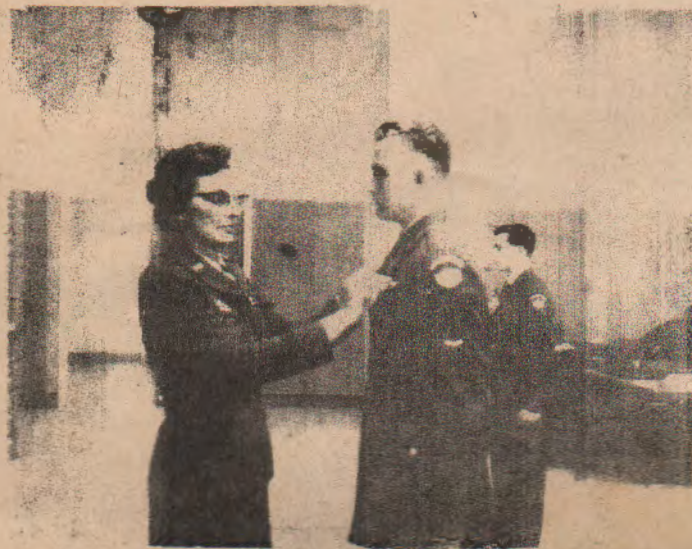

PTA TO HOLD DIME A DISH DINNER

CHUGIAK: The Chugiak Elementary School PTA is planning to hold a Dime-A-Dish dinner on Thursday, November 4th.

This year the event will be held in the multi-purpose room of the Chugiak High School on Birchwood Road.

Mrs. Max Pyles, publicity chairman for the event, explained the reason for holding the dinner at the high school. She said that the larger lunch room at the High School would make it possible to seat a great many more persons at one time, and the serving facilities would also enable them to handle a double serving line, cutting down the serving time.

Students will be bringing home slips on which parents will be offered a choice of food to contribute to the dinner. They are asked to indicate their choice and return the slips no later than Friday, October 22nd.

The Dime-A-Dish dinner is an annual money raising event for the grade school PTA. All food is sold for 10¢ per serving, and all proceeds benefit the PTA.

PRANKSTER TAKES SCHOOL BUS KEYS

OLD CHUGIAK: A prankster of unknown identity removed the keys from the local school buses one night last week.

According to William Knight, operator of the bus service, the keys were taken sometime after 9:30pm on the night of October 13th.

The keys were taken from all of the buses with the exception of the one parked closest to the bus garage.

The prank was discovered the following morning when the drivers arrived to begin their runs. All buses were delayed while a mechanic wired around the switches of the buses.

A locksmith from Anchorage was called following the morning bus runs, and new keys made for all the ignition switches.

Knight pointed out that this "prank" had caused him considerable expense. Also, innocent victims of the prank were the numerous children who had to wait for almost an hour in below freezing weather while the emergency repair was made to the buses.

Knight stated that he is offering a reward of one hundred dollars to anyone supplying information leading to the apprehension of the person or persons responsible for the taking of the keys.

EAGLE RIVER: Three persons were injured in a head-on collision at mile 14 1/2 on Sunday October 17th at 8:005pm.

The accident took place at the intersection of Glenn Highway and Eagle River Loop Road, and involved a 1965 Dodge Cornet, driven by Walter Prior of Fort Richardson, and a 1958, Chevrolet Station Wagon driven by Katherine M. Jackson of Anchorage.

The two cars hit head-on, inflicting an estimated \$600 damage to the station wagon and \$3300 damage to the Dodge. The latter vehicle was called a total loss by the State Police.

Mrs. Jackson suffered lacerations of her head, legs and body, a passenger in her car, 16 year old Charlene L. Jackson also suffered head lacerations and internal chest injuries.

Prior sustained head lacerations.

Mrs. Jackson and her daughter were transported to Providence Hospital. Prior was taken to the 5040th Air Force Hospital.

State Police are still investigating and citations are pending.

POSTMASTER TELLS XMAS SCHEDULE

EAGLE RIVER: Postmaster Lucile Fly stated the follow schedule would be followed for Christmas mailing.

The period October 21 to November 10 has been designated for the mailing of Christmas parcels by surface transportation to members of our Armed Forces overseas. For airmail parcels the period is December 1 to December 10. Greeting cards for the Armed Forces overseas should be mailed within the periods designated for parcels, if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas.

The term "Armed Forces overseas" includes personnel who receive their mail through an APO, New York, N.Y., San Francisco, Calif., or Seattle Wash., or Fleet Post Office New York N.Y. Or San Francisco, Calif. or Navy Post Office of Postmaster Seattle Wash.

Domestic mail should be sent to distant states before December 5.

Parcels for local and nearby areas should be mailed not later than December 14. Greeting Cards for distant states should be mailed not later than December 10 and local delivery not later than December 15.

The name and address of both the sender and addressee should be enclosed in each gift parcel to permit identity in case of damage or loss of the outside address label. Outside address label should be placed on only one side of each parcel.

SPORTS REVIEW

The state cross-country meet was held in Palmer last Saturday, October 16. There were three races a varsity, junior varsity and a III team race. Chugiak had runners in all three. There were runners from Chugiak, Palmer, East and West Anchorage, Kenai, Homer, Seward, Kodiak, Ninilchik, Ft. Greely, Big Delta, Fairbanks, Talkeetna, Wasilla, Wasilla Youth Camp and Copper Valley.

In the III race, the scores were: West-25, Fairbanks-38, Palmer-76, Youth Camp-205, Chugiak-218.

Chugiak's runners placed 36th, 42nd, 43rd, 44th 51st and 55th out of a field of 56. Chugiak might have beat Wasilla and would have definitely beat Big Delta, but neither of these qualified as teams.

The JV team failed to do better: West-19, Fairbanks-82, Palmer-86, East-94, Homer-132, Seward-175, Delta-194, Kenai-200, Wasilla-228, Chugiak-237.

The JV's from Chugiak placed 32nd (Bob Thomas) 36th, 50th, 58th 61st, and 63rd.

The Varsity did better than the other two: 1 West-31, 2 Homer-84, 2 East-84, 3 Palmer-104, 4 Fairbanks-146, 5 Wasilla-158, 6 Kodiak-173, 7 Seward-233, 8 Chugiak-239, 9 Kenai-284.

Louis Doores led the Chugiak runners home and placed 35th overall. Other runners placed 42, 44, 57, 61 69, and 70. Steve Nixon of Homer was first overall, followed by Dave McCloy and Gary Horrell, both of West Anchorage. Fourth was taken by a Palmer runner, fifth by an East Anchorage runner, sixth by Palmer, seventh by West Anchorage, ninth by Kodiak and tenth by Homer.

House Plant Time

This is house plant time. House plants are always popular and there are many kinds to choose from. Some grow well under the unnatural (for plants that is) conditions found in the average home while others are distinctly difficult.

There are many ways that plants can be arranged in the house such as shelves, in brackets, on benches, window sills and tiered stands. Regardless of the arrangement used, the plants should be placed where they will receive sufficient light.

Plants that receive too little light have a tendency to be thin and spindly, bend markedly toward the source of light and to flower sparsely or not at all. Too strong light may result in the loss of green color and a browning of the leaves. The light requirements can be adjusted by the use of incandescent or fluorescent lights.

The lack of sufficient humidity is a common cause of failure of house plants. Common symptoms are drooping of leaves and a gradual drying up and browning of the foliage.

Relative humidity is difficult to control but it will help some to keep plants away from radiators and other sources of dry heat. Placing the plants over shallow trays filled with coarse sand, gravel or stones to which a constant supply of water is added will help.

Temperature, like light, is frequently difficult to control in the home. Plants do well at a day temperature of 68-70 degrees F. and 10 degrees lower at night. However, sharp fluctuations in temperature should be avoided.

Examples of some of the plants that will do well at the temperature ranges mentioned are philodendrons, dracaenas, palms, rubber plants, snake plants (Sansevieria) and ferns. Geraniums, fuchsias, English ivy and fatshedera like cooler temperatures, even down to 60 degrees.

Watering is very important, especially when the plants are in active growth. While it is not possible to give an accurate schedule for all plants, the general rule when watering is to soak the mass of soil and be sure that ample provision has been made for drainage at the bottom of the container. It does not matter whether the

water is applied to the top of the soil or allowed to soak up from the bottom.

Over-watering may be one of the more common errors in the growing of house plants. This may occur if you water too frequently.

While the water temperature is not of great importance, it is best to use water at room temperature. Rain or melted snow water is excellent if you take the trouble to collect it.
