#### No. 3- CORDOVA:

We visited Cordova Alaska one year after the fire and three weeks after the great earthquake.

Both disasters had left their mark on that city which had seen little change for many years.

Established in 1908, the city (we were told) was named after Cordova Spain a place which was much admired by one of the engineers who had laid out the town.

Clinging to the rocky slopes of the low hills which lie at the base of

mighty snowcapped mountains, Cordova depends enirely upon fishing for its economy.

At one time it was the terminus of the Copper River Railroad, which brought ore from the mines inland. With the closing of the mines, and and abandonment of the railroad, Cordova became the isolated little fishing village it is today, accessable only by the sea.

Hopes of a road connecting it to other parts of Alaska have been dashed by the earthquake which

With the transmitters attached, the birds are released and their movements followed with radio tracking equipment.

This method gives excellent information on more aspects of wildlife behavior, the biologists say, than the band and tag system.

It helps them learn more about feeding, preferred habitat, mating behavior and other problems vital to grouse management.





severly damaged much of the road and bridges which were under construction. Cordovans can now only wait and see whether or not the State will resume that project.


The fire which occurred last year had wiped out most of the main business center of the city, but the fire gutted buildings are gene now, and are replaced by modern structures of concrete and steel. Wooden sidewalks provide dry footing for pedestrians, although in many parts of the town these have rotted away and not been replaced.





The town, which suffered se badly by the fire last year, was mercifully spared of any structural damage by the Good Friday earthquake.

Evidence tends to indicate that the quake could not have been as severe as it was in the Anchorage area, else none of the flimsy structures with their spindly pilings and crumbling chimneys would have remained standing.

Most of the damage to the area was to the road bed. The road to the airport has sunk in many places, and cars and other vehicles have to crawl cautioualy over the sagging bridges.

The most serious effect the quake will have on the City of Cordova, is at the waterfront, which now has stretches of mudflats

#### PUBLIC OPINION POLL SHOWS MAJORITY FAVOR SALES TAX

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

#### WALRUS OBSERVED 'IN KNIK RIVER

EKLUTNA:: On April 20<sup>th</sup> workmon on the Knik River cross ing bridge contacted the department of Fish and Game in Palmer and reported seeing what appeared to be a walrus floating on a cake of ice in the river.

A representative of the Department of Fish and Game investigated and mady a positive identification as a female walrus weighing an estimated 800 pounds and possibly six or seven years old.

The animal was observed but no attempt was made to capture it, and the following day, the walrus and her ice cake were gone, presumably having floated out on the receding tide.

A spokesman for the Department of Fish and Game said that this is the first time a walrus has been seen in this area and never in fresh water. He speculated that the animal and the ice cake may have been carried in on the tidal wave which followed the earthquake. (cordova con page 11 col 3)


Studies show that most of the unemployed are those lacking a good education. good education for the fut ure means having specific skills beyond that provided by a high school education.

The person who is now per manently employed is the person who can offer specific skills beyond the lab level.

"Actually the number of laborers required in our society is going down," Can said. The need for trainer workers in the service occupations, trades and profbessions is going up.

An education pays about 17% on the investment, far better than other forms of money investment, accordin to studies that have been made. For example, a back elor of science degree is worth on the average of \$125,000 on the day of grad uation in terms of increased lifetime earning capacity over a high school diploma.

"Thus hoys and girls who want a bright future should prepare for it now, by getting a good education," Cad concluded.
