

BIG LAKE Two Peters Creek men were injured, one seriously when their plane crashed at the northeast end of the Big Lake airstrip last Thursday morning,

The plane, a Piper Super Cub, of Oberg Road at mile 21 1/2. The pilot was Kenneth D. Huling of Footbill Drive at mile 20

Foothill Drive at mile 22. The men had just taken off at approximately 7:15am, when the approximately crash took place.

Hendrickson was quoted as saying that although he and Huling did not notice any ice fog when they taok off, the encountered it at ap-proximately 100 feet altitude. Huling apparently lost visual contact with the ground, and the crash resulted. Hendrickson, suffered a broken

jaw, bruises and facial injuries. He was able to get out of the crashed plane unassisted. Huling was trapped in the front seat, and unconscious. Ken Hughes of the Big Lake Airstrip, assisted by his son used hack-saws, a wrecker and a tractor to cut and pull the aircraft apart in order to get Huling out. It took nearly forty five minutes to get the unscious man out of the wrecked aircraft aircraft.

A helicopter which had been sum-moned from Elmendorf Air Force base took both men to Providence hospital. Hendrickson has been since released. Huling is hospitalsince released. # HEAT CABLE CAN PREVENT TROUBLE

An ounce of prevention will prevent several hours of work and much inconvenience if freeze protection is provided on exposed water pipes, ac-cording to Axel **B**. Carlson, Extension engineer, University of Alaska.

Electric heating cable pro-tects pipes in a water supply system against freezing even in the coldest weather. How-ever, heating cables or tapes cannot be used effectively if attached to the outside of pl-

astic pipe. The length of cable needed depends on the total length of exposed pipe and the amount of heat needed. Heating cables or tapes are manufactured in lengths from four to 160 feet and range in wattage from 24 to 960 watts, Carlson said. Wattages per foot vary slight-ly depending on the manu-facturer. The amount of heat required depends on the size of the pipe and the minimum temperature at which it must be protected.

There are two mothods of installing the cable. It may be run through the pipe in the water or it may be attached to the outside. The first method is more economical in power consumption, but the instal-ation is more difficuult.

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
The most common way is to wrap the cable around the pipe in a spiral fashion, attaching it to the pipe with friction tape. The cost of operation will be less if insulation is used after the cable is attached.

For automatic, efficient op-eration of the heating cable, a thermostat should be in-stalled. It will turn on or shut off the circuit as the temper-ature fluctuates. The thermostat should be installed on the cold-est part of the pipes to insure protection of the entire sys-tem. Heating tapes are manu-factured with built-in thermo-stats which require no addition-al electrical wiring.


