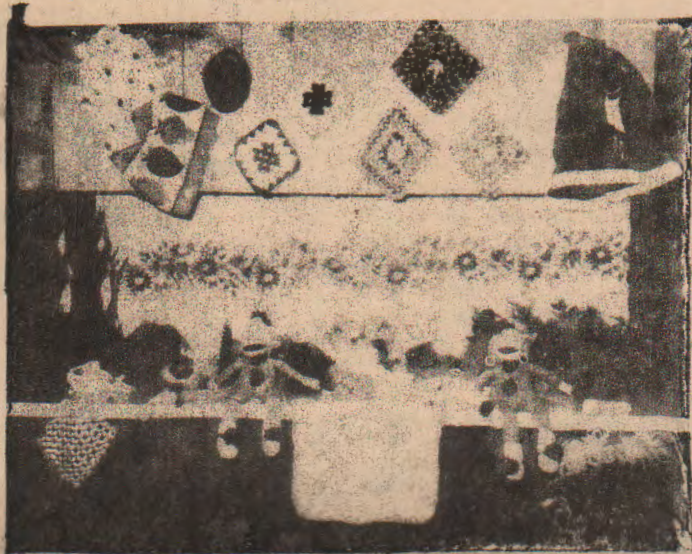

RIVER UNABLE TO ATTEND PERC DINNER

OLD CHUGIAK: Spring Creek Lodge was the scene of a successful dinner Thursday evening to honor Senator E.L. (Bob) Bartlett and Representative Ralph J. Rivers.

Representative Rivers was unable to be present, and sent his regrets in a telegram to Mrs. Louise Long.

According to Mrs. Long, Representative Rivers, as Chairman of the House sub-committee on National Parks and Recreation was scheduled to conduct a field inspection and committee hearing in Nevada. He sent his regrets to the group.

Senator Bartlett in an after dinner speech, reviewed with pride the accomplishments of the 89th Congress, and some of the direct effects to Alaska.

Guests present, were Mrs. Bartlett, Bob Arnold, Senator Bartlett's Alaskan representative, Constance Ryder, Senator Bartlett's secretary in Washington. Also present was, State Senator Carl Lottsfeldt, along with Mrs. Lottsfeldt and daughter Frances and Elmer Gagon, director of Alaskan Housing.

The dinner was sponsored by the PERC Democratic Women's Club of the local voting precincts.

FIRE LAKE HOME DESTROYED BY FIRE

FIRE LAKE: A trailer home, belonging to the Paul Beach Family on Fish Hatchery Road in Fire Lake was completely destroyed by fire late last Saturday afternoon.

The fire apparently broke out in the bedroom of one of the Beach children, and rapidly spread throughout the trailer and lean-to.

Both the Chugiak and Eagle River Volunteer Fire Companies responded, but the home was completely destroyed.

Mrs. Beach and her three children were at home when the fire broke out. The origin of the blaze has not been determined.

Clothing, household items etc. for the Beach family may be left at the Eagle River Bowl or at Valu City. Mrs. Beach wears a size 18, Mr. Beach is a size medium in shirts and jackets and 28-31 in trousers. The children, Paul Allen, age 8 wears a size 10, Jamie, age 2 1/2 wears a size 4, and Laura age 1, wears a size 1 1/2 years.

The family is staying at the O.R. Wolford residence on Fish Hatchery Road for the present. The loss was not covered by insurance.

BIG LAKE: Two Peters Creek men were injured, one seriously when their plane crashed at the northeast end of the Big Lake airstrip last Thursday morning.

The plane, a Piper Super Cub, of Oberg Road at mile 21 1/2. The pilot was Kenneth D. Huling of Foothill Drive at mile 22.

The men had just taken off at approximately 7:15am, when the crash took place.

Hendrickson was quoted as saying that although he and Huling did not notice any ice fog when they took off, the encountered it at approximately 100 feet altitude. Huling apparently lost visual contact with the ground, and the crash resulted.

Hendrickson, suffered a broken jaw, bruises and facial injuries. He was able to get out of the crashed plane unassisted. Huling was trapped in the front seat, and unconscious. Ken Hughes of the Big Lake Airstrip, assisted by his son used hacksaws, a wrecker and a tractor to cut and pull the aircraft apart in order to get Huling out. It took nearly forty five minutes to get the unconscious man out of the wrecked aircraft.

A helicopter which had been summoned from Elmendorf Air Force base took both men to Providence hospital. Hendrickson has been since released. Huling is hospitalized, where he is suffering from a skull fracture, two broken jaws, facial injuries, two broken ankles, and a broken foot. He has not fully regained consciousness, but during periods of semi-consciousness he had indicated that he recognizes members of his family.

The plane is considered a total loss. The men had driven to Big Lake that morning, planning to hunt moose. They had a full load of gasoline aboard when the plane crashed.

OIL TRUCK OVERTURNS OF BIRCHWOOD ROAD

BIRCHWOOD: A semi trailer oil truck, overturned on the Birchwood Road last night while trying to avoid a head on collision with a passenger car.

The accident took place just off the Glenn Highway at mile 21.

The truck belonged to Balif and Roberts of Copper Center. The name of the driver of the other car was not released, but it was said to have been a woman.

Damage to the truck was apparently limited to a broken window in the cab. The front fender of the passenger car was only scraped in the encounter.

Neither driver was reported to be injured.

To be eligible to belong to a 4H Club, the boy or girl must be nine years of age or older.

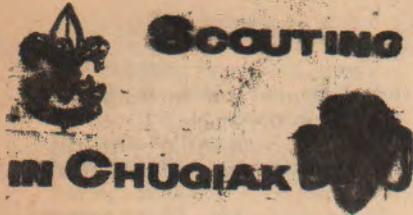

HEAT CABLE CAN PREVENT TROUBLE

An ounce of prevention will prevent several hours of work and much inconvenience if freeze protection is provided on exposed water pipes, according to Axel B. Carlson, Extension engineer, University of Alaska.

Electric heating cable protects pipes in a water supply system against freezing even in the coldest weather. However, heating cables or tapes cannot be used effectively if attached to the outside of plastic pipe.

The length of cable needed depends on the total length of exposed pipe and the amount of heat needed. Heating cables or tapes are manufactured in lengths from four to 160 feet and range in wattage from 24 to 860 watts, Carlson said. Wattages per foot vary slightly depending on the manufacturer. The amount of heat required depends on the size of the pipe and the minimum temperature at which it must be protected.

There are two methods of installing the cable. It may be run through the pipe in the water or it may be attached to the outside. The first method is more economical in power consumption, but the installation is more difficult.

The most common way is to wrap the cable around the pipe in a spiral fashion, attaching it to the pipe with friction tape. The cost of operation will be less if insulation is used after the cable is attached.

For automatic, efficient operation of the heating cable, a thermostat should be installed. It will turn on or shut off the circuit as the temperature fluctuates. The thermostat should be installed on the coldest part of the pipes to insure protection of the entire system. Heating tapes are manufactured with built-in thermostats which require no additional electrical wiring.

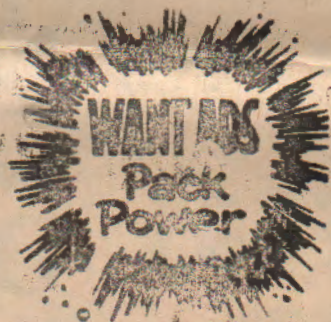
