### LOCAL MERCHANTS TO OFFER CENTENNIAL COINS

CHUGIAK: Many merchants in the Greater Chugiak will distribute and redeem Anchorage Centennial Trade Dollars, according to a spokesman for the Eagle River Lions Club.

The Local group, along with other area Lions Clubs are distributing these souvenir coins in cooperation with leading banks, businesses and the Centennial Commission in support of the Alaska Purchase Centennial Observance.

The Trade Dollars have been manufactured by the E. DuPont Co. in Wilmington, Delaware. They are made of Delrin, a patented DuPont synthetic material, and will be available in Red, White and Blue. The obverse or front of the Anchorage Alaska Centennial Trade Dollar will feature the official Alaska Centennial Emblem, while the reverse side will carry an engraving of a sled and team, plus an explanation of the use of the coin. The sculpturing was done by a master engraver, and the coins will be the size of a Silver Dollar, but 50 percent thicker.

The coins will sell for \$1.00 each and will be good for \$1.00 in trade at any participating bank or business, or redeemable at face value until October 31st, 1967.

### SPORTSMAN'S COUNCIL MEETS AT PALMER

PALMER: The annual meeting of the Alaska Sportsman's Council was held in Palmer last weekend with officers for the coming year elected.

President is Maurice Kelly of the Territorial Sportsmen of Juneau, Secretary-Treasurer will be chosen at a later date, Vice President for the Southeastern District was Cecil McLean, Vice President for South-Central District, Ed Bellringer of Chugiak and Vice-President for the Northern District, Joh Vogt.

A.W. (Bud) Body was appointed Executive Director.

The meeting was held at the Palmer Elks hall for the group on Saturday night. Guest speaker was William Reeveley, Western Field Director of the National Wildlife Federation who spoke on the need for preservation of our natural resources. Ed Bellringer, Past President of the Alaska Sportsman's Council served as Master of Ceremonies.

CHUGIAK: The results of an unofficial survey, conducted during last week's borough election were revealed today.

The survey was conducted by borough assemblyman Glenn Briggs in an effort to determine the views of Borough residents on several issues.

According to Briggs, the area voters gave a mandate on the substitution of a sales tax for personal property tax, and for the control of the sale and use of fireworks.

Of the 587 voters in the three precincts in the Greater Chugiak area, Section 1, 376 participated in the opinion poll on Boroughwide 2% sales tax for borough schools and on the fireworks issue.

Two hundred and thirty (230) or 63 1/2% of the 362 voters taking part in the poll favored the sales tax.

Two hundred and forty five (245) or 65 1/2% of the 374 persons polled favored elimination of fireworks except for supervised public displays. One hundred twenty nine (129) voters favored no controls or favored controlling both the type of fireworks and the period during which fireworks could be sold and used.

In Peters Creek Precinct 83% of those who cast official ballots also expressed themselves in the unofficial poll as did 39% in the Chugiak precinct and 87% in the Eagle River precinct.

### CAR OF GOOD SAMARITAN DAMAGED

FIRE LAKE: A good samaritan who had stopped to assist a lady in distress, suffered minor damage to his 1965 Chevrolet pick-up last Saturday morning.

Louis Lurcsama of Chugiak stopped at mile 17 1/2 when he observed a 1965 Chevrolet sedan, belonging to Shirley Jean Mathews, also of Chugiak, that had skidded into the ditch on the icy road. He had hooked on to her car and was in the process of pulling it out when a 1964 Dodge, driven by Helen Triplett skidded into him. Mrs. Triplett was in the process of moving from Anchorage to Valdez at the time of the accident.

State Police blamed the accident on the icy roads, and did not issue any citations. None of the cars was seriously damaged.

Planning and consequent zoning can create hardships and inconveniences when formulated too late, and "too late" so often and so unnecessarily happens. Eventually, all developed or developing areas recognize the need for planning -- usually about twenty five years late. It is then almost financially and politically impossible to arrive at an acceptable plan with real merit. As with more animate creatures, guidance must start early. In our particular area, in its present status, the most difficult task will be that of getting started.

### HERE AND THERE By R. Fleming

Although it lacks conciseness, my favorite definition of planning is: Land Planning, be it town or country, is the effort to control, to guide, and to accomplish the physical development of urban or suburban areas, and thereby to provide for the people who are living and working in them, the best possible environments.

The principal watchwords of planning are coordination, efficiency, health, utility and beauty. Such ideas are concerned with dwellings, recreation, work, transportation, communication. Unfortunately, there is a widespread feeling that zoning and planning are synonymous, that zoning is a negative action and encroaches upon personal liberties. Much of planning programs is activated through proper use of zoning and ordinances. What we frequently overlook is the fact that whenever any land is designated for a specific use, some type or other of zoning

occurs. Because a highway is designated for use as a road, it thus becomes a certain type of zone.

Not too long ago, I talked with some acquaintances who were just finishing the construction of a fairly large and expensive apartment house. They were bitterly opposed to "zoning" because they felt it curtailed freedom of choice. When I asked how they would feel if, next to their apartment building in which they had their energy and money invested, some structure were erected which would be so unattractive or offensive as to prevent prospective tenants from renting their units. Their answer was that that this sort of thing shouldn't be allowed. Of course, it shouldn't be allowed.

Most of us, if faced with this sort of dilemma, would make a hurried trip to city hall to see if something could be done. While regulation through zoning may sometime appear restrictive, it is a protection and insurance for maintenance of property values. It is not the hydra-headed monster it sometimes is made out to be.

JUNIOR OF THE MONTH**

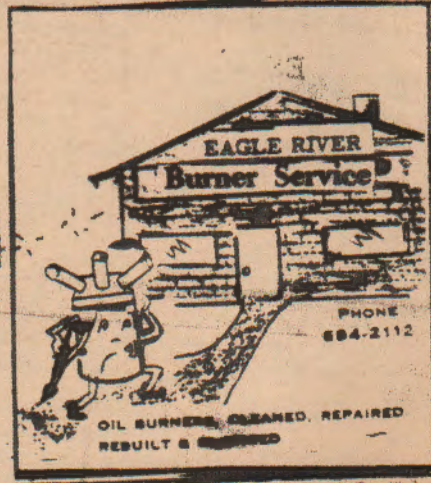
This month Marcia Rodgers has been selected junior of the month of October by the Mustang Express editor and staff.

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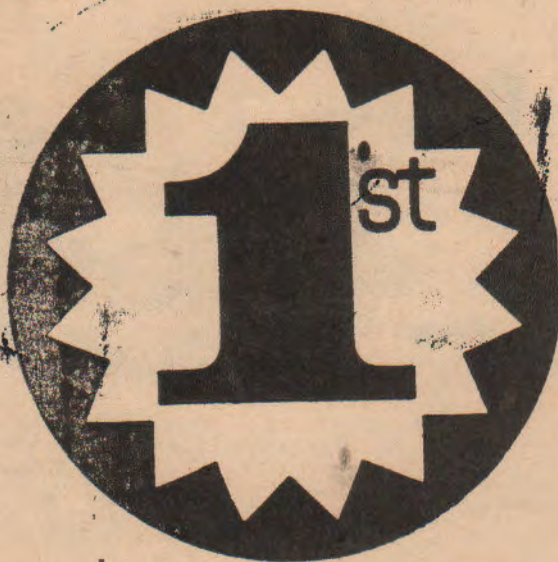

Funds to redeem the coins will be held on deposit at all Anchorage banks. They are guaranteed by the Anchorage Centennial Commission.

Advance orders for the coins will be taken by Anchorage area Lions Club members, who will contact each business. Merchants may pick up their supply from the bank or have them delivered by a Lions Club member. Distribution will begin in October of 1965.

This program offers the merchant only the opportunity to stimulate his own business, but also the unique opportunity to financially support the Centennial without any cost to himself, according to the Lions Club spokesman, "We ask that each merchant instruct his personnell to encourage customers to accept change in Centennial Dollars, with a reminder that these coins are good throughout the Anchorage Area."

Similar trade dollar promotions have been high successful in many other cities. Not only will these coins advertise the Alaska Centennial, but they will also provide an attractive, inexpensive souvenir to residents and visitors alike", the Lions spokesman concluded.

### COMMUTERS MAY NOW RIDE BUS

CHUGIAK: Many residents of the Greater Chugiak Area are unaware that commuter bus service to Anchorage has been available for some time.

The Alaskan Coachways Ltd. passes through Chugiak on their Willow Anchorage run in time for workers to make connections with the Anchorage transit system for employment in the city or at either of the military bases, and returns through the community at an equally convenient schedule.

In addition to the first run, which arrives at the Anchorage terminal at 6:45am, the Alaskan Coachways is planning a second run which will depart from the northernmost part of Chugiak (approximately mile 23) and make a second morning run to Anchorage for the convenience of those who do not go to work at as an early hour as other, or for the convenience of those who wish to go to the city to shop or to take care of other business.

A schedule of the present run is published elsewhere in the paper.

At present, Alaskan Coachways is in the process of setting up regular agents in the area where computer tickets may be purchased. However, the bus will stop to pick up or let off passengers at any point along the Glenn Highway. "Just wave us down", they claim. (next col)

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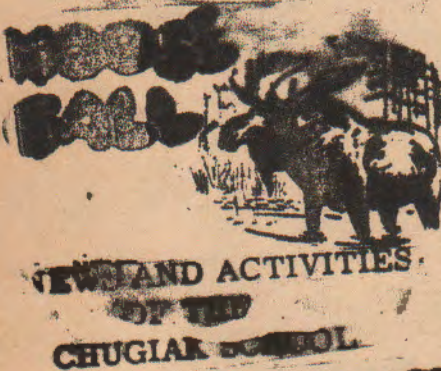
