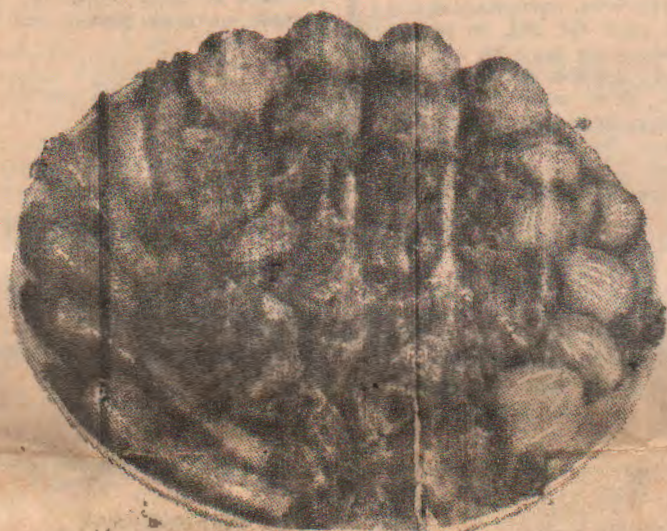

CHUGIAK HIGH SCHOOL

CHUGIAK: A full time Borough Public Health Nurse has been assigned to the Greater Chugiak Area, according to Mrs. Bruce Robinson, President of the Chugiak Health and Welfare Council.

Mrs. Etta Thurmond will serve in this capacity and will maintain offices at the Chugiak Library and at the Eagle River Baptist Church.

Mrs. Thurmond plans to maintain the same high standards to which the resident of the area have become accustomed, and in addition is planning such innovations as; parenthood classes, classes on the understanding of alcoholism, and well child consultations in addition to the well child clinics.

Mrs. Thurmond will be working closely with Mrs. Koontz, the school nurse, and will make home calls.

The new days and hours for the Well Baby clinics will be the 1st Wednesday of the month at Eagle River from 1:00pm until 3:30pm, and the 3rd Wednesday of the month at the Chugiak office, also between the hours of 1:00pm and 3:30pm.

Mrs. Thurmond is planning to have a phone installed at her office.

The phone number and the times for the classes will be published at a future date.

COLD STORAGE PLANT TO BE BUILT HERE

EAGLE RIVER: A corporation which is planning to build a cold storage and meat processing plant was formed here recently.

The organization, which will be known as Eagle River Cold Storage Inc. President of the Corporation is James Ekstedt of Eagle River, Vice President is Bob Paclili of Anchorage, Treasurer is Herman Jones of Eagle River and Secretary is Dan Ekstedt of Anchorage.

The group has received a Small Business Association Loan and construction is already underway. The plant will be located at mile 13 1/2 on the Glenn Highway. Excavation was already begun when the freeze came, and will be resumed in the spring.

The plant will be located in a building 50 feet by 50 feet in size. The estimated cost is \$60,000 and has been designed by Anchorage architects Maynard and Schultz.

According to Jim Ekstedt, spokesman for the corporation, there will be from 300 to 400 lockers of various sizes available for rent, a sharp freeze and a large cooling room. The building will be constructed to borough and state health specifications, and the services of a graduate butcher and meat cutter will be available.

INTERESTED CROWD ATTENDS HEARING

EAGLE RIVER: Over 300 interested area residents crowded into the multi-purpose room of the Eagle River school last Friday to attend a public hearing which had been called by the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

The purpose of this hearing was to hear evidence concerning the population within the area of a five mile radius of the Eagle River Bowl. A alcoholic beverage dispensing license had been issued to the 300 Room of the Eagle River Bowl last August based evidence submitted by the management of that establishment, which they claimed showed a population of over 4500 persons in the above mentioned area.

A group, calling itself the Eagle River Citizens Committee had protested the issuance of the license, claiming the population of that area to be under the figure indicated, and asking that the license be revoked.

Conducting the meeting were the members of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board, William Boehles, Olaf Lilliegraven, and the Chairman of the Board, Keith Reichle, who acted as moderator. Secretary for the board, Mrs. Cleo Kelly recording the entire proceedings.

HERE AND THERE

Taxation, in some form or the other, is a necessity. The need for such, while often obvious, is sometime obscure and the payment is always a cause of annoyance. A productive byproduct of tax payments is the privilege of vigorously speaking out as a "taxpaying citizen".

The manner in which taxes are imposed is a somewhat depraved interpretation of the adage, "He who has, gets". What I'm trying to get at is that our tax structure has a way of tearing at a person's initiative in his attempt to make a little better life for himself. If a person improves his position, he carries a lot of other people along with him. This is not to be lightly dismissed as an undesirable result. However, a lot of people would feel more encouraged were they not to carry as many along their own road to improvement.

At a first glance, this may appear to be a little selfish. If at second glance, it still appears so, then a lot of us are selfish. There is much evidence to support the belief that once carried, it is difficult to get off and go on one's own.

For a specific and local example, our property tax structure is about as unfairly illogical as possible. In most any situation except governmental services, one gets just about what he pays for and, in general, the price is the same for all. With taxes, all receive the same basic services, but no one pays the same. Apparently, it is a trademark of a democracy that he who pays least gets most.

The cost of governmental services, at all levels, must be met. But why should those capable of paying more have to pay at the same rate or at an increasing rate of taxation. Because a piece of property, frequently by accident, has a higher evaluation does not mean the owner has a higher capacity to pay the increased tax.

Mr. A. and B. have and have had identical salaries. Five years ago they bought homes at the same X price. Today, because of one or several numerous factors not decided or controlled by either gentlemen, Mr. A's home is evaluated at \$3000.00 more than Mr. B's. As an investment, Mr. A. could sell at a profit (and pay capital gains tax), but he doesn't want to sell. He just wants to live happily in his home and not be bothered with excessive taxes.

A logical tax structure would consist of rate steps increasing at a declining rate - the exact mill assessment to be computed by the proper statisticians. Such a scale would not overburden the marginal income, would not excite the middle group, nor penalize those in the higher group. It would offer encouragement to all for the improvement of property as such betterment would carry only a slight penalty.

This is only a superficial glance at this perhaps not original proposal. If there are any supporters, perhaps we could organize. But no protest marches, please, nor tax-ins!

STUDENTS ASKED TO DESIGN HEROISM MEDAL

JUNEAU: Governor William A. Egan has extended an invitation to all Alaska school students to submit designs for a State heroism medal authorized by the last session of the Legislature.

Chapter 12 of the Alaska Session laws directs the Governor to "make arrangement for the designing of the medal for heroism through a statewide design competition participated in by the school children of Alaska."

William T. Zahradnichek, Alaska commissioner of education, is now sending to all school administrators a memorandum on this competition and design specifications. Deadline for submission of designs is December 1, 1965.

Judging of the designs and selection of the one to be used for the medal will be done by a committee composed of the following distinguished Juneau residents; Rear Admiral G.D. Synon, commandant, 17th Coast Guard District; Mrs. Rie Munoz, Alaska artist; Thomas A. Morgan, businessman; Joseph Brion American Legion service officer for Alaska; and Brigadier General William S. Elmore, Alaska adjutant general.

The heroism medal, according to the statutes, is to be presented by the Governor "directly or posthumously to any citizen of the State in recognition of a valorous and heroic deed performed by him in the saving of a life or for injury or death or threat of injury or death incurred by him in the service of

the State or his community or on behalf of the health, welfare or safety of other persons. The medal shall be awarded by the Governor with an appropriate ceremony."

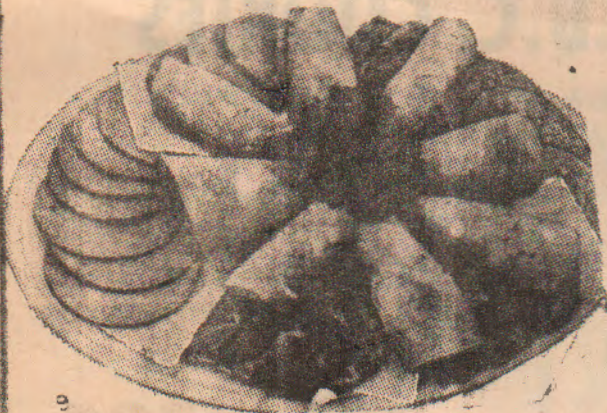

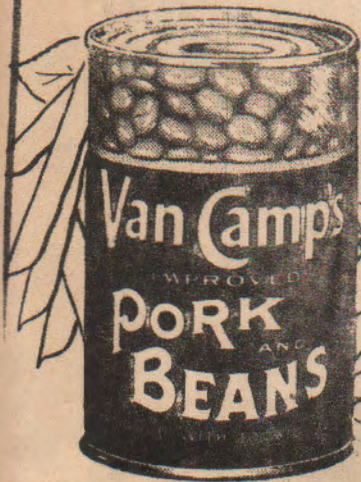

According to Reischle, the license had been issued to Hazenberg, Hazenberg and Smith last August when they had applied for the license submitting various documents which had satisfied the board that the local population exceeded the 4500 figure. These documents included figures obtained from the Matanuska Electric Association, the Greater Anchorage Area Borough School records, Standard Oil Company and the local Postmaster.

James Wannamaker, attorney for the Eagle River Citizens committee, claimed that these figures did not show that the population lay within the five mile radius required, and offered in evidence an affidavit prepared by Jerry Overstreet, an official of the GAAB Planning and Zoning Commission. This affidavit showed an estimate of the number of dwellings within that area, and using the national average of 3.2 persons per household, would indicate the population to be less than the minimum required for the issuance of the license, he stated.

Attorney for the Eagle River Bowl, C.J. Occhipinti, along with Chuck Smith, one of the partners of the Bowling establishment, offered additional statistics to support their claim, and showed charts which had been prepared, based on a report which had been published by Operation Chuglak High School in 1960, which showed the area school population at that time, along with projections and graphs which would indicate future growth. Smith said, also that the current school enrollment from grades one through six at the Eagle River school, which draws students from within a three mile radius had been used in preparing the charts. The conclusions drawn by the chart showed the population to be in excess of the minimum figure, Smith said.

Occhipinti asked the board that since the license had already been issued, did the burden of proof lie with those protesting it. Mr. Riesle said that it did.

Also under question was the proximity of 300 Room to the Eagle River Baptist Church. According to State Law, an establishment which dispenses Alcoholic Beverages must be no closer than 200 feet to a building in which religious services are conducted. The Eagle River Bowl was found to be 192 feet from the corner of the church building. The chairman of the Board explained that the board had determined that the wing of the church which was closest to the bowling alley was no longer being used for religious services, and therefore they felt that the distance was sufficient.

Having heard all evidence and opinions on the subject, the board will study the question and render their decision at their next regular meeting, which was scheduled to take place within two weeks.

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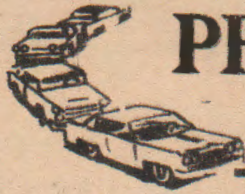
