PRINCIPAL HURT IN CAR WRECK



FT. RICHARDSON: William P. Benyish, Principal of the Chugiak Grade School, is in the Anchorage Presbyterian Hospital, suffering with injuries sustained from a two car collision which took place at mile 12 at 8:50pm on Monday December 28th.

Benyish was northbound when he lost control of his car and skidded into the path of a second vehicle which was southbound.

Both cars, the 1962 Jeep, driven by Benyish and the 1955 Chevrolet panel driven by Carroll H. Dodd of Eagle River were said to be total losses, according to State Police.

Benyish was alone in his car at the time of the accident. With Dodd, was his son, Thomas Dodd 16, who suffered lacerations of the head and body, and the loss of several teeth.

Benyish is hospitalized with possible broken ribs and internal injuries.

Benyish was cited for driving left of center.

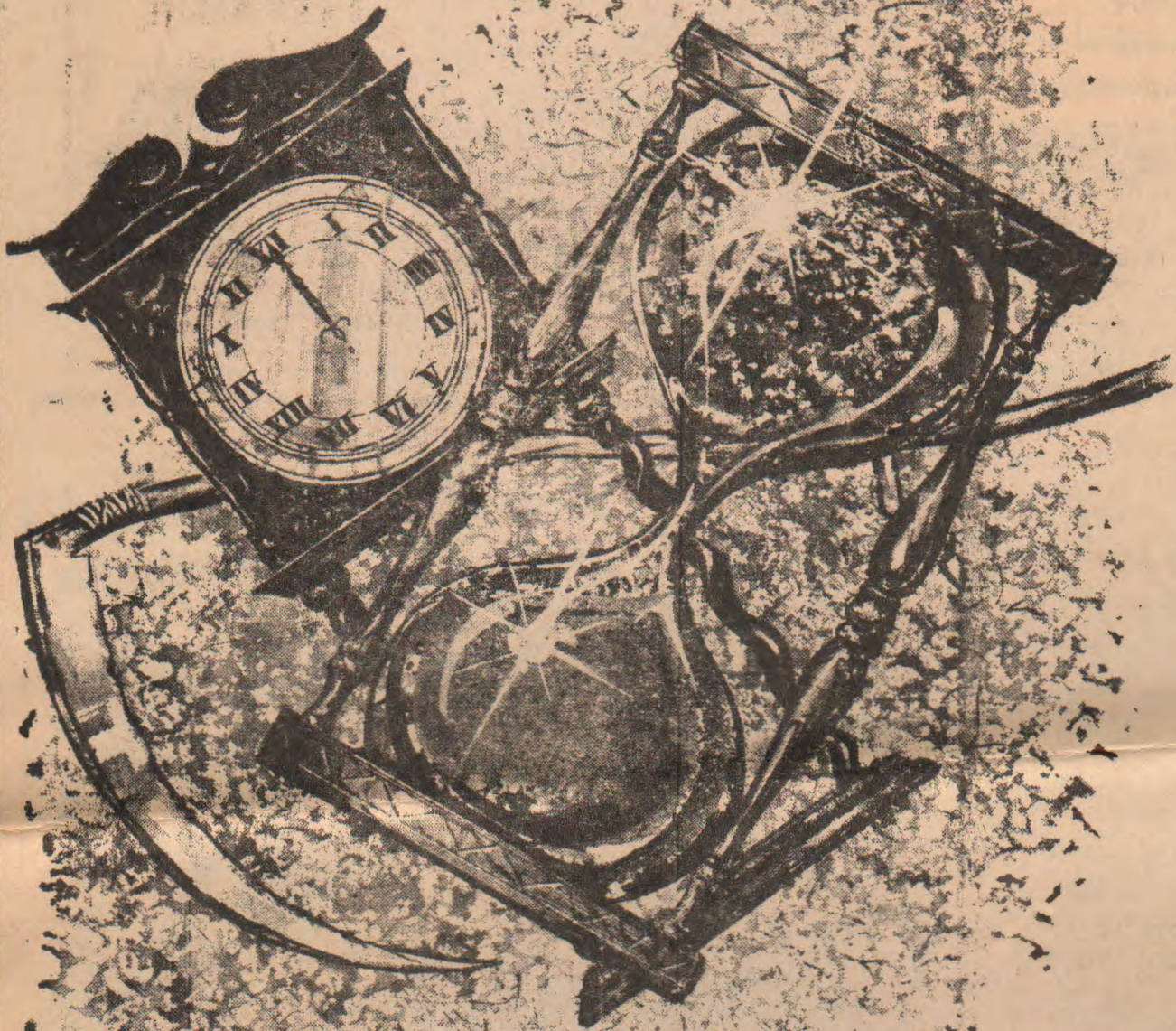

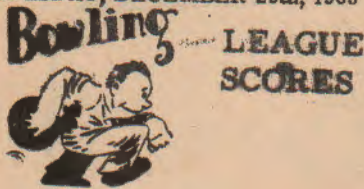

The AJBC members of each winning team received a trophy.

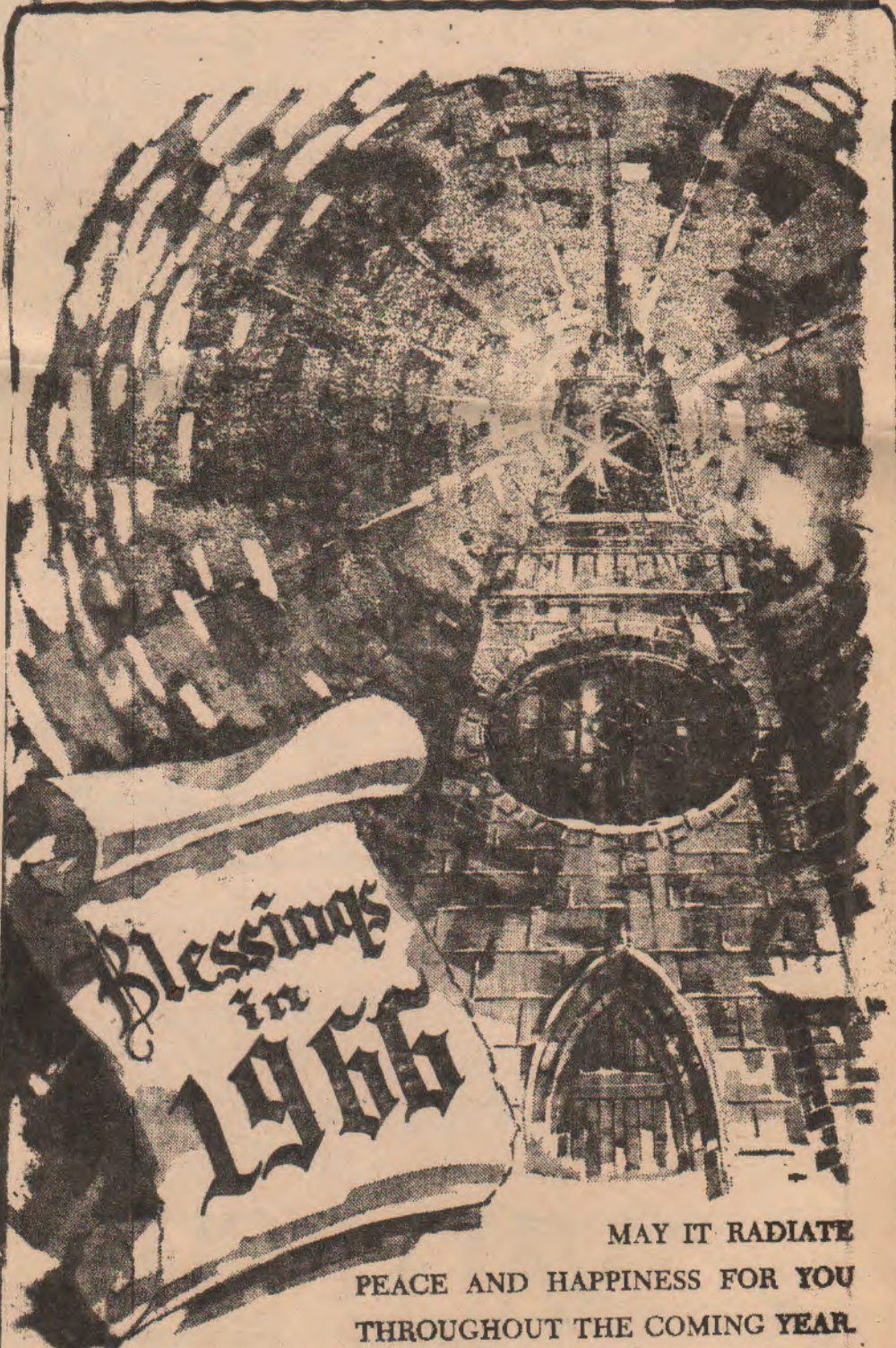

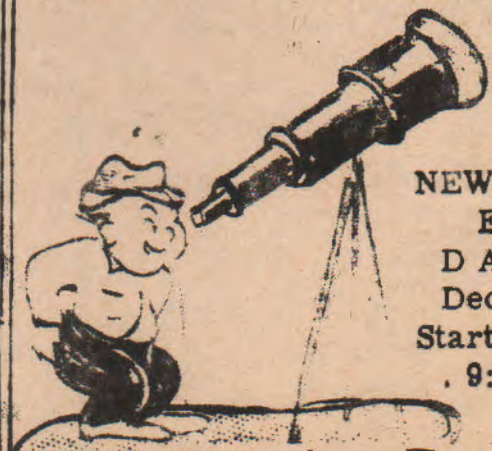

CHURCH PLANS BUILDING CRUSADE

OLD CHUGIAK: The Rev. Walter E. Hoover, of Lakeside, Ohio will be the director of the building crusade at the Chugiak Methodist Church from December 30th, 1965 to January 11th, 1966.

Rev. Hoover is one of a score of Methodist ministers under special assignment of their bishops to guide churches in the raising of church budgets and capital funds for their expanding needs. The director is employed by the Department of Finance and Field Service of the National Division of Missions of his church, with headquarters in Philadelphia.

Before assuming his present position ten years ago, he served twenty years in the pastorate. He is a graduate of Ohio Wesleyan University and Boston University School of Theology.

Rev. Hoover will deliver the sermon at the 11:00 am morning worship service on both January 2nd and 9th, using as his topics, "Christian Stewardship in the present Day", and "Man's Dominion Over God's Creation." Rev. John J. Shaffer, pastor, will also share in the services.
