



BAR LICENSE HEARING THIS FRIDAY



EAGLE RIVER: The twice postponed liquor license hearing will be held this Friday, October 29th, at 7:00pm at the multi-purpose room of the Eagle River school.

The hearing concerns a dispute over the legality of the license at the 300 Room at the Eagle River Bowl.

A group of residents of the area doubted the population figure which was the basis for the issuance of the license.

The purpose of the public hearing is to hear evidence that will either support the population figure which was submitted or offer proof that it is inaccurate.

Residents of an area within a five-mile radius of the Eagle River Bowl are concerned.

The hearing will be conducted by the members of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

The Board will also at this hearing consider the application for package store licenses by Valu City and Mrs. Isabel Adams.

BOROUGH PLANNING REPRESENTATIVE TO MEET WITH LOCAL RESIDENTS

BIRCHWOOD: The first of a series of meetings with a representative of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough Planning Commission and residents of the local area, will take place on Thursday November 4th.

Mr. Jerry Overstreet, from the Borough Planning Commission will meet with the residents of the Birchwood area, to learn what these people want from the Borough.

The meeting will take place at the home of Charles Richner on the Birchwood Loop Road. Any interested residents of the Birchwood community are urged to attend.

The remainder of the meetings will take place within the next two weeks, one at each of the five main communities which comprise the Greater Chugiak Area (Birchwood, Eagle River, Fire Lake, Old Chugiak and Peters Creek.)

LOCAL FARMERS MAY GET AID

TUKEAU: Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman has been asked to approve an emergency livestock feed program for the Matanuska Susitna Brough and the Eagle River area.

The request for assistance was made today by Acting Governor Hugh J. Wase in support of a request by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Alaska State Disaster Committee, a federally designated group under the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The emergency livestock feeding program became necessary as a result of high winds shattering grain in the fields and early snowfalls which prevented harvesting of large percentages of the grain, hay and silage crops.

Wade urged Freeman to give the matter his full consideration as the earliest possible time.

RUNAWAY GIRLS LOCATED HERE

EAGLE RIVER: Six local girls who had run away from their homes were located, according to the State Police.

Five of the girls were located at the home of a friend in this area, while the sixth was found in Anchorage.

The girls, who ranged in age from 14 to 16, had been missing for a week.

The parents of three of the missing girls had reported their absence to the police, the parents of the other three had not reported.

Three of the girls (those whose parents had reported their absence) were turned over to their parents, the other three were taken into custody at the juvenile facilities at the Anchorage City Jail.

EATING HABITS
SUBJECT TO CHANGE

Our eating habits are changing rapidly, especially when it comes to potatoes, Leland Cade, district Extension agent, said this week. This is of special interest to Alaska potato growers because it will affect future production patterns.

French fried potatoes were a curiosity in the 1930s, a luxury in the 1940s, a nationwide novelty in the 1950s, and during the past ten years everyone

has been eating French fries. Consumption of French fries in 1964 was a whopping 30 per cent higher than 1963, and seven times greater than in the mid-1950s.

Frozen French fried potatoes now account for about 10 per cent of all the potatoes we eat, according to Cade. The increase in consumption of French fried potatoes has been largely at the expense of fresh potatoes. Consumption of fresh potatoes has dropped more than 20 per cent during the past ten years and to an all time per-capita low.

Ten years from now Alaska farmers may be producing as much for the frozen market as they are now for the fresh market, Cade concluded.

BATTERY CHARGER IS HANDY

A battery charger can be a mighty handy piece of equipment these days with temperatures dropping every day, says Axel R. Carlson, engineer with the Cooperative Extension Service, University of Alaska.

When a battery gets low from prolonged use of a starter or accidental discharge, it can be easily recharged right in the vehicle with a battery charger. This saves the job of removing the battery and hauling it to a service station. Batteries can be maintained at peak charge too, instead of waiting for them to catch you unaware.

There are three common types of battery chargers, according to Carlson. These are the trickle charger used only for keeping a battery in a state of full charge while in standby storage as in filling stations.

The fast or quick charger capable of restoring a high state of charge in a sound battery in 20 to 30 minutes. These are quite expensive, usually \$75 to \$100, chiefly for service station use.

The battery charger of five to six ampere output at 12 volts and ten to twelve ampere output at six volts costs from \$15 to \$20. It will charge a sound but discharged battery to a full charge in ten to twelve hours of operation. The final charge is higher than is obtainable with a fast charger.

Remember to consider dual voltage six to twelve volt chargers since both battery voltages are now common.

The charger leads marked plus and minus must be connected to the corresponding battery leads. Battery terminals are marked, but in case the marks have been mutilated,

remember, that the larger of the two terminals is positive.

Check the water level before charging and add clean distilled water, clean rain water or clean tap water. Replace caps and leave them on while charging.

Avoid sparks near a charging battery. Gases given off by a charging battery are highly explosive, and an exploding battery scatters dangerous sulphuric acid as well, which can blind and burn.

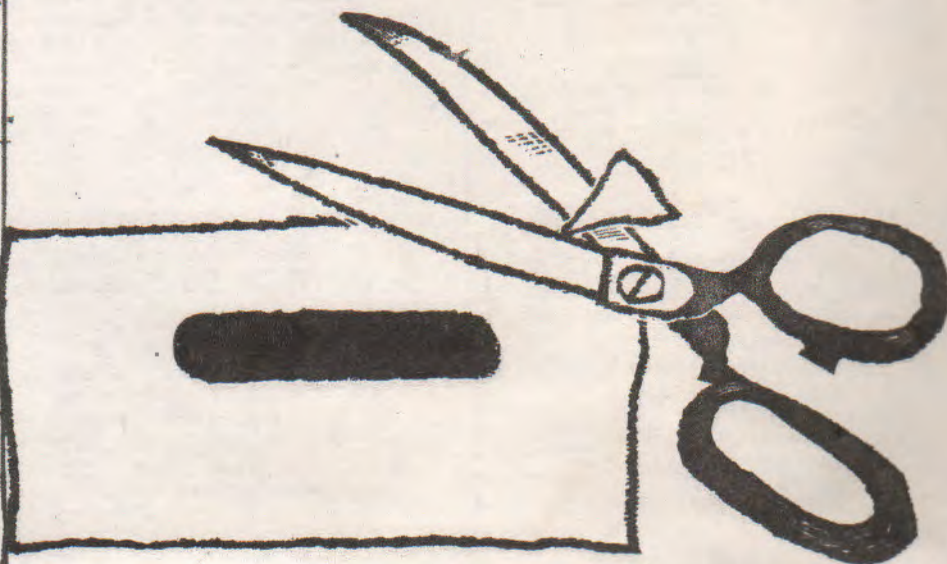
To clean the battery, sprinkle a tablespoon of baking soda on top of the battery. Add a little water, then stir this around with a stick. Finally, flush the surface clean with a dash of water. Covering the terminals with grease will help to discourage corrosion.

A battery hydrometer costing one to two dollars is a useful item to have when checking battery conditions. As a battery is charged, the acid content increases which gives a higher reading. A reading of 1230 indicates a fully charged battery, 1130 indicates discharge. Discharged batteries will freeze at 19°F.
