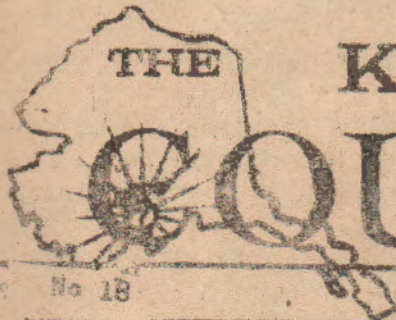


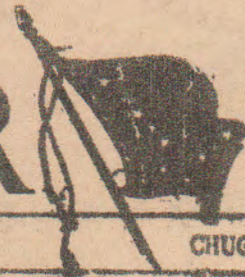

CLINE NAMED CHUGIAK HIGH PRINCIPAL

LOCAL PROPERTY OWNERS MEET WITH TAX ASSESSORS

CHUGIAK: Twenty property owners of the Birchwood, Peters Creek and Old Chugiak areas met with Borough Assessor Glenn McKee at the Russell Oberg home at mile 21½ Saturday evening in an attempt to arrive at fair values of unimproved small tracts, subdivisions and farmland

Sunday afternoon. Assessor McKee and Assistant Jack Long, met at the home of Bob Schroeder with sixteen owners of subdivisions and business frontage in the Eagle River Area. Establishing values for assessment purposes in the older, better developed subdivisions pose no greater problems for the reason that recent sales of lots pretty much establish values.

Relatively few sales of business frontage and lots in the newer subdivisions offer no guide to worth of such property.

Owners of subdivisions and homesteads in the upper Eagle River area will meet with the Assessors Staff in Room 11 of the Eagle River School at 8pm on Friday May 8th to express their views on land values.

Assessor McKee admits the difficulty of arriving at realistic values for much of the land of the Greater Chugiak Area. Following the local hearings and af-

For the next five years from 1957 until 1961 he taught at Kenai.

In 1962 he took leave to complete his Masters at Appalachian State Teachers College in Boone North Carolina.

In the fall of 1963 he returned to Alaska to become the principal of the Eagle River School.

His wife Mary is a teacher at the Chugiak School in the third grade.

The Cline's and their two children reside at mile 22 in Peters Creek.

Smith, who Cline is replacing, resigned last week to accept the post of superintendent of the Bristol Bay Borough Sch-

For many of them it will be their first venture into being in business for themselves, and we hope that all of our readers will give them

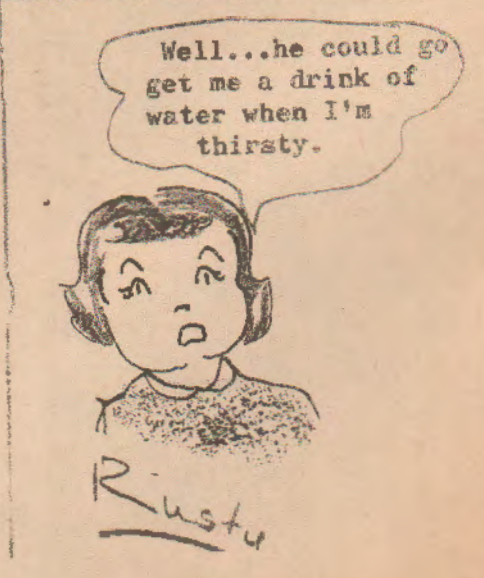

Some of our most loyal Alaskan residents are those who at one time left the state, only to find the place they thought they were homesick for was not nearly so attractive as our "Great Land".

This is the story of our cook for May and her family

A busy mother has little time for hobbies, but Nita uses every spare minute to make warm Canadian knit sweaters for her brood.

We enjoyed our visit with Nita and will also enjoy sharing some of the secrets of her kitchen.

If you have trouble keeping up with your family in the cookie baking department, Nita suggests this recipe which makes approximately 16 dozen...enough to satisfy any hungry brood....for a while.

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

- 2 cups brown sugar
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 2 cups shortening
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 4 eggs (beaten)
- 2 cups peanut butter
- 6 cups flour
- 4 tsp soda
- Dash Salt

BEAT sugars, shortening & vanilla until creamy
BEAT in eggs & peanut butter

ADD flour, salt & soda
MIX well

ROLL into small balls
PLACE on greased cookie sheet

FLATTEN with fork dipped in flour

BAKE at 375° for 10 to 15 minutes.

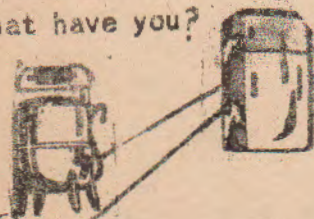

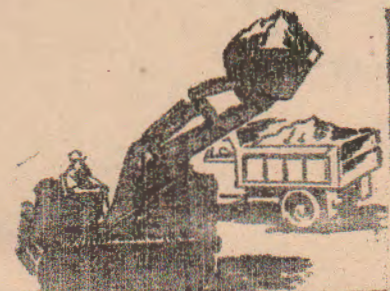

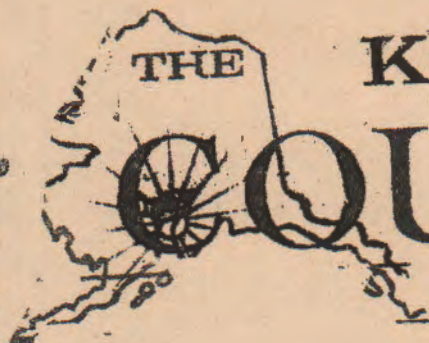

CBA SEEKS TO BRING DUMP PROBLEM TO PROMPT SOLUTION

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Benefit Association met last night at the home of President Bruce Robinson and agreed to attempt to bring the problem of relocating the local dump to a solution as soon as possible.

The land which the state had offered as an alternate site for the new sanitary fill was not regarded as too desirable by the board for the following reasons: The area was too small to accommodate any long term use; it is covered with many large beautiful birches and in close proximity to a section which has been subdivided for homes and no access road is leading to it.

The committee reported that an area of Federal Land has been located which is more suitable for a dump and is near a passable road and is (next col)

also large enough, being almost a quarter of a section.

The board will attempt to get the state to have this land reclassified.

The CBA will meet again on Monday, May 11th to decide which of the individuals who have applied for the contract to operate the dump will be awarded that contract.

Mothers have been asked to contribute cakes and baked goods for the cake walk and refreshment booth.

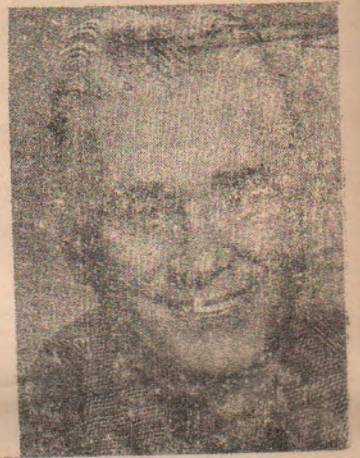

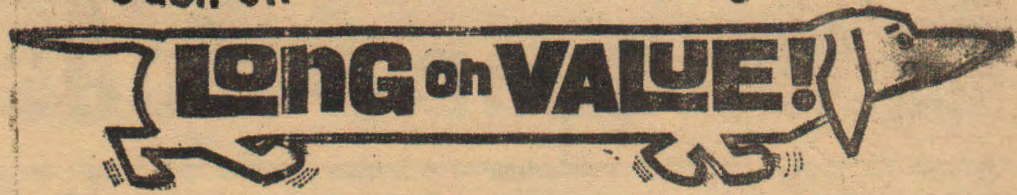

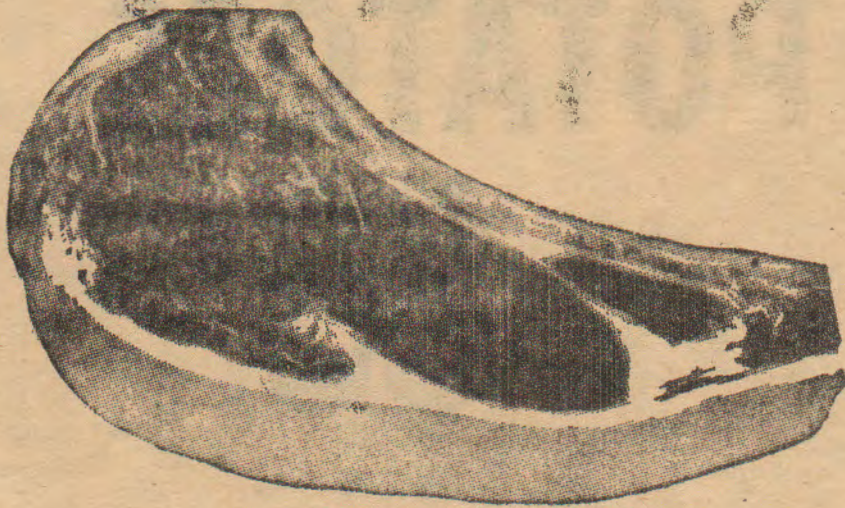

ter searching the records of the Recording Office and consultation of the Highway Department arbitrary values on all categories of land will be made. Prior to placing property on the tax rolls public hearings will be held locally to afford property owners of this area an opportunity to discuss and consider adjustments of appraisals arrived at by the Assessment Office.

The assessment date for the areas outside the Anchorage Independent School District has been set as July 1, 1964. An assessment in these areas for schools only will be made for the six-month period July 1 to December 30th, 1964. Collection date of taxes for this period will be October 1, 1964.

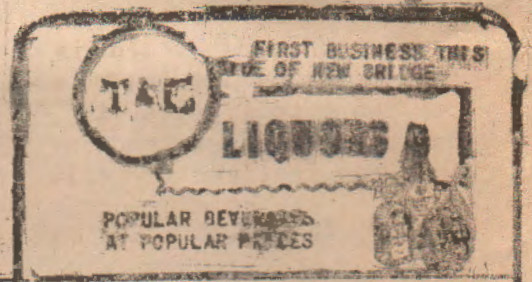

**BOROUGH MEETING
REPORT**
By Glenn Briggs

ANCHORAGE: At the Monday night regular meeting of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough the proposed budget for the period April 1 to June 30 was passed on this, the fourth hearing. Budgeted for the period is \$48,475.50, of which approximately one half is required by the Assessment Department.

As of July 1, 1964, \$92,166.00 of the original transitional grant made by the State to the Borough of \$186,000.00 will have been spent if all funds of the current three month budget is used.

The unbudgeted balance of \$93,833.50 should be sufficient to meet Borough expenses for the remainder of the calendar year.

The Assembly accepted the resignation of John Gill, Section 4 assemblyman who has been transferred to California.

Chairman John Asplund is requesting candidates from Section 4 to file for the position at an early date in order that the Assembly can fill the vacancy at the next regular session.

A nine-member Planning and Zoning Interim Committee, four from Anchorage, and five from outlying areas, recommended by Chairman Asplund, was approved by the assembly. Ray Dedittus an Eagle River resident was one of the five representing the outlying areas.

Frank Nyman a member of the firm of Tryck, Nyman and Associates and acting as spokesman for the Greater Anchorage Sewer Study Committee, sought the support of Greater Anchorage Area Borough in an attack on the sewer problem of the areas abutting the City.

Nyman pointed out that the problem area lies out-

side the jurisdiction of the City. He indicated that Federal Funds for a corrective project are available.

Chairman Asplund was instructed to arrange a meeting between the newly created Planning and Zoning Committee and the Sewer Study Committee to consider the problem.

Dr. Charles F. Shockey, Chief Sanitarian of the Greater Anchorage Health District appeared before the Assembly to urge that Health Services as a power of the Borough be placed on the ballot this fall.

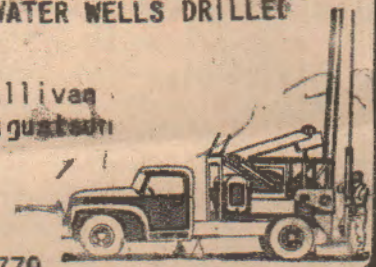

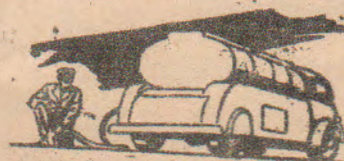

She said the short Course will be on the University Campus at College June 1-5.


Highlight of this year's program will be Miss Dorothy Emerson, long time 4-H leader in Maryland and now a consultant with the National 4-H Club Foundation.

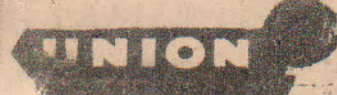

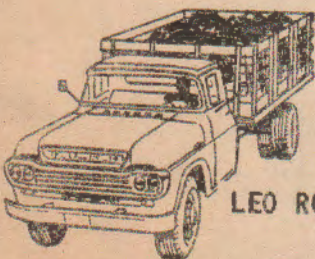
