EAGLE RIVER: A long awaited and much needed service was made available to the residents of the Greater Chugiak Area, with the opening of the Eagle River Branch of the First National Bank of Anchorage this week.

The new branch is located in the addition to the Eagle River Shopping Center, and offers complete banking services.

Manager of the new branch is Tom Wharton, of Anchorage, with Lois Nicolet who resides at the Shady Lane subdivision in the Muldoon Area as his Secretary.

Other members of the bank staff are all local residents and familiar faces to the most of the customers at the new Branch. Tellers are Margaret Crowley of Eagle River and Betty Wolford of Fire Lake. Ada Stephens, who lives in Old Chugiak is the bookkeeper.

For the remainder of this week, the new bank is observing it's Grand Opening, and serving coffee and doughnuts. Also as a special inducement to all those who open an account at the new branch, a Polaris Snow-Traveler Colt is being offered as a prize, with the drawing scheduled for January 7th. Anyone opening an account prior to that date is eligible to a chance to win this prize.

Banking hours are 10:00am to 3:00pm daily, with the exception of Thursdays when the hours are 10:00am until 7:00pm.

A night depository and mail teller service are also available for the convenience of the depositors.

SCHOOL BUS IN WRECK

OLD CHUGIAK: A school bus from Ninilchik was involved in a two car accident at mile 18 at 4:00pm on the afternoon of December 5th.

The bus, with approximately 20 passenger on board was attempting to pass a passenger car. The driver, Emil R. Bartolawits of Clam Gulch, pulled back into his lane too soon, and clipped the car he was passing with his rear bumper.

The front bumper of the 1964 Plymouth driven by Eva Endicott of mile 20, sustained a scraped front fender. Damage was estimated at \$150. No damage was sustained by the bus. No citations were issued.

ARMY TEAMS AGAIN LEAD IN LOCAL SLED DOG RACES

EAGLE RIVER: The two top teams at the Sunday sled dog races were again brought in by U.S. Army mushers.

The Chugiak Dog mushers club held a trophy race at mile 14 1/2 last Sunday, with the 1st place team brought in by Joey Reddington, who completed the 6.3 mile course in 21.50. Second place went to James Van Houton also of Ft. Richardson who made the run in 23.15. Third place team was mushed by Orville Lee of Anchorage with a time of 24.30.

A total of 22 entrants left the starting gate with all (including 7 local mushers) finishing.

The most spectacular finish was made by the team to come in 20th place, Richard Biggers of Anchorage.

Biggers sled began to break up somewhere along the trail, but he managed to finish, although by the time he crossed the finish line all that was left of his sled was the runners and the brakes. Biggers was laying on the runners with the broken pieces of his sled clutched in his arms. He managed to bring in all the parts of his disintegrated sled.

The Chugiak Club has scheduled another race at the mile 14 1/2 location for next Sunday, December 12th. This will be a trophy race along a 10 mile course.

LOCAL SCHOOLS GET BIG ALLOTMENT

ANCHORAGE: A healthy slice of the \$7.8 million school budget for 1967 has been allocated for the building and enlarging of schools in the Greater Chugiak Area, according to Glenn Briggs Assemblyman from Section 1.

A total of \$1,035,000.00 has been set aside for Chugiak, this to include a grade school in the Birchwood area at the cost of \$800,000 and addition and alterations to the Chugiak High School at the cost of \$235,000.00.

The Birchwood grade school will be a 14 classroom building plus multi-purpose room for grades 1-7. It will be similar in design to the Northwood and Chester Valley schools. Manley and Mayer will be the architects on a re-use basis.

The additions to Chugiak High School will be for three standard classrooms, three team-teaching stations four seminar rooms and additional rest-rooms. Re-modeling the band room and improvements to the grounds, driveways and parking areas are also included.

The location for the Birchwood school has not yet been determined, but will probably be in the vicinity of the High School.

Construction should begin this coming summer, with the schools ready for occupancy by the fall of 1967.

I speak from experience and fear no contradiction from ex-servicemen when I say that no one is more lonely than a lonely G.I. Unfortunately and untrue, it has been traditional that servicemen are something different; a group to be proud of, but to let alone whenever possible. This feeling has somewhat changed during recent years because most every Tom, Dick and Hoe has seen or will see military duty. Yet, the individual serviceman, away from home and family ties, frequently young and socially unaggressive is lonely.

True there are military facilities and service organizations that make an attempt to overcome this. Such efforts are commendable and frequently successful, but as a serviceman, I felt such activities were precluded by the fact that I was and would remain a stranger in the community; an outsider who was to receive designated attention to keep my morale up.

More and more, the military establishment has come to realize that men and women do not need leave their community spirit and participation behind when they enter the armed forces. At the same time, communities are realizing that the men and women in service are no different from those not in service. It is surprising that active realization was so slow in coming to the front, especially since there is hardly a family who has not had, or will have, some one in military service.

Recently, the Eagle River Lions Club extended this community-military relationship by adoption of Headquarters Battery, 4th Missile Battalion stationed at nearby Ft. Richardson. I feel certain that the Lions Club harbors no desire that this expression of friendship be exclusive. The handclasp of community friendship is one which all the people of the community must share.

No one is more lonely than a lonely serviceman -- especially at Christmas time.

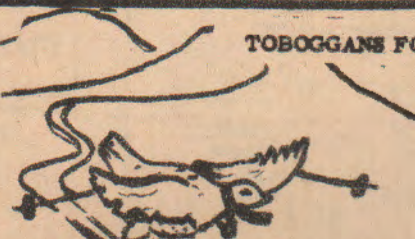

To be eligible for 4H, the child must be nine years of age or older.

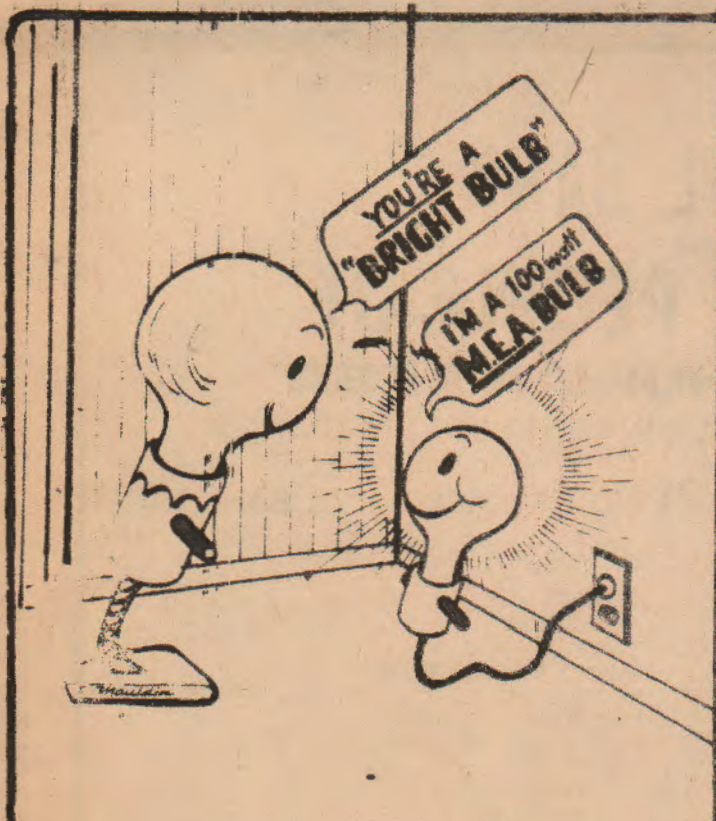

She is presently recovering at her home on the Birchwood Loop Road.

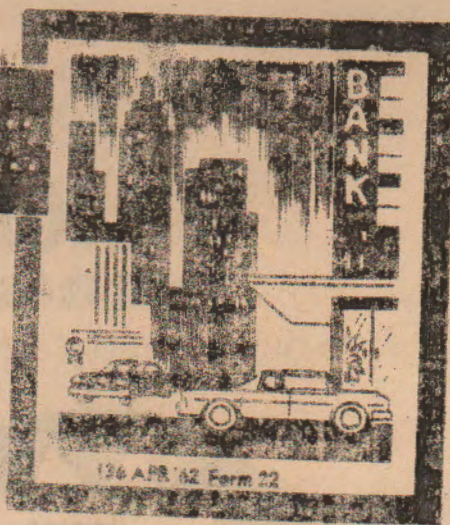

The Varsity Mustangs took their second and third straight victories in two games over the Copper Valley Bucks.

The Mustangs outscored the Copper Valley team in every quarter of play, and kept close all the way through and once they were ahead in the third quarter, they were really never headed for the lead.

They started the game right with a 10-9 first quarter score. In the second quarter, again the Bucks were put down by the Mustang offense, the Mustangs outscoring them 18-15. It was in the third quarter that the Mustangs really extended their lead when their fast break offense began to work, the Mustangs outscoring 23-12 for a third quarter tally of 51-36. In the last quarter, the Mustangs could lay back on their lead, but in fact they increased their lead and held the Bucks down 17-14 in the last quarter for a final score of 68-50, the second straight win for the Mustangs.

The JV's were outclassed, due to the ineligibility of several Mustang

player. But in the first quarter the JV Mustangs held their own with the Bucks to a 6-8 first quarter tally, a lead for the Bucks. But in the second quarter the Mustangs let the Bucks go by to a 10-23 halftime score. Unable to keep pace with the Copper Valley team, they were outscored in all but the last quarter, with the quarterly tally tied 15-15. The final score was 55-29, the second straight loss for the JV. Scorers were Dave McNutt 5, Steve Willis 3, Gary Hoag 4, Harvey Pullen 6, Louis Edwards 4, and Butch Miller 2.

In their second game of play against the Copper Valley team, confident of a victory the Mustangs played a somewhat closer game in the final minutes. But the Mustangs started better with a 16-4 first quarter lead, and kept their lead to a 34-22 halftime tally. In the third quarter, contrary to what happened the night before, the Mustang defense fell down and they let the Bucks outscore them 10-18, still leaving the Mustangs ahead 44-40. In the last quarter the Mustangs kept their lead and at the end extended their lead two points for a 64-58 victory, their third straight.

The JV Mustangs played a better game, with Steve Willis scoring from the center with 17 points. It was not until the third quarter that the Bucks really broke ahead of the Mustangs. The first quarter score was 7-8 and the halftime score was 15-19, a lead in both cases for the Bucks. It was in the third quarter that the Bucks ran away from them 9-15, evidently to much to overcome. In the last quarter, however, they started working again to outscore the Bucks in the final quarter, but still a win for the Bucks 33-45.

Scorers were Gary Hoag 3, Steve Willis 17, Harvey Pullen 4, Louis Edwards 4, Dave McNutt 2 and Dan Winter with 2.
