KINDERGARTEN CLASSES BEGIN HERE TUESDAY

CHUGIAK: Kindergarten registration for the Chugiak Area Schools take place on Monday July 6th at both the Chugiak and the Eagle River Schools.

Registration will be from the hours of 9am through 12 noon, and from 1pm until 4pm.

To be eligible to attend the child must be 6 years old on or before November 1st of 1964. A birth certificate or other proof of age must be presented.

TIL WALLACE TO RUN FOR MTA BOARD

PALMER: The Matanuska Telephone Association has announced that Thilman Wallace will be the candidate from the Greater Chugiak Area to the Board of Directors of the MTA at the Annual Membership meeting to be held at the Palmer Central School Gym on August 1st.

Wallace lives at mile 18½ in Old Chugiak and is married. He operates the Wallace Concrete and Construction Company.

Other candidates are, R.J. Heddles, (Incumbant) from the Butte, Dennis Davidson from Wasilla, John Linnebur (Incumbant) from the Houston - Big Lake Area.

Additional nominations may be made from the floor at the time of the meeting.

CHUGIAK: Dr. Don DaFoe, Superintendent of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School System has announced that Robert P. Hayes has been appointed as the Principal of the Eagle River School.

Hayes, who has been a third grade teacher at the Sand Lake School in Anchorage, received his B. A. at San Jose State College in California. He later received his Masters degree at the University of Alaska.

In addition to teaching in the Anchorage Independent School District, he taught for the State of Alaska for 3 years at Fort Yukon and Afognak. He is married and at present makes his home in Anchorage. He will be replacing Frank Cline, who left that post to become the principal at Chugiak High School.

The appointment of an assistant principal at Chugiak High School was also announced. He is Ernest Trujillo, who has been most recently acting as teacher counselor at East Anchorage High School.

Mr. Trujillo was born in Colorado and received his teaching degree at Dickinson State Teachers College in North Dakota in 1959. He taught at White Earth North Dakota for two years and is presently attending the University of North Dakota, where he is working for his Masters degree.

He is married and has been living in Anchorage.

The contest began on June 3rd and will continue through August 26th.

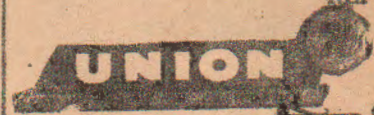

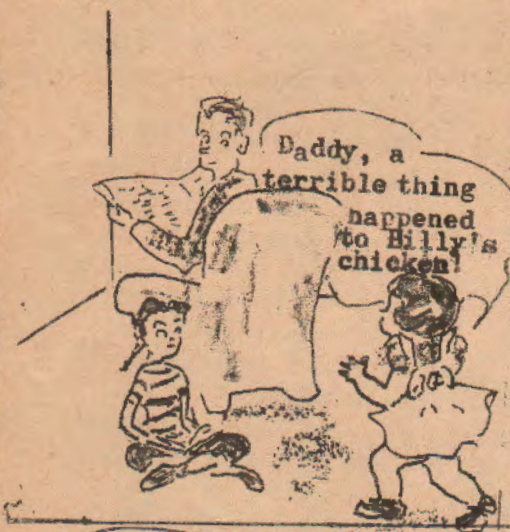

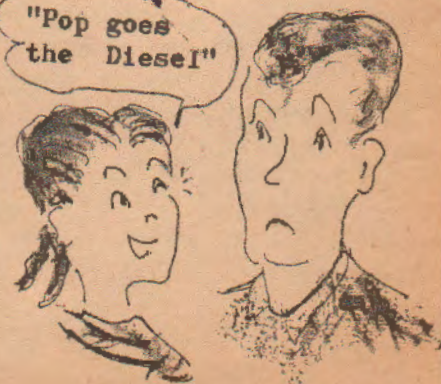

Due to technical difficulties we were unable to print our June cook's final recipe last week. We do so at this time.

WONDER GOLD CAKE

- 2 1/4 cups cake flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. mace
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 5 unbeaten egg yolks
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 3/4 cup milk

COMBINE all dry ingredients in large bowl
 ADD shortening, eggs, vanilla and 1/2 milk
 BEAT 2 minutes
 BAKE in 10"x5"x3" pan for 1 hour at 350°
 COOL in pan for 10 min.

Teachers will be Mrs. Julie Rouse at the Eagle River School, and Mrs. Ann Riordon at the Chugiak School.

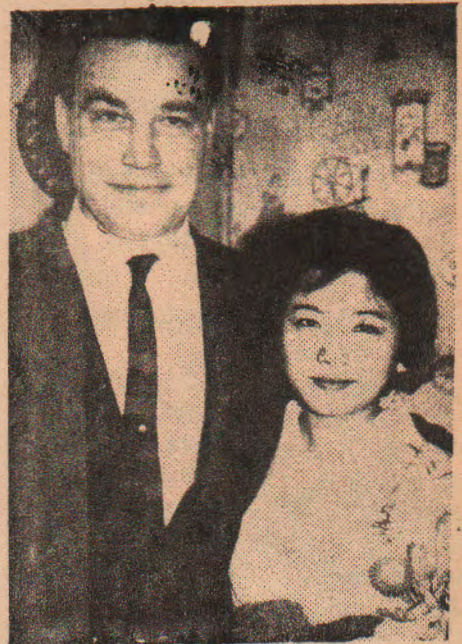
RECEPTION HONORS ART WALLACE AND BRIDE

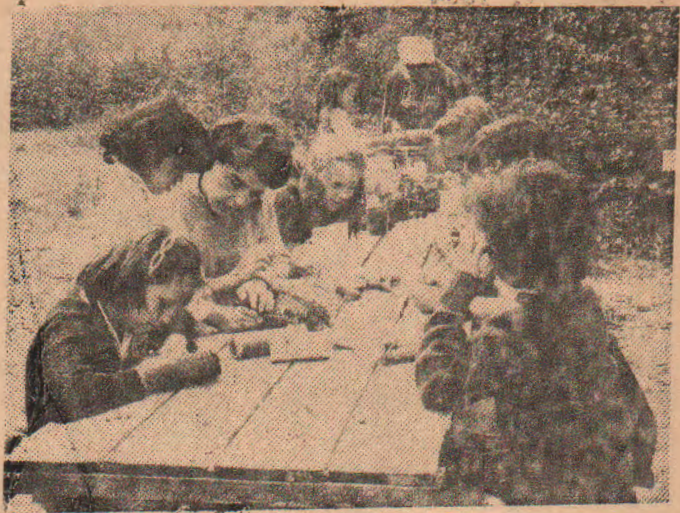
