## HIGH SCHOOL COMPLETION FACES DELAY

### BOROUGH ASSESSOR MEETS WITH LOCAL LAND OWNERS

EAGLE RIVER: Glenn McKay, assessor for the Great Anchorage Area Borough and assistant Jack Long met Sunday at the home of Glenn Briggs Assemblyman from section one, with twenty seven land owners of the Peters Creek, Old Chugiak, Eagle River and upper Eagle River Areas to explain the general procedure being followed in the appraisal of real property and to work out a schedule of meetings between local property owners and the Assessor's staff.

Mr. McKay restated as his policy and philosophy in appraising property, "that people of an area make the value of an area and that a practical evaluation of property can only be made after consultation with the people of the area."

Appraising of homes of the Birchwood and Peters Creek area has been completed. A meeting of real property owners will be held Saturday May 2 at the Russell Oberg home to consider values of farm land small tracts, subdivisions and business property of that area.

A meeting of property owners is planned soon to consider values of business property and subdivisions in the Eagle River Area.

Dear Mr. Briggs,  
I have never written a letter before to a representative of the people in any branch of government, but I feel this is important enough to take the little time and effort needed to express my feelings.

I have always been a strong advocate of the sales tax as the most equitable form of taxation. I have also been a confirmed enemy of the personal property tax. We the people voted for a second class borough for the same reason we voted

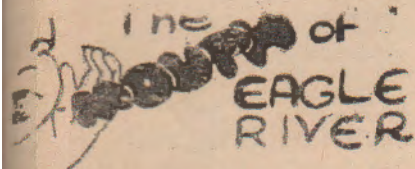

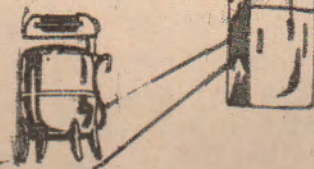

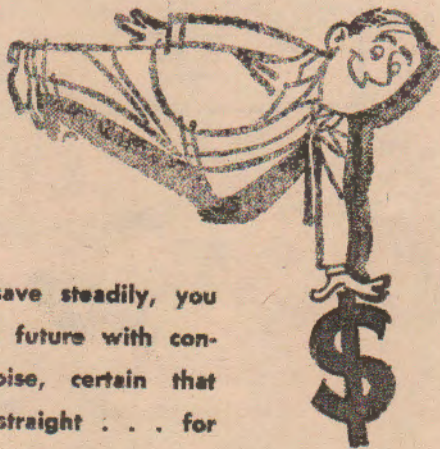

**NEW BOND BEARS  
KENNEDY PORTRAIT**

ANCHORAGE: "Local banks are stocking up on the new \$75 Series E Savings Bonds which goes on sale here May 1, "Volunteer Area Chairman Joyce Kertulla said today.

"The new \$75 bond bears a portrait of the late President Kennedy", the Chairman continues, "and fills a gap in the lower denomination range of Savings Bonds."

The chairman pointed out that Savings Bonds of each denomination bear portraits of deceased chief executives. "While not a memorial to the late president, beneath the portrait the bond carries the words, from his inaugural address: "Ask not what your country can do for you - ask what you can do for your country."

"The issue date of May 1 coincides with the launching of Operation Security, a nationwide Savings Bonds campaign which runs until July 4.

"In anticipation of a heavy demand for the new bond, many banks throughout the nation will accept orders before May 1st, from those purchasers who may want an early date of issue to appear in the validating stamp;" the chairman concluded.

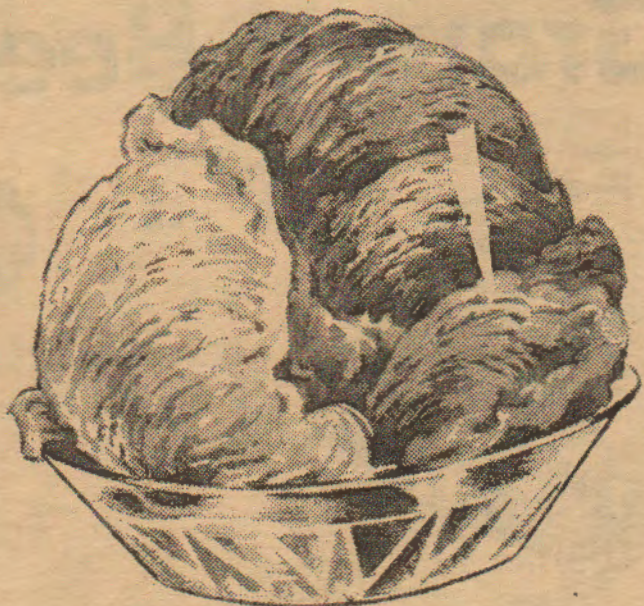

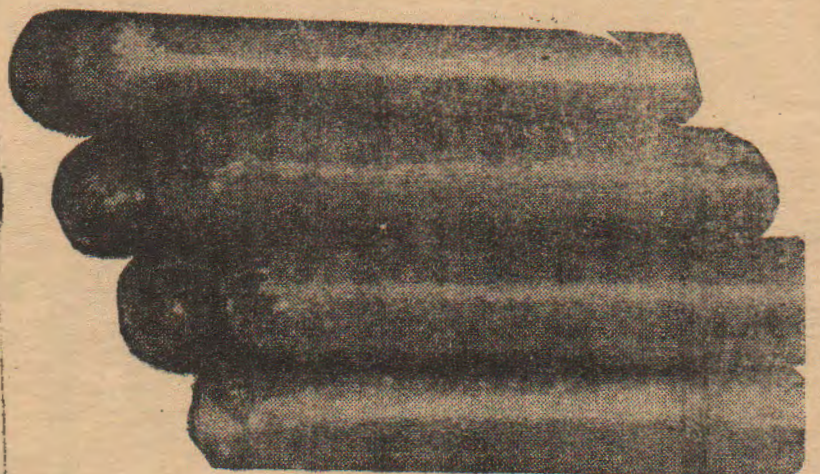

against any borough. We had seen what happened with the gas turbine in Anchorage and did not want the same thing happening in the borough. We felt in a borough with Anchorage we needed a voice in any new taxation. Is this voice not to be taken away from us? I feel the people in this area have enough common sense to give the borough assembly what is needed to operate, but I feel we should also be given the opportunity.

I hear many tales of people leaving Alaska since the earthquake, but I also feel such action as was taken by the borough assembly on the sales tax issue will have more to do with moving people out of the state than any earthquake.

I have always felt that the city of Anchorage could have had tax relief and tax help from us outside the city by offering the people a sales tax ordinance eliminating the personal property tax. Many of us use some of the city's services occasionally, have young adults using the city's high schools and we have not been helping to carry the load.

The sales tax, I feel would have been the answer. None of us want to or expect something for nothing.

We came to Alaska because we wanted to; we remain here also because we want to, but please give us the opportunity to help build the state. Don't take our voice away from us.

out benefit of referendum. Yours is the first written expression I have received on any actions taken by the Assembly. In the past I have urged the people of this area to voice their opinions and I hope others will do so in the future.

It is a moot issue now since as you may know, the Legislature tabled the proposed legislation. However at the Assembly session held last Monday the vote again was 7 to 4 in favor of sales tax as the companion revenue source of real property tax. It will be put to the voters and I am fearful of the consequence even though elimination of the personal property tax would be assured if the voters favored the sales tax.

You may be aware of the fact but many are not I am sure that property taxes in Anchorage and the Independent School District were before the quake 30% higher than the national average.

Unless some other source is tapped the remnant of the Greater Anchorage area tax base would be obliged to assume an intolerable tax increase to support the budgets of the existing services. What effects the Anchorage tax base also directly effects us - our schools.

Practically speaking we have only two alternative methods of tax assessment in addition to the real property tax, namely, personal property and sales. I have not talked to a person who does not resent the personal property tax

for numerous good reasons.

Due process requires a minimum of seventy days, and for the Borough, \$10,000 to get an expression from the people at the poles. Budgets for the 1964-65 school year are prepared in May. Suppose on June 1, the voters turned down the sales tax as a revenue source to help support even an austere school budget? Should we then arbitrarily boost the mill rate on property to provide funds required for the current educational program or should we slash the school program to the extent required if operating funds are limited to the existing available revenues?

It will be several years before the Anchorage area regains its pre-March 27th tax base and I believe there will be a real exodus of property owners and

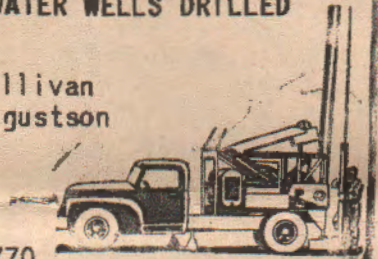
Smith said that he expected the repair to be completed by the end of the week and the hot lunch program resumed by next Monday.

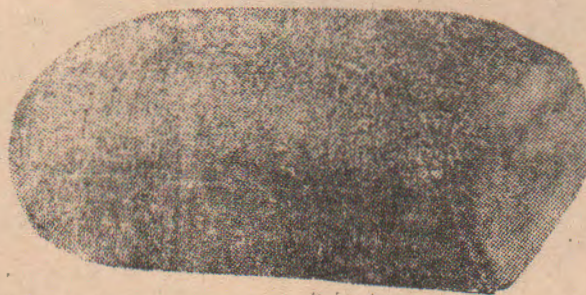
