That one is for Spot.' But here we have the opening of the door to the accomplishment which means so much in so many ways.

I have known several adults who were unable to read and write, but I never discussed with them their feelings concerning theirlauk of 3 ability in this field. It would be interesting to know, in depth, how they feel about it. What may be equally tragic, is the person who can read words, and may understand the meaning of those words, but have no concept of the meaning when the words become sent-

ences and paragraphs.

I once attended a lecture on communication given by a man and wife team who had developed a method of using words that the majority of readers (the overall population) could comprehend. The system was interesting, but a somewhat sad commentary in that it would have everyone reading at the fifth grade level. There is nothing wrong with reading at that grade level if
