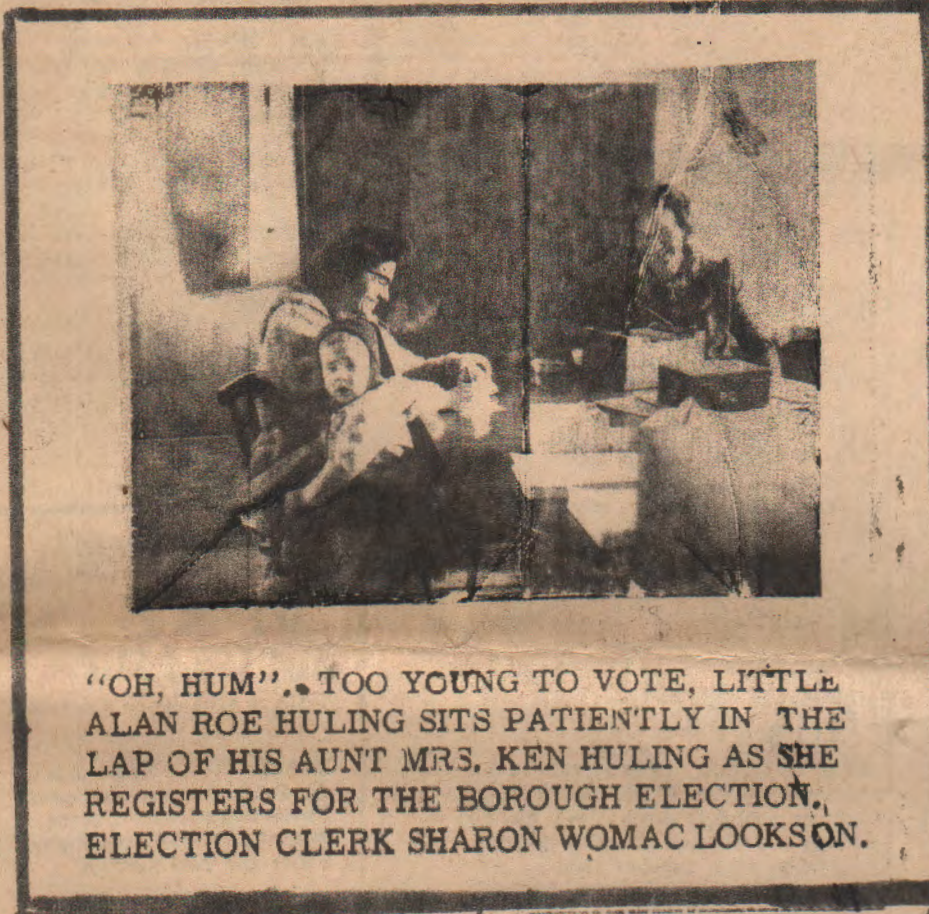

LIQUOR LICENSE HEARING POSTPONED

EAGLE RIVER: Word from the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board is that the public hearing has been again postponed, this time to October 29th.

Charles Strong, investigator for the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board for the Anchorage area said the reason for the second postponement was the fact that the Chairman of the board will not have returned from a trip to California before that date.

The hearing will be held on Friday, October 29th at 7:00pm in the Multi-purpose room of the Eagle River grade school.

The licenses which will be discussed is the Beverage dispensing license at the 300 Room of the Eagle River Bowl, and the applications for licenses to operate package stores, which were submitted by Valu City and Isabell Adams.

STAR ROUTE BOXES TO BE NUMBERED

CHUGIAK: Patrons of both local Star Route are being assigned box numbers, according to a spokesman for the Post Office Department.

A letter of instruction along with the newly assigned number is being left in each box on both routes.

Patrons must paint their box numbers on the front and sides of their box, and inform their correspondents of their new address.

This is to go into effect immediately.

In the future anyone wishing to receive their mail on the Star Routes will be required to put up a mail box of the recommended type, and according to the regulations for installing it, and then notify the postmaster at either the Chugiak or Eagle River postoffice, depending on which post office that serves their Star Route. A number will then be assigned.

The reason for the numbers is to facilitate mail delivery.

Chugiak made an excellent showing at the cross-country meet run last Friday, October 1 at Palmer.

There were three races over a relatively flat course of regulation distance.

There were runners from six different schools; Chugiak, West Anchorage, Palmer, Wasilla, Wasilla Youth Camp and Talkeetna.

Talkeetna had runners in only the Varsity event and the Wasilla Youth Camp had runners in all but the Varsity event.

Chugiak took third in the number III event, third in the Junior Varsity event (behind Weas and Palmer, but ahead of Wasilla and the Wasilla Youth Camp both times) but took fourth ahead of Talkeetna in the Varsity event.

The Chugiak runners were not suited for running on flat ground, because they have been training on a very hilly course. The Chugiak runners did very well in spite of these disadvantages.

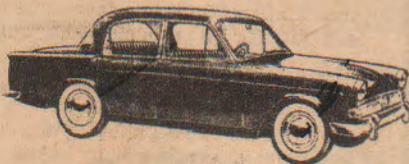

The dedication service will include cutting of the ribbon and the presentation of the keys by the architect, Mr. K. Walter Johnson of Tacoma, Washington to Mr. Robert Hamann, chairman of the building committee, who will pass them on to Mr. Charles Schroeder, chairman of the congregation. Other officers of the congregation who include Mr. D.C. Shroeder, Mr. Merton Willson, and Mr. Patrick Baumer will also participate in the service.

The new building is the first unit of a two-unit building plan and was built largely by volunteer labor at an estimated cost of \$50,000. Located at mile 19 on the Glenn Highway, the church is of wood frame construction in a modern design, with a stained wood interior and long narrow windows stained in various shades of gold. The auditorium will seat 160 persons on cushioned pews.

Special accent in the church is a white altar wall with skylight above, and a large stained cross which stands away from the wall.

A large basement room can be divided into several classrooms. There are also a Pastor's office and a conference room.

Our Redeemer first held services early in 1960 at the Emanuel Gospel Chapel located on the present church site. The Rev. Joseph Frenz, now deceased and formerly pastor of Anchorage Lutheran Church, was the part time pastor. In 1961 the site was purchased and the Rev. Rolland Fritz, of St John Lutheran Church in Palmer assumed leadership of the congregation.

All people of the Greater Chuglak Area are cordially invited to the services, according to the Rev. Mr. Fritz.
