re-evaluated in light of last Friday's disaster-ous earthquake.

The foremost consideration is to get the area schools back in operation.

Although the building at Third Avenue and C Street which housed the offices of the Greater Anchorage

CHUGIAK: While Anchorage and other Alaskan cities laydevastated from the Good Friday earthquake, the Greater Chugiak area escaped with comparatively minor damage.

The greatest apparent damage was to the Eagle River School, where the two end walls of the multi-purpose room are cracked and leaning inward approximately four feet at the tops.

The Section of the Eagle River Shopping Center that houses the Valu City store suffered structural damage and broken windows.

A small concrete block building at mile 13½, which was formerly a laundry and which presently served as a warehouse for Valu City, had one complete wall fall outward.

A concrete block wall in an unfinished building at the Wallace Concrete Products plant at mile 18½ was damaged.

Other local damage appeared to be limited to breakage in homes and business establishments as this ten mile long community "rolled with the punch."

Chuck Smith, speaking for the local school system, said that there would be no school at either of the two local elementary schools until all buildings were thoroughly inspected by structural and construction engineers of

However, we were unfortunately low on paper and other vital supplies.

It is very possible that it may be a long time before an unlimited supply of paper and ink may be available in the Anchorage area, and until the exact situation becomes known we will ration what little we have 4 110 on hand.

We hope that some kind of paper will be available until regular supplies are once more in stock.

We may be forced to return to printing on single sheets stapled at one corner, and even to printing on whatever size or color we can beg borrow or steal.

This we do promise; as long as any paper of any kind or any ink is available, there will be a Knik Arm Courier.

Some more drastic measures such as printing every two weeks instead of weekly may become necessary. We forsee that some of the more frivolous features (such as Dear Martha. Little Midge or the Cook of the Nonth) may have to be eliminated until the emergency has passed. However

all members of a survey team which were presently checking all school buildings in the quake area.

Smith said that numerous cracks had appeared in the walls of the classroom section of the Eagle River School and in the primary building at the Chugiak School. The main building of the Chugiak, School which is not of concrete block construction showed no visible damage .

Bill Benyish, Chugiak School principal, reported that two days after the quake, the water supply at the school apparently disappeared. An inspection is in progress to determine the cause of this.

The Chugiak High School which is presently under construction in the Birchwood area, showed no visible damage from the quake. Smith said that at this time he had no way of knowing if the quake will in any way delay the completion of this building.

The Eagle River Bowl appeared to be undamage from the quake and a report from Kenai indicated that the In Kenai Bowl, which is also owned by Bush Lanes Inc. was also undamaged.

Glenn Briggs, spokesman for the Shopping Center Corp stated that the estimated damage to the building would run from \$3,00 to \$3,500.

Surprisingly, the section of the Shopping Center build ing which houses the Eagle River Post Office and the Pegge Lee Bakery did not. have any broken windows, or other apparent structural (Next et

CHUGIAK: The Greater Chugiak Area was without electric po er only a short time followi the Good Friday quake.

The power went off automatically as the violent tre ors rocked the area, and remained off until almost ten thirty that evening.

The power again went off approximately 1:30am and res ained off until after Sam Sa urday morning.

the quake had caused the ice of Lake Eklutna to shatter into smaller chunks and these were clogging the pensteck. e.

Residents of the Palmer area were without power for a longer period of time due the the power poles which cross the Matanuska Bridge being down.

Although residents of the area have not been asked to refrain from using any major appliances such as clothes dryers, all unnecessary lights and other uses should be kept at a minimum.

Where were you when the earthquake struck? is the question everyone is ask-ing his neighbor these days.

Most of the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area were in their homes at dinner when the shaking of the earth drove them out of door

However, many had taken accountage of the school holida; to take their families to Anchorage and were in that ill fated city when the quake struck.

Chuck Smith, local school official had just returned from a rabbit hunting trip near Chitna and had stopped at a store in the Muldoon area close to his home. He was waiting in his car for his young son who he had sent into the store to buy a newspaper when the ground began to shake. As the intensity of the quake increased he saw a man run from the building carrying the boy just as the wall behind them collapsed.

Many of those who worked in Anchorage and at the bases were enroute home at the time. Those in cars admitted that they at first believed something had gone wrong with the steering mechanism of their car as the vehicles became increasingly difficult to control.

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Bellringer and their three small daughters were in the balcony of the Fourth Avenue theater at the time. The main feature a Walt Disney cartoon "The Sword in the Stone" had just begun when

the building began to shake

. As the intensity of the quake continued to increase screams of frightened children filled the darkened building while the film continued to be projected on a screen that resembled a rug that was being shaken.

Elmer Richardson of Fire Lake was on the roof of the Lathrop Building constructing a greenhouse at that time.

Mrs. Til Wallace who is an employee of Bagoys Flor-ists was in that store and had just scrambled to safety when the land on which that building was located broke loose and fell.

Bruce Robinson of Peters Creek was approximately thirty feet under water in a cell at the site of the Matanuska-Knik River bridge construction when the quake began.

Despite the many dangerous positions in which the
above found themselves;
there were no reported casualties among local residents, and life in this community continues much the
same as it did before the
quake.







The crack was the aftermath of Friday's earthquake.


