JUNEAU: Approval of the "A Route" realignment of the Glenn Highway between Eagle River and Peters Creek was announced today by Floyd Grant acting District Highway Engineer for the Anchorage District of the Department of Highways

Grant said that the final approval of the "A" Route was given last week by the Highway Commissioner and by the Bureau of Public Roads.

The "A" route leaves the present Glenn Highway just north of the Eagle River

CHUGIAK: Glenn Briggs,
Borough Assemblyman for
Section one has gone on
record as opposing any attempt to assess a personal
property tax for the residents of this area during
the six month tax period
beginning July 1st through
September 30%.

Briggs explained that according to Borough Law, the residents in all areas of the borough met be taxed on an equal basis.

Since the residents of the city of Anchorage and the Anchorage Independent School District are paying an personal property tax, so must the residents of areas outside the city and Independent School District pay an equal amount of tax until such time that the personal property tax is repealed by referendum.

Although Briggs recognizes the fact that the residents of this area are compelled by borough law to assume their fair share of the tax burden, he is against the establishment of a precedent of assessing a personal property tax during the six month period

It is his opinion, along with most of the other members of the Assembly that the voters will abolish the personal property tax boroughwide in the October referendum. He therefore is seeking some solution whereby the local residents can avoid paying the personal property tax and still

USE PESTICIDES SAFELY

PALMER: Spring and summer is the time of year when home owners and gradners use a variety of chemicals for the control of weeds and insects. "People who use chemicals are cautioned to use them properly" caccording to Leland Cade, District Extension Agent.

The first step in using any chemical is to read the label, and then follow directions. The label should be read each time the chem-

(pesticides)

ical is used, so that safety consciousness is maintained at a safe lavel.

Pesticides should always be stored where children cannot get to them. Depending on the chemical, pesticides may poison by being inhaled, getting on the body, or by being taken orally, or by any combination of these.

Children are unaware of the dangers of chemicals and so provisions must be (pesticides

made to keep the two separated.

Pesticides should always be stored in their original containers. This habit leaves no doubt about the reliability of the label, and minimizes the chances of error in associating a certain container with a chemical.

Food and pesticides should never be stored together. A container of pesticide can easily be mistaken for a can of food. Foods may absorb fumes or spilled quantities of pesticide.

Chemicals are safe to wae provided they are used properly. The best way to be safe is to follow instructions, take no chances, pay attention to cleanliness, storage and the possibility of accident.





Bridge and runs parallel to the Highway through the Birchwood area, rejoining the Glenn Highway at Peters Creek.

According to Grant the Route will be the same as shown on the maps at the public hearing held last fall, with the exception of a change to avoid the Chugiak High School now under construction.

Grant said that survey crews are expected to begin work on road design and other investigation within a few weeks. Aquisition of right of ways should be under way by this winter.

Grant said that advertisement for bids would not be until the next construction season, if that soon.

Of greater priority than the Chugiak re-alignment is the construction of the section of road which will connect the Echo Lake Road the the Matanuska-Knik complex now under construction.

Grant also mentioned a reconnaisance for a road which would connect the Peters Creek area with the new complex. This is in the initial stages of aerial surveys.

These resolutions, along with the 1964 - *65 school budget will be studied at a work session to be held June 15th, prepatory to final action on June 29th.

In a boroughwide referendum in October, voters will have an opportunity to determine what, if any additional powers are to be assumed by the borough, and what form of taxation in addition to real property tax will be adopted.

Requests have been made to the assembly that the services of Health, Lib-(next col) (borough)

Dog control and Fire protection, tection be assumed by the borough.

Rough estimates of the cost of such services are; Health, \$311,000; Library \$150,000, Police \$300,000, Dog control, \$25,000.

No figures as yet for ... fire protection.

Cost of these services will be reviewed and revised and cost in mill of taxation will be determined before voters go to the polls.
