ANCHORAGE: Glenn Briggs, As-semblyman for Section one of the ANCHORAGE: Greater Anchorage Area Borough said today that the assembly is under constant pressure by the people to take immediate action to eliminate or at least relieve the dog problem, under the Boroughwide dog control power voted by the at the October election.

Briggs said that a proposal has been made that the type of dog control measured in effect in Anchorage and the Spenard Public Utility Dist-rict be extended to the entire Bor-

As proposed, to carry out such a program, eleven persons would be hired, three new vehicles purchased, additional pens and structures would be built and equipped at an estimated cost of 200,00 annually.

Briggs said that he felt such a plan would be too costly and unwork-

able in rural sections such as the Greater Chugiak Area, He stated that he himself proposed at alternate program for the areas outside the city and it's densly settled fringe. Brigg's plan calls for the authorization of the Assembly to appoint or designate citizens of their less densely populated areas to serve as dog wardens during the specified period of greatest pack activity for a three day period in the near future, and a three day period in April or May. During these particular periods, the desig-nated dog wardens would be anth-orized to desiroy all dogs that on leash or confined.

When asked w'nt means he sug-gested be used to destroy these dogs, Briggs added that he recom-mended shooting. He added that "Obviously to be affective and ac-ceptable to the public, an advanced educational program would be necessary and desirable." He then quoted Dr. Jack Rasmussan DVM to the effect that a dominant banding season of dogs commences about mid Novembe, and extends through most of the winter. He said that hunger accounts for this extended period of pack activity. The second dominant breeding period occurs around April 1 through May 15th. Pack activity for this shorter period es explained by the theory that food is more readily available at this time of year. mid November and extends through

this time of year.

Briggs feels such an approach would cost very little in tax money and be far more effective than the city type program,

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




