NEW ROAD TO PALMER OPEN

ANCHORAGE: The new road to Palmer was open to the public last week, according to the office of the Department of Highways in Anchorage.

This new section of Alaska State Highway No. 1, (Glenn Highway) consists of 8.7 miles of new construction from the point where it leaves the original Glenn Highway at the Eklutna Railroad crossing to the end of the pavement south of Palmer.

This route is 6.2 miles shorter than the original route, and eliminates approximately 15 minutes of travel time between Anchorage and Palmer.

The new road has been under construction for the past two and one half years, at the cost of six and one half million dollars for bridges, and \$1,400,000 for roadbed (including the blacktopping which will be done next spring). The cost of the new construction was paid for by Federal Aid funds to the extent of 95%, with the State of Alaska carrying 5% of the cost.

The original road to Palmer, will be maintained as an alternate route and classed as a secondary highway.

Signs along the highway indicating the new route will be erected this week.

The new road will not be affected by the annual break-up of Lake George.

BIRCHWOOD: Mr. and Mrs. Al Hildeman, of Birchwood have adopted a pair of Korean orphans.

The children, brother and sister, arrived in Anchorage last week aboard a Northwest Orient Airlines plane.

The Hildemans became interested in adopting Korean children through Mr. and Mrs. James Ekstedt of Eagle River, who have adopted two Korean orphans. The Ekstedts put the Hildemans in touch with the Child Placement Center in Seoul Korea, who handle such adoptions.

The youngsters, Jeany aged 7 and Bob age 9, are enrolled in the Chuglak elementary school, Jeany in the first grade and Bob in the third. Although both have attended school in Korea, they spoke no English when they arrived.

Mr. Hildeman is an iron worker, employed by Steel Fabricators in Anchorage. Mrs. Hildeman teaches the fourth grade at the Chuglak Elementary school.

DRIVERS NOT NAMED IN CAR-PICKUP SMASH

OLD CHUGIAK: The names of the drivers were not revealed in a freak collision between a Jeep pickup and a passenger car last Friday.

The accident took place at mile 21, at the intersection of the Glenn Highway and Birchwood Road.

As this is being written, I am witnessing a most touching, yet hilarious, drama. Two days ago, our cat, Gray Girl, gave birth to five kittens. Just a few moments ago, another cat, Fluffy, gave birth to three kittens. Nothing particularly unusual about this, but....

Gray Girl, at her specific request, delivered her babies in a closet of the room I call my office, in a corner formed by boxes on the floor, so small that it is difficult for her even to turn around. As you have already guessed, Fluffy just had her kittens in the same place, apparently in the presence of Gray Girl.

There simply isn't enough room for two cats, not to speak of their combined litters. Since Gray Girl has squatter's rights, I removed Fluffy's offspring to what I thought was a suitable place. Picking out Fluffy's babies at this age presented no difficulties - at least to me.

Fluffy immediately carried one of her kittens back to the crowded area, forgot about the other two and began to hover over her one and Gray Girl's. Gray Girl then brought back

one of Fluffy's kittens. And I put the third one back. Knowing from previous experience that Fluffy would put her little ones back where she pleased, I enlarged the brooding area and put the whole kit and keeboo-dle back in the same area. However, Fluffy appears not to distinguish her children and her first actions have been to attempt to nurse all the kittens and in so doing, placed herself atop Gray Girl.

All appears serene at the present moment. A quick check reveals that Fluffy's kitties are being nursed by her, but all little ones are being licked irrespective of parentage. I suppose they could care less as long as they are fed.

During the past several days, I have spent an hour or two watching the behavior of this feline project. The kittens apparently know their respective mothers, and generally, (but not exclusively) will nurse at the proper maternal source when both mamma cats are there. However, less and less distinction is being shown, and when either mother cat is away, they will feed at whichever one is left.

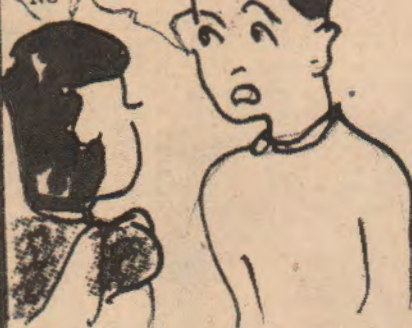

ALASKAN STUDENTS MAY COMPETE IN CONTEST

JUNEAU: "All high school juniors and seniors in Alaska are invited to participate in the 1966 "Ability Counts" contest of the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped," Gill Johnson, Commission of the Alaska Department of Labor, announced today.

"The 1966 contest provides an excellent opportunity for young people to become acquainted with evidence proving that a disabled individual need not necessarily have lost his value to society."

The 1966 contest theme is "What Handicapped Workers are Contributing to my Community." It is sponsored by the Alaska State Employment Service, and the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped in cooperation with the Alaska State Federation of Labor.

The purpose of the contest is to create more public interest in and support for the employment of the handicapped, in line with congressional action providing for the "National Employ the Handicapped" program. Insight and understanding by others is necessary before the handicapped individual can be provided with practical assistance.

Significance of content, evidence of research, originality, impact, organization, clarity of expression and neatness all will be considered in the judging. Most past prize winners have been good "leg men" searching for facts as a good reporter does, by contacts, interviews, personal observations, and digging through research materials.

School and public libraries are excellent sources for background materials, and related information is also available from local offices of the Alaska State Employment Service, the Division of Vocational RE-

habilitation, the Veterans Administration, the Department of Health and Welfare, and various medical sources. Employers who have handicapped individuals on their payrolls, labor officials and the handicapped individuals themselves are potential sources. National magazines may also contain excellent articles and stories on the subject from time to time.

Alaska's first prize winner will receive an expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C., and \$100 cash, enabling this winner to attend the Annual Meeting of the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped. This handsome award is provided by the Alaska State Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO. The Alaska winner will also be judged in competition with each prize winner from the other 49 states for national prizes of \$1,000, \$600, \$400, \$300 and \$200 provided by the Disabled American Veterans.

The contest closes at midnight January 31, 1966. Entries should be post-marked prior to that time and addressed to the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped, Box 2661, Juneau Alaska, 99801.

Students interested in entering the 1966 "Ability Counts" contest should contact their high school principal or English teacher for entry rules and other information. Details on the contest may also be secured from any office of the Alaska State Employment Service in the State, or from the Youth Opportunity Center in Anchorage.

WARNING AGAINST FOOD FADS

Food fads waste your money and they can undermine your health too. The best protection against diet fads which can flatten your purse and threaten your health lies in eating a well-balanced diet of ordinary food each day, the Nutrition Foundation reports. The foundation was established in 1941 as a non-profit organization to support scientific research and public education in nutrition. The foundation's supporting members are companies in the food and allied industries.

Every year ten million Americans spend 500 million dollars following fad diets, the Food and Drug Administration estimates. The news about a fad diet spreads rapidly by word of mouth or through magazines and newspaper articles. The urge to try it seems irresistible to people who learn of a new fad.

The so-called "Air Force" or "Drinking Man's" diet - - which cuts the carbohydrates you eat to a minimum - - seems to be the latest fad. Those who follow it shun high carbohydrate foods such as bread, potatoes and spaghetti - - the energy-giving foods that make up one of the major components of a good diet. They eat high protein foods such as meat and consume fat foods like olives and avocados. Proteins and fats are good foods but they do not, alone, constitute a balanced diet, without carbohydrate. A "low carbohydrate" diet may mean that a person eats less, but it can place a severe load on the body's waste-disposing mechanisms, particularly the liver and the kidneys. The low-carbohydrate diet may cause a temporary weight loss, but it is a diet you cannot stick to over a long period of time with satisfaction - - or even without hazard to your health, the Foundation warns. So weight loss is temporary at best.

The false notions and half-truths spread by the food faddists are often intended to sell something. Many fad products will not hurt you, but they lack the magical power to do what the salesmen pretend they can do. Faddists have sold bottled sea water for as much as \$3.50 a gallon to those who were taken in by their claims. The FDA stopped that racket, but other rackets keep popping up to rob those who are not cautious.

A well-balanced diet consists of a variety of foods from each of the four main food groups: carbohydrates and other nutrients from bread and cereals; protein from meat, fish or eggs; fruits and vegetables and the all-round nutrients from milk. By eating food from each of these four groups every day, you consume a balanced diet.

SOCIAL SECURITY LAW CHANGE TO BENEFIT WIDOWS

An estimated 200 Alaskan widows of men who worked under social security are eligible to choose to start their social security benefits when they are 60 instead of waiting until they are 62 as a result of the recent changes in the law, Pat O'Marra, acting district manager of the social security district office has announced.

Up to now, a widow could not start receiving benefits until age 62 unless she had in her care a child who was also getting benefits.

A widow choosing to get monthly benefits when she is 60 will receive a smaller payment than one who waits until she is 62, O'Marra continued. This is to make up for the longer time she will get benefits.

If a widow decides to get benefits when she is just 60, they will be reduced by 13 1-3 per cent. If she chooses to start when she becomes 61, the reduction will be 6 2-3 per cent.

For example, if a widow whose husband's average income was \$3,000 a year decides to start her payment when she is 60, she will get \$30.50 a month. If she chooses to start when she is 61, her rate will be \$36.70 and if she waits until she is 62, she will get \$32.00 a month.

Once a widow receives benefits before she is 62, she will always get a reduced benefit, even after she is 62, O'Marra stressed.

"Anyone who has a question about his status under the social security law may come into or phone the Social Security office, located in Room 504 of the Cordova Building, Sixth and Cordova Streets, Anchorage," O'Marra concluded. The telephone number is 277-7508.
