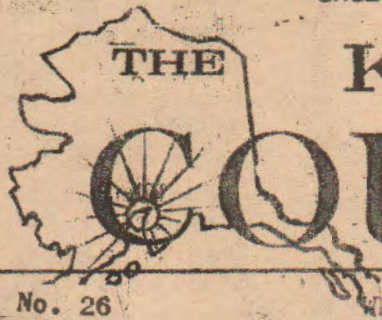

NEW TROOPER ON DUTY

CHUGIAK: The newest State Trooper assigned to patrol the Greater Chugiak Area has assumed his duties here.

Trooper Ripperger, who was previously assigned in Anchorage, is married with three children. He is making his home on Aurora Street in the Phillips subdivision in Eagle River.

He replaces Trooper Ken Dubber, who was recently transferred to Homer.

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company, now in the last week of its fund raising drive finds itself within 75% of the \$3,000 goal which has been set as the minimum operating cost for the coming fiscal year.

Members of the Birchwood Loopers Homemakers Club have been canvassing door to door and maintaining a collection booth at the Chugiak Post Office in an effort to obtain the ten dollar annual subscription fee from each family within the area served by the Fire Company.

This fee entitles the subscriber to fire protection and ambulance service by the Chugiak Volunteer Fire Company for one full year.

Non-subscribers will be charged a fee of \$250 for each fire or ambulance call.

Anyone residing within the area north of the line dividing the Eagle River and Chugiak voting precincts (including the communities of Fire Lake, Birchwood, Old Chugiak and Peters Creek) who has not yet paid their subscription may do so at any time during the next week at the Chugiak Post Office.

The drive officially closes on July 1st.

If the Fire Company had not been able to raise the \$3,000 the group had planned to disband.

ANGELS STILL THE FRONT TEAM

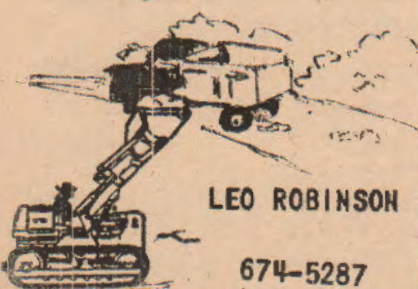

DON'T LET GARDEN CROPS PUSH EACH OTHER AROUND

PALMER: Crowded garden plants rob each other of food, water, and sun if too many are in too little space, Leland Cade, Extension agent reminds home gardeners.

"If too crowded, none of the vegetables can grow rapidly into the crisp, tender, flavorful morsels we hope to grow," he pointed out.

Some families like to take baby carrots, tender young leaf lettuce, beet greens and green onions from the row as the plants grow. This is fine, Cade said, as long as the family's appetite keeps up with the growth of the garden plants.

If not, it's better to waste a few vegetables in the young stage than to sacrifice quality and harvest misshapen root crops during the peak of production.

Early thinning promotes good growth of the remaining plants. It also insures less competition for food, water and air. And the roots of the plants left in the row are disturbed less if thinning is done when the plants are small.

After the job of thinning is done, give the row a good watering to settle the soil down around the roots again, Cade advised.

Suggested spacings for various garden vegetables can be found in University of Alaska Extension Bulletin No. 451, "Gardens in Alaska." The publication is available at the District Extension Office in Palmer.

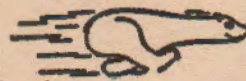

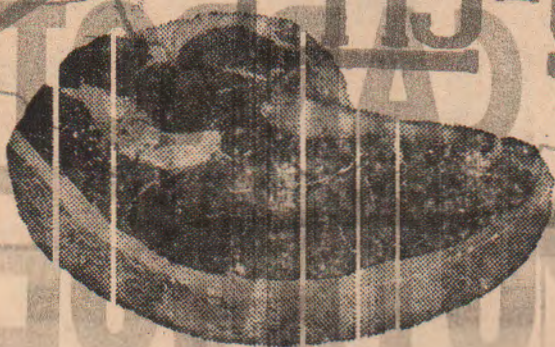

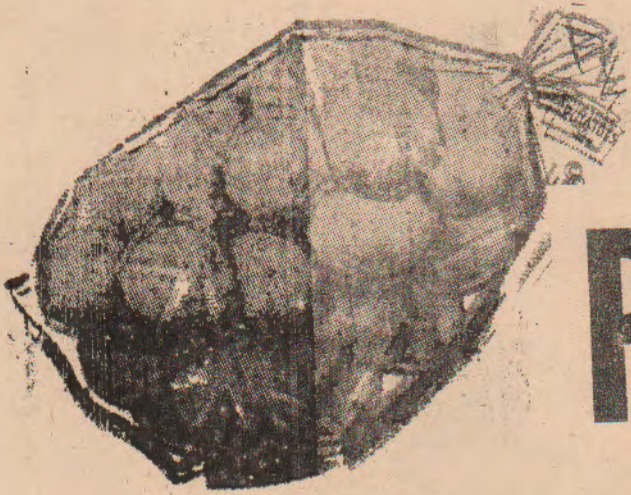

ANCHORAGE: All Library Services as the Z. J. Loussac Library in Anchorage are free to residents of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough, including the Greater Chugiak Area, Fort Richardson and Elmendorf Air Force Base.

Any residents of the above mentioned areas may secure a membership card which shall entitle the holder thereof to borrow books, periodicals, and other property from the library subject to the rule and regulations of the library.

No fee or deposit shall be required of such resident.

Every borrower is required to fill out a registration application, and present identification with a mailing address on it. If a borrower does not have identification, he will have to wait to take books until he receives the membership card which will be mailed to him.

All members of the family use the same card.

The first membership card is provided free; duplicates are available for 25¢ each.
