Miss Olney's father, Larry, was Miss Olney's father, Larry, was a leader of the bond program during World War II and for many years thereafter until his retirement in 1957. When Sandra was born, publicity men at the Bond Division sent out a bitth approximement to friends. birth announcement to friends and bond associates throughout the country, with a picture showing a baby bursting through a Savings Bond.

From all corners of the U.S. came congratulations, good came congratulations, good wishes, and gifts — dozens of them in the form of Dad's favorite product, a United States Savings Bond. Thus be-gan the "scholarship," one which has grown through the years with the regular addition of more bonds through the Payroll Savings Plan. And to-

BIRCHWOOD: The public damp on the Birchwood Road, (considered by most local residents as a community disgrace and public eyesore) has been permanently closed. This announcement was made to-

day by Clark Rogers, of the main-tenance division of the Anchorage office of the Department of Highways

Mays. According to Rogers, "No dump-ing" signs will be posted at the former dump site, and the State Police instructed to strictly enforce these.

Rogers said that an attempt has been made to clear away the trash which has been dumped along the road shoulder, but that because of the frozen condition of the material this is quite difficult. He said that equipment will continue to work at this, and that in time all of the area will be cleared. Rogers has asked the cooperat-

ion of local residents in helping to enforce the no dumping ordinance by observing violators and taking down the license numbers


down the license numbers of their vehicles and turning these over to local State Troopers. Rogers added that the only place in the Greater Chuglak Area where dumping is legal, is the new Chug-iak Sanitary Fill, located on the south side of the Eagle River Bridge, Thiss fill is under contract to Grasee and Miller, and is open every Saturday and Sunday between the hours of 9am and 5pm. The entrance to the Fill is located on the East side of the Glenn Highway 1 1/10 miles from the bridge. An 1 1/10 miles from the bridge. An attendante will be on duty during the above mentioned hourse to accept dumping fees, and intruct the public where they are to dump. The new Fill is operated under

the supervision of the Chugiak Denefit Association, who secured the land through the efforts of the Chugiak Health Council and the Depart ment of Health. CBA, in turn of-fered the operation of the fill on bid, with the contract being awarded to Grassee and Miller. A percentage of the fees is to be returned to CBA to be used for community health projects.

#### HERE AND THERE

It is somewhat inconceivable that last week passed without mention of the birthday anniversary of one of the greatest of all Americans--Benjamin Franklin.

Born 17 January 1706, Franklin was to attain tremendous success in an array of fields not equaled by

in an array of fields hot equated by any other American, and perhaps not by any one person in the world. Beginning as a printer, he dev-eloped an interest in philosophy and was instrumental in founding the American Philosophical Society. He took ihe initiative in establishing America's first circulating library. His interest in education led him to suggest the establishment of an academy which later became the University of Pennsylvania. His scien-tific activities were such as to bring him worldwide recognization. As an inventor, Franklin left many useful items including the lightning rod, bifocal glasses and the Frank-lin stove.

Although Franklin did not originally espouse a United States separated from Britian, he, in the course of time and events, recognized those circumstances which precluded the position of the colonies being bonded to either the crown or Parliment. He then labored for independence, helping prepare the colonies for war, assisting (in a committee of five) to write the Declaration of Independence, securing France as an

dependence, securing France as an ally. After independence, Franklin re-mained in France for two years as something of a goodwill ambassador, acquainting Europe with our instit-utions and American positions. Re-turning to the States in 1785, although becoming aged and informed, he con-tinued to serve the new nation. His presence at the 1787 Constitutional Convention was perhaps an essential Convention was perhaps an essential factor in the success of the meeting. Ben Franklin died 17 April 1790. The nation and the world mourned the passing of a great man.

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





This coming Wednesday the Arc-turus Junior High team will play Chugiak's Junior High Team at Chuglak.







Included in their plans is a conference with representatives of the Bureau of Reclaimation to determine their plans for repairs to the Eklytna Hydroelectric Plant, and the subsequent effect on local power use.

When they have completed their business in Washington, Johnson and likstedt will fly to Miami Florida, where they will represent the Matanuska Electric Association at the national REA Convention. This begins Sunday, January 24th, and last through the following Wednesday. They will return the next Thursday to Alaska.


