## BIRCHWOOD DUMP NOW PERMANENTLY CLOSED !



Unusual "Savings Bonds scholarship," begun through gifts at birth, is helping to finance Sandra Olney's college education.

### "Savings Bond Baby" Goes to College

Sandra Ruth Olney, Beloit College (Wis.) undergraduate from San Marino, Calif., was one of the most publicized babies in the nation in 1946, when she became the unofficial "Savings Bond Baby" of the U. S. Treasury Department.

Miss Olney's father, Larry, was a leader of the bond program during World War II and for many years thereafter until his retirement in 1957. When Sandra was born, publicity men at the Bond Division sent out a birth announcement to friends and bond associates throughout the country, with a picture showing a baby bursting through a Savings Bond.

From all corners of the U. S. came congratulations, good wishes, and gifts — dozens of them in the form of Dad's favorite product, a United States Savings Bond. Thus began the "scholarship," one which has grown through the years with the regular addition of more bonds through the Payroll Savings Plan. And to-

day Sandra is enjoying the benefits — and enthusiastically endorsing the idea of bonds-for-education to everyone she meets.

Sandra, now 18, is an attractive, hazel-eyed blonde who reveals a maturity of outlook that belies her youth. When asked how she happens to find herself at college at Beloit, far from home in San Marino, she says, "I chose a college far enough away from home to force myself to become self-reliant. I know that's what I'll have to be later, and I want to prepare for life socially as well as academically."

An international relations major, Sandra is a member of Delta Psi Delta sorority and is active in the United Church of Christ. She has delayed joining other organizations, and with good reason.

"I want to get my feet on the ground first," she says, "because I really feel that a lot of people everywhere have some kind of stake in my future."

**BIRCHWOOD:** The public dump on the Birchwood Road, (considered by most local residents as a community disgrace and public eyesore) has been permanently closed.

This announcement was made today by Clark Rogers, of the maintenance division of the Anchorage office of the Department of Highways.

According to Rogers, "No dumping" signs will be posted at the former dump site, and the State Police instructed to strictly enforce these.

Rogers said that an attempt has been made to clear away the trash which has been dumped along the road shoulder, but that because of the frozen condition of the material this is quite difficult. He said that equipment will continue to work at this, and that in time all of the area will be cleared.

Rogers has asked the cooperation of local residents in helping to enforce the no dumping ordinance by observing violators and taking down the license numbers of their vehicles and turning these over to local State Troopers.

Rogers added that the only place in the Greater Chuglak Area where dumping is legal, is the new Chuglak Sanitary Fill, located on the south side of the Eagle River Bridge.

This fill is under contract to Grasee and Miller, and is open every Saturday and Sunday between the hours of 9am and 5pm. The entrance to the Fill is located on the East side of the Glenn Highway 1 1/10 miles from the bridge. An attendant will be on duty during the above mentioned hours to accept dumping fees, and instruct the public where they are to dump.

The new Fill is operated under the supervision of the Chuglak Benefit Association, who secured the land through the efforts of the Chuglak Health Council and the Department of Health. CBA, in turn offered the operation of the fill on bid, with the contract being awarded to Grasee and Miller. A percentage of the fees is to be returned to CBA to be used for community health projects.

HERE AND THERE

It is somewhat inconceivable that last week passed without mention of the birthday anniversary of one of the greatest of all Americans-- Benjamin Franklin.

Born 17 January 1706, Franklin was to attain tremendous success in an array of fields not equaled by any other American, and perhaps not by any one person in the world.

Beginning as a printer, he developed an interest in philosophy and was instrumental in founding the American Philosophical Society. He took the initiative in establishing America's first circulating library. His interest in education led him to suggest the establishment of an academy which later became the University of Pennsylvania. His scientific activities were such as to bring him worldwide recognition. As an inventor, Franklin left many useful items including the lightning rod, bifocal glasses and the Franklin stove.

Although Franklin did not originally espouse a United States separated from Britain, he, in the course of time and events, recognized those circumstances which precluded the position of the colonies being bonded to either the crown or Parliament. He then labored for independence, helping prepare the colonies for war, assisting (in a committee of five) to write the Declaration of Independence, securing France as an ally.

After independence, Franklin remained in France for two years as something of a goodwill ambassador, acquainting Europe with our institutions and American positions. Returning to the States in 1785, although becoming aged and infirm, he continued to serve the new nation. His presence at the 1787 Constitutional Convention was perhaps an essential factor in the success of the meeting. Ben Franklin died 17 April 1790. The nation and the world mourned the passing of a great man.

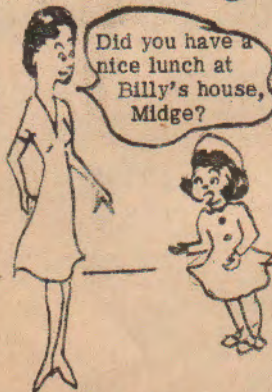

Captain Phifier of the National Security Seminar spoke on the subject of the United States in the world today.

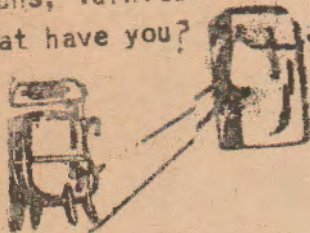
Seniors will be making their final choice on school rings and announcements from Jay Vic Brown around the 28th.

The Mustangs played the Kodiak Bears on Friday and Saturday.

In the first game on Friday, the Mustangs stayed close to the Bears at the end of the first period the score was 10-29. The Bears scored on the score 21 points to the Mustangs 16. The Mustangs kept close to the Bears for 45-70 3rd period score. In the final period of the game, the Mustangs outscored the Bears 17-12 for a final 62-82 score.
