BRIGGS OFFERS DOG CONTROL PLAN

MUSHERS RACE FOR CASH PRIZES

EAGLE RIVER: The Chuglak Dog Musher's Club sponsored a money race last Sunday, at Eagle River, with seventeen teams competing.

The first musher to complete the 9 1/2 mile course, was Larry Gibson of the U.S. Army in 34.29 minutes. Second was Bob Poole of Anchorage in 38.40 and Third place went to John Armstrong, also of Ft. Richardson with 41.49.

Because the Army competitors are not permitted to accept cash prizes, the first place money went to Poole, and second place to John Rine of Anchorage who finished in 42.15, and third place to Fred Conley of Chuglak, fifth team to cross the line in 42.45.

A special prize of 10# of dog food was donated by Suburban Feed and Supply of Eagle River. This went to the ninth place team, or the one who finished at the half-way point. Dick Mackey of Anchorage mushed that team coming in at 44.19.

This race featured the first woman musher to compete this season. She was Marie Clifford, the former Marie Welles, well known former Junior musher. She finished fifteenth in 58.25. There were several entries from Elmendorf this week, although none of them placed.

There will be another race next Sunday, with a purse of \$100 to be divided between the top three teams.

ANCHORAGE: Glenn Briggs, Assemblyman for Section One of the Greater Anchorage Area Borough said today that the assembly is under constant pressure by the people to take immediate action to eliminate or at least relieve the dog problem, under the Boroughwide dog control power voted by the at the October election.

Briggs said that a proposal has been made that the type of dog control measured in effect in Anchorage and the Spenard Public Utility District be extended to the entire Borough.

As proposed, to carry out such a program, eleven persons would be hired, three new vehicles purchased, additional pens and structures would be built and equipped at an estimated cost of 200,000 annually.

Briggs said that he felt such a plan would be too costly and unworkable in rural sections such as the Greater Chuglak Area. He stated that he himself proposed an alternate program for the areas outside the city and its densely settled fringe. Briggs' plan calls for the authorization of the Assembly to appoint or designate citizens of their less densely populated areas to serve as dog wardens during the specified period of greatest pack activity for a three day period in the near future, and a three day period in April or May. During these particular periods, the designated dog wardens would be authorized to destroy all dogs not on leash or confined.

When asked what means he suggested be used to destroy these dogs, Briggs added that he recommended shooting. He added that "Obviously to be effective and acceptable to the public, an advanced educational program would be necessary and desirable." He then quoted Dr. Jack Rasmussen DVM to the effect that a dominant banding season of dogs commences about mid November and extends through most of the winter. He said that hunger accounts for this extended period of pack activity. The second dominant breeding period occurs around April 1 through May 15th. Pack activity for this shorter period is explained by the theory that food is more readily available at this time of year.

Briggs feels such an approach would cost very little in tax money and be far more effective than the city type program.

This matter of telephone bugging is alarming. And what began as not a too serious "error in judgement" in the nearby town has developed into a situation that cannot receive the humorous treatment originally planned for this column. The extent of bugging remains to be determined. Whether or not extensive the very thought is frightening.

Frankly, I don't, and I hardly think my friends do, have telephone conversations during which what we might say would be on any interest whatsoever to other than to whom we are speaking. However, I do not like the idea of my personal conversations being monitored. It could happen you know; it has in other governments, and any beginning is to be taken seriously as the formation of an insidious violation of personal liberty.

Again, it is alarming how easily various encroachments develop without notice. Although I don't

particularly like the word suspicious, it might be appropriate were we to become a little suspicious -- at least, questioning. Many items, some of them repugnant, can find their way into our way of life unless we can occasionally take an objective view of various events and developments.

Regardless of the outcome of the wire tapping situation, perhaps it can be used as a lesson: that such things can happen, and thankfully, preventative, possibly punitive, action can be properly and legally applied.

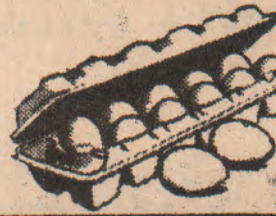

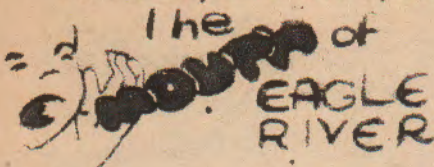

Luther Simulated Christmas Scene

Most everyone has heard the story of Martin Luther and the Christmas tree. Luther lived from 1483 to 1546 and, so the story goes, was one night so impressed by the sight of snow-covered evergreens sparkling in the moonlight that he returned to his home and tried to reproduce the memorable scene for his family.

He chose a small evergreen tree and, to simulate the reflections of the starlit heavens, he attached a number of lighted candles.

Christmas trees, of course, did not become popular until years later.

"The Cricket"

Charles Dickens is best remembered for "The Christmas Carol" — but this was not the most popular of his Christmas stories during his lifetime. An instant hit with the public was "The Cricket on the Hearth," a touching story of a father's attempts to shield his blind daughter from the realities of life. Shortly after it appeared in 1846, some 12 different theatres in London were presenting dramatic versions of "The Cricket."
