Relatively few sales of business frontage and lets in the newer subdivisions offer no guide to worth of such property.

Owners of subdivisions and homosteads in the upper Eagle River area will meet with the Assessors
Staff in Room 11 of the Pagls River School at Spm on Friday May 8th to express their views on land values.







Tell it to Martha

Dear Martha,

Every summer our kids nag us for one of those back yard swimming pools.

This year their grandparents offered to buy them one for a combined birthday present.

My husband is very much against it. He says that we won't be able to keep the neighbor children out and we will never be able to call our home our own again.

I say that we can make a rule that no one but our own children can use the pool....he says it won't work. What do you say?

Wants to swim

Dear Wants etc.

I'm afraid I will have to agree with you husband to a degree. An outdoor swimming pool, particularly in this part of the country is far too attract ive a item to keep to your self. Your children would be very unpopular with their friends if they had such a plaything and refused to share it.

However, I don't see why you can't have the pool if you make a few strict rules and stick to them.

First of all, be sure to have liability insurance.

Secondly, no one is to use the pool unless by invitation. Limit the number of guests your children may have at one time, and also limit the length of time that the guests may stay. Be sure to reserve certain times for just your family, when no guests may be invited. POROUGH MEETING REPORT By Glenn Briggs

ANCHORAGE: At the Monday night regular meeting of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough the proposed budget for the period April I to June 30 was passed on this, the fourth hearing.

Budgeted for the period is \$48,475.50, of which approximately one half is required by the Assessment Department.

As of July 1, 1964, \$92,166.00 of the original transitional grant made by the State to the Borough of \$186,000.00 will have been spent if all funds of the current three month budget is used.

The unbudgeted balance of \$93,833.50 should be sufficient to meet Borough expenses for the remainder of the calendar year.

The Assembly accepted the resignation of John Gill, Section 4 assembly man who has been transf erred to California.

Chairman John Asplund is requesting candidates from Section 4 to file for the position at an early date in order that the Assembly can fill the vacancy at the next regular session.

A mine-member Planning and Zening Interim Committee, four from Anchorage, and five from outlying areas, recommended by Chair man Aspland, was approved by the assembly. Ray Deditius an Eagle River resident was one of the five representing the outlying areas.

Frank Nyman a member of the firm of Tryck, Nyman and Associates and acting as spokesman for the Greater Anchorage Sever Study Committee, sought the support of Greater Anchorage Area Borough in an attack on the sever problem of the areas abutting the City.

Nyman pointed out that the problem area lies out-






