# HIGH SCHOOL COMPLETION FACES DELAY

BOROUGH ASSESSOR MEETS WITH LOCAL LAND OWNERS







against any borough. We had seen what happened with the gas turbine in Anchorage and did not want the same thing happening in the borough. We felt in a borough with Anchorage we needed a voice in any new taxation. Is this voice not to be taken away from us? I feel the people in this area have enough common sense to give the borough assembly what is needed to operate, but I feel we should also be given the opportunity.

I hear many tales of people leaving Alaska since the earthquake, but I also feel such action as was taken by the horough assembly on the sales tax issue will have more to do with moving people out of the state than any earthquake.

I have always felt that the city of Amchorage could have had tax relief and tax help from us outside the city by offering the people a sales tax ordinance eliminating the personal property tax. Many of us use some of the city's services occasionally, have young adults using the city's high schools and we have not been helping to carry the load.

The sales tax, I feel would have been the answer. None of us want to or expect something for nothing.

We came to Alaska because we wanted to; we remain here also because we want to, but please give us the opportunity to help build the state. Don't take our voice away from us.

I sincerely appreciate receiving your reasonable expression of opposition to any proposed arbitrary legislation and in this particular case, sales tax with-

out benefit of referendum. Yours is the first written expression I have received on any actions taken by the Assembly. In the past I have urged the people of this area to voice their opinions and I hope others will do so in the future.

It is a moot issue now since as you may know, the Legislature tabled the proposed legislation. However at the Assembly session held last Monday the vote again was 7 to 4 in favor of sales tax as the companion revenue source of real property tax. It will be put to the voters and I am fearful of the consequence even though elimination of the personal property tax would be assured if the voters favored the sales tax.

You may be aware of the fact but many are not I am sure that property taxes in Anchorage and the Independent School District were before the quake 30% higher than the national average.

Unless some other source s tapped the remnant of the Greater Anchorage area tax base would be obliged to assume an intoleerable tax increase to support the budgets of the existing services. What effects the Anchorage tax base also directly effects us - our schools.

Practically speaking we have only two alternative methods of tax assessment in addition to the real property tax, namely, personal property and sales. I have not talked to a person who does not resent the personal property tax

for numerous good reasons. Due process requires a minimum of seventy days, and for the Borough, \$10, 000 to get an expression from the people at the poles. Budgets for the 1964-65 school year are prepared in May. Suppose on June 1, the voters turned down the sales tax as a revenue source to help support even an austere school budget? Should we then arbitrarily boost the mill rate on property to provide funds required for the current educational program or should we slash the school program to the extent required if operating funds are limited to the existing available reven-

It will be several years before the Anchorage area regains its pre-March 27th tax base and I believe. there will be a real exodus of property owners and

An elected representative must act on his own best judgement in lieu of specific direction from the electorate. I happen to believe that well educated children are our greatest asset and for this reason voted with those who felt it might conceivably be necessary to impose a sales tax to provide the revenue to assure sustained high standards of education. This we did knowing criticism which no one relishes could be expected.

I am not only willing, but feel obligated to justify the voters of our area any and all decisions made as their representative on

the Assembly.
