CHUGIAK: The new Chugiak Sanitary Fill (dump) is now officially open, according to Dale Briggs, spokesman for the Chugiak Benefit Association.

The dump will be open only on Saturday and Sunday from the hours of 9am until 5pm, on an experimental basis. As days grow longer, it may be opened during the evening Briggs said. He also suggested that any local residents who might have a preference for other hours of operation call either Bruce Robinson CBA President, or Mrs. Russell Oberg, Secretary and let them know their preference.

The new dumping area is located across the Eagle River Bridge. The access road to the dump is 1 1/10 miles from the bridge on the east side of the highway.

John Grasse, who will be operating the dump, stated that no one will be permitted to use the area except during the hours listed above, at which time an attendant will be present to show where the dumping is to be done and to take payment.

Charges for dumping, according to Grasse will be 25¢ per yard, with a minimum charge of 50¢.

Grasse will be operating the dump under contr ct to CBA, with a percentage of the monies collected to be returned to CBA to be used for community health projects.

The division of highways has not yet announced the closure of the old dump on the Birchwood Road, but it is expected that this will be determined at meeting which is taking place today.

Since our child was in infancy, we have read to him at bedtime. The other night, instead of choosing something for me to read to him, he selected a book to read to me. Sure, the words weren't long, nor the meanings deep; mostly such sentences as: Mother said, "Oh, Sally. That one is for Spot." But here we have the opening of the door to the accomplishment which means so much in so many ways.

I have known several adults who were unable to read and write, but I never discussed with them their feelings concerning their lack of ability in this field. It would be interesting to know, in depth, how they feel about it. What may be equally tragic, is the person who can read words, and may understand the meaning of those words, but have no concept of the meaning when the words become sentences and paragraphs.

I once attended a lecture on communication given by a man and wife team who had developed a method of using words that the majority of readers (the overall population) could comprehend. The system was interesting, but a somewhat sad commentary in that it would have everyone reading at the fifth grade level. There is nothing wrong with reading at that grade level if

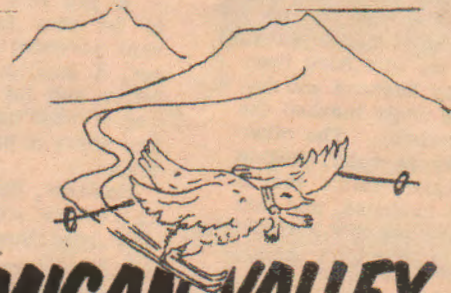

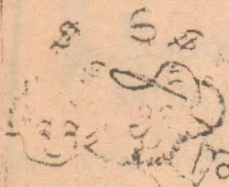

I don't feel that a wife owes her husband blind loyalty in the face of something she believes to be morally wrong.



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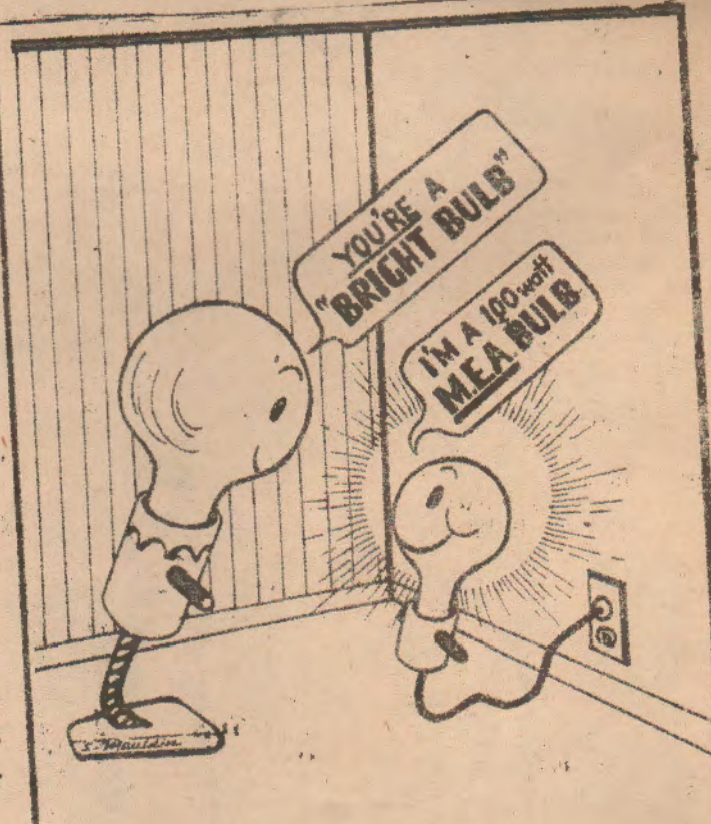

The prospective bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd B. Gee, of Marathon Iowa.

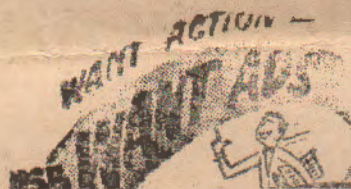
The wedding is planned for June 12th.

The meeting will take place at home of their leader Mrs. Daniel Brion on Birchwood Road.



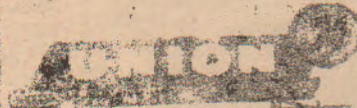
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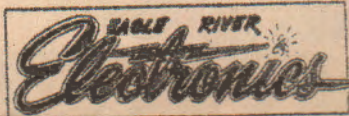

SPORTS REVIEW

The Mustang teams played a total of five games in the past week. On Friday Night, the Chugiak Mustangs played the Number 1 Western Alaskan team, the Fairbanks Malemutes.

The Mustangs got off to a fast first period start and the score stood at 3-28 in the Malemutes favor. The halftime score was 12-63, still in favor of the Malemutes.
