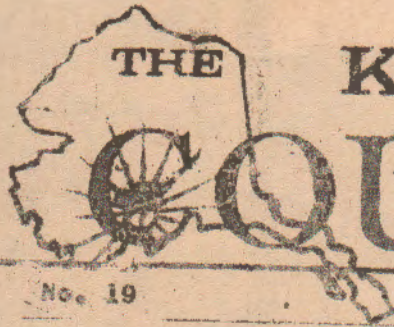

COOK FOR MAY

NITA BAKER

The recipe we get from Nita this week is an original one, which at one time she had planned to enter in the Pillsbury baking contest.

SPICY-NANA CAKE

- 2 1/4 cups sugar
- 3/4 cups butter or oleo
- 3 eggs
- 3 cups flour
- 3/4 tsp salt
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 5 large bananas mashed
- 1 1/2 cups sour milk
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 2 tsp. lemon flavoring
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1 tsp. nutmeg

BEAT sugar & butter until light and fluffy
 ADD eggs one at a time
 BEAT well
 COMBINE flour, salt baking powder in separate bowl
 COMBINE bananas, milk, soda lemon and spices in another bowl
 ADD banana mixture and flour mixture alternately to sugar & butter
 BEAT well
 GREASE loaf pan or layer cake pan
 LINE with waxed paper
 BAKE at 350°
 90 minutes for loaf
 30-35 minutes for layer

Dubber will be replaced by Trooper Clifford J Ripperger, who will assume his duties the first of June, the time when Dubber's transfer becomes effective.

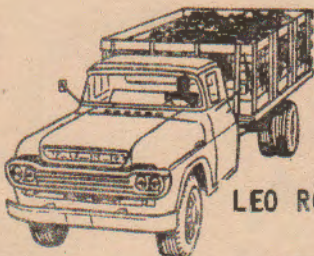
Trooper Jack Allen will continue to be stationed in this area.

Bill Stephens, of Peters Creek was elected to the office of assistant Fire Chief.

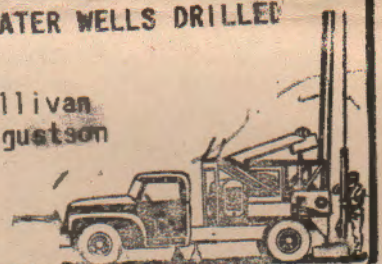

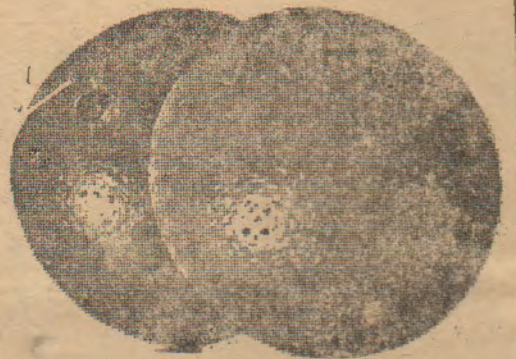

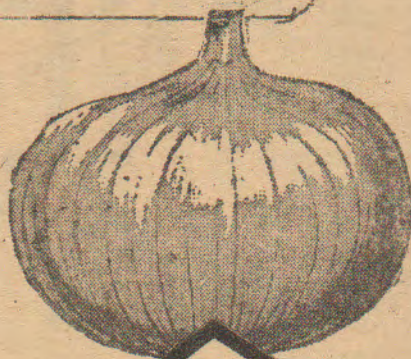

Anyone planning to burn is requested to contact the Fire Company in which area the burning is to take place and to give the following information: Location (by lot number if possible) time burning is to take place, water supply available and what access roads are available.

John Kuphaldt, Chugiak Fire Chief, reminded that anytime the Fire Company is called to put out a brush or grass fire, the person on whose property the fire is located will be billed \$250 for the call. This does not apply to those who have paid their \$10 annual subscription fee to the Fire Company.

The fire companies also request that when anyone reports any fire they attempt to get full details if possible, in order that the firemen may have an idea of the extent of and nature of the blaze and can determine what equipment may be needed.

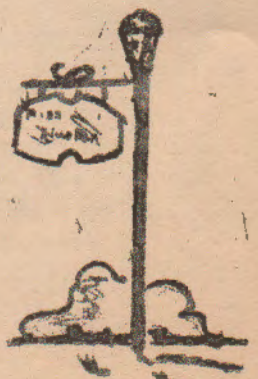
