PRANKSTER TAKES SCHOOL BUS KEYS

OLD CHUGIAK: A prankster of unknown identity removed the keys from the local school buses one night last week. . According to William Knight,

According to William Knight, operator of the bus service, the keys were taken sometime after 9:30pm on the night of October 13th.

The keys were taken from all of the buses with the exception of the one parked closest to the bus garage. The prank was discovered the fol-

The prank was discovered the following morning when the drivers arrived to begin their runs, All buses were delayed while a mechanic wired around the switches of the buses.

A locksmith from Anchorage was called following the morning bus runs, and new keys made for all the ignition switches.

Knight pointed out that this "prank" had caused him considerable expense. Also, innoceut victims of the prank were the numerous children who had to wait for almost an hour iu below freezing weather while the emergency repair was made to the buses.

Knight stated that he is offering a reward of one hundred dollars to anyone supplying information leading to the apprenension of the person or persons responsible for the taking of the keys. EAGLE RIVER: Three persons were injured in a head-on collision at mile 14 1/2 on Sunday October 17th at 8:005pm.

The accident took place at the intersection of Glean Highway and Eagle River Loop Road, and involved a 1965 Dodge Cornet, driven by Walter Prior of Fort Richardson, and a 1958, Chevrolet Station Wagon driven by Katherine M. Jackson of Anchorage.

...The two cars hit head on, inflicting an estimated \$600 damage to the station wagon and \$3300 damage to the Dodge. The latter vehicle was called a total loss by the State Police.

Mrs. Jackson suffered lacerations of her head, legs and body, a passenger in her car, 16 year old Charlene L. Jackson also suffered head lacerations and internal chest injuries.







House Plant Time This is house plant time. House plants are always popular and there are many kinds to choose from. Some grow well under the unnatural (for plants that is) conditions found in the average home while others are distinctly difficult.

There are many ways that plants can be arranged in the house such as shelves, in brackets, on benches, window sills and tiered stands. Regardless of the arrangement used, the plants should be placed where they will receive sufficient light.

Plants that receive too little light frave a tendency to be thint and spindly, bend markedly toward the source of light and to flower sparsely or not at all. Too strong light may result in the loss of green color and a browning of the leaves. The light requirements can be adjusted by the use of incandescent or fluorescent lights.

> The lack of sufficient humidity is a common cause of failure of house plants. Common symptoms are dropping of leaves and a gradual drying up and browning of the foliage.

A Sect :

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Relative humidity is difficult to control bitt it will help some to keep plants away from radiators and other sources of dry heat. Placing the plants over shallow trays filled with coarse sand, gravel or stones to which a constant supply of way ter is added will help.

Temperature, like light, is frequently difficult to control in the home. Plants do well at a day temperature of 68-70 degrees F. and 10 degrees lower at night. However, sharp fluctuations in temperature should be avoided.

Examples of some of the plants that will do well at the temperature ranges mentioned are philodendrons, dracaenas palms, rubber plants, snake plants (Sansevieria), and ferns.. Geraniums, furficies, Englishivy and fatshedera like cooler temperatures, even down to 60 decrees.

Watering is very important, especially when the plants are in active growth. While it is not possible to give an accurate schedule for all plants, the general rule when watering is to soak the mass of soil and be sure that ample provision has been made for drainage at the bottom of the container. It does not matter whether the N.L.L.

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water is applied to the top on a the soil or allowed to soak up from the bottom.


 Over-watering may be one of the more common errors in the growing of house plants. This may occur if you water to of frequently.
