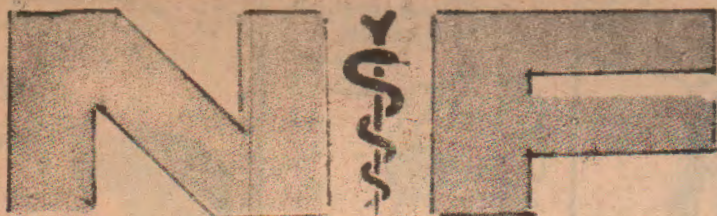

OLD CHUGIAK: A car which had been stolen earlier in Anchorage was recovered at mile 21 the same evening by the local State Police.

The vehicle had apparently been taken on January 14th by two men.

They then drove to Phillips Texaco Station at mile 14 1/2 and asked the attendant to fill the tank with gasoline. Then they asked for him three quarts of oil "to go". While the attendant was getting the oil, the pair drove off without paying for the gasoline.

The attendant then called the state police to notify them of the incident.

Apparently what happened after that, as reconstructed by the local State Trooper, was the pair, upon approaching the Birchwood Road turnoff at mile 21, spotted the red light atop the patrol car. The trooper at the time had not yet received the call and had stopped there to question another motorist. The pair in the stolen car, appeared from the the skid marks on the road had applied the brakes, lost control of the car and slid into the ditch. They then left the car and ran off into the woods. The trooper did not notice the car until he had received a call on his radio telling of the incident and turned back toward Anchorage in an attempt to intercept the car. The vehicle was undamaged.

According to the attendant at the Service Station, the men appeared to be between 18 and 23 years of age.

NONE INJURED IN REAR END CRASH

BIRCHWOOD: There were no injuries in a rear end collision which occurred on the Birchwood Loop Road last Thursday evening.

Mrs. Elsie Oberg of Peters Creek was attempting to move her stalled 1959 Rambler station wagon from the road in front of the Chugiak High School, when a 1965 Willys Station Wagon driven by Marion (Hank) Ankrom of Birchwood came around a curve in the road and unable to stop in time, crashed into the rear of the Oberg car.

According to state police, when the trooper arrived at the scene, he found Ankrom's car with his passenger (Tina Stapanoff) seated in the vehicle at the scene of the accident, but Ankrom himself had left. He later told the trooper that he had become cold waiting and had walked to his home which was approximately one half mile from the accident scene. He was

Dear Martha,

We are renting right now, but own some property and plan to start building in the spring. Like so many of the people here, we are going to do our own work.

My husband and I are having a disagreement on what to do. He thinks we should dig a basement, finish it off this summer, and move in before next winter. He says that we can then build on top as we go along.

I have seen many families living in basements around here. Some of them have lived in them for years, with just a shell on top, or in many cases no house at all. Those I have talked to say that it costs as much to make a basement livable as it does a regular house. Alos, that once they are settled in the basement, they somehow never seem to have the time to get the rest of the house finished.

I pointed all this out to my husband, but he says it will be different with us. He says that when we get the rest of the house finished, we can make an apartment out of the basement and rent it.

I would like to get the opinion of a third party. Will you share us yours?

Dear No C.D.,

There are a number of considerations to be looked into before I would want to say thumbs up or down on a basement home. To begin with, you finances can make a great deal of difference, also is your husband an accomplished carpenter, or is he a learn as I go amateur? I personally would not want to sink a lot of work and time into making a basemen livable unless I was sure I wanted to share my home with another family in the future. I also have seen many families who appear to going to spend the rest of their lives in their basements simply because they can't afford to build a second house (this is what it amounts to). On the other hand, I can point out several very lovely homes that were built after the family had moved into the basement, with the basements turned into recreation areas according to their plan.

If you and your husband can sit down together and plan this out with someone who has some experience in the field, you should come up with a plan whereby you can make a basement apartment which can be converted to a play area with spare bedrooms when your house is completed with very little additional expense.

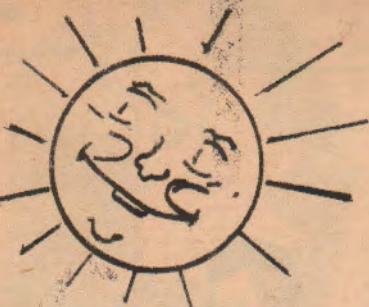
The exhibit features objects executed in silver and gold, including jewelry pieces and decorative table items such as sugar bowls, creamers and candelabra.

His work is also included in the collection of Indian Arts and Crafts Board in Washington, D. C.

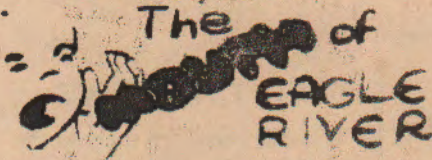

The group chose the name of "Obedience Training Club of Chugiak."

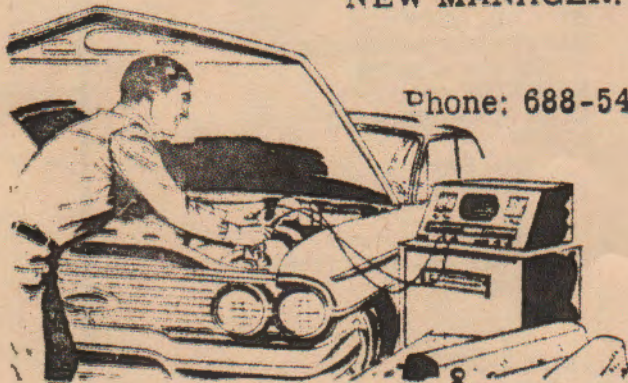
Officers elected were, President, Christa Berg, Vice President, George Scott, Secretary Julie Rouse, and Treasurer, Marion Seaberg.
