FIRELAKE HOME BURNS TO GROUND

COMMUNITY COLLEGE MAY CANCEL LOCAL COURSES

BIRCHWOOD: The Anchorage Community College may cancel the four courses which were scheduled to be held at Chugiak High School this semester.

The reason for this according to Frank Cline, Chugiak High School Principal, is the lack of sufficient students registering for the courses.

Cline said that a minimum of fifteen students is required for each of the classes before such class can be offered. According to Cline the registration for the four courses was for German, 2 students, typing 8 students, bookkeeping 4 students and woodworking and furniture making 2 students.

Cline said that he was very disappointed, in view of the number who had expressed interest in the above courses in the recent survey.

Cline added that he has persuaded the Community College to extend the registration period for one more day, in hopes that enough students would register for at least one of these courses to justify the Community College sending an instructor here. He said that if there isn't sufficient interest shown to have at least one course at this time, it may be difficult to persuade the Community College to ever again offer any courses here.

Registration will be held on Wednesday, January 27th, at the high school beginning at 6:00pm. Cline said that he hoped some of the students who expressed such great interest at the time of the survey will follow through by enrolling in one or more of these courses.

MOTHERS MARCH THIS WEEKEND

CHUGIAK: The annual Mothers March of Dimes will take place this weekend in the Greater Chugiak Area.

Some of the marching mothers will call on local residents on Saturday afternoon, with the majority of the marchers coming around on Sunday.

FIRE LAKE: On Monday, January 25th, the Eagle River Volunteer Fire Company received a call from the Ralph Anderson Resturant at mile 18 reporting a large column of smoke in the Upper Fire Lake Area. A truck and crew were dispatched to the scene, and discovered the residence of R.E. Boehm engulfed in flames.

Mr. Boehm was occupied working in his shop separate from the house, accompanied by a pre-school daughter when the fire broke out. Other members of the Boehm family were not at home at the time.

The fire is believed to have started from a wood stove. Fire from the chimney ignited kindling behind the stove was one possible conclusion reached by Fire Chief Take after questioning Boehm.

The Boehm residence was of frame construction, and located a considerable distance beyond and above the end of the Fish Hatchery Road. The trail to the house was inaccessible to the Fire equipment, and the fire was raging beyond control of portable equipment by the time the Fire Company arrived.

The building was partially covered by insurance.

The Boehms are reported to be temporarily staying with the Lawrence Earles family. There are six children in the Boehm family.

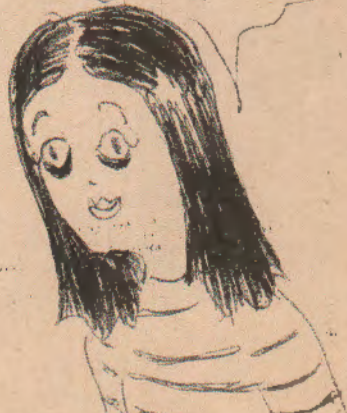

SPORTS REVIEW

The Mustangs tangled with their two Anchorage rivals last Thursday and Friday. In the game at East on Friday, the East Varsity led the Mustangs 28-0 at the end of the first quarter. Through the second quarter, the Mustangs still only able to cop 6 points in the next quarter, ended the halftime with East ahead 44-12. In the next two quarters, the Thunderbirds outscored the Mustangs 21-12 and 25-10 for a 34-36 final tally. High scoring Mustangs were Lester Stephens with 11, Bill Mielke with 9 and James Smith with 6.

In the Junior Varsity game preceding it, the game was much the same. The JayVee T-Birds snatched 5-9 first quarter lead. The T-Birds ended the half by outscoring the Mustangs by 15 points, 18-35. The Mustangs paced on while East outscored them in the next two quarters 8-21 and 4-33 for a final 128-83 decision.

High scorers for the JayVee Mustangs were Steve Brooks with 10, Bob Mielke with 6, Howard Ness and Danny Werre for 3 and Dan Bush and Harvey Pullen with 2.

On Saturday night, the Mustangs played the West Anchorage Eagles.

The Eagles copped a 7-17 first quarter margin. In the beginning of the second quarter, the Mustangs were doing well against the Eagles, but the Eagles "took-off" to outscore the Mustangs 7-19 for a 14-36 halftime margin. The Mustangs went on to be out-scored in the last two quarters 8-19 and 8-18 for 30-73 Mustang loss. High scoring Mustangs were Lester Stephens with 6, Alan Phillips, Sam Wintersteen and James Smith with 5, and Louis Doores and Bill Mielke for 4.

The JayVee game was just like the one the night before, the Eagles

taking a 5-18 first quarter lead. Not being able to stay with the Eagles, they ended the half, 10-39. The Eagles scored on for two quarters to beat the Mustangs, 22-67. Eagles

The Junior High Mustangs had their cosiest game against Arcturus (Ft Rich) Jr. High. At the end of the fourth quarter, the score was 29-29. In the overtime, the Arcturus team made five free throws and ended the game 29-34. Coach Koon commented that the game was lost for the Mustangs on the free throw line, the Jr. High Mustangs making only 3 of their 21 free throws.

On Wednesday, the 27th of January the Jr. High Mustangs will play the Catholic Jr. High Wolverines at Chugiak.

On Friday the Mustangs and their JayVee will play the Palmer Moose. This should prove to be good with 2 of Palmer's 1st string players not playing and a third playing with an injury.

On Friday its home game for the Mustangs and Saturday its away.

There will be a dance after the home game sponsored by the G.A.A. The Admission will be 50¢.

The girls and boys in the groups on the sides of a big cardboard box which Mr. Lane put pieces of paper.

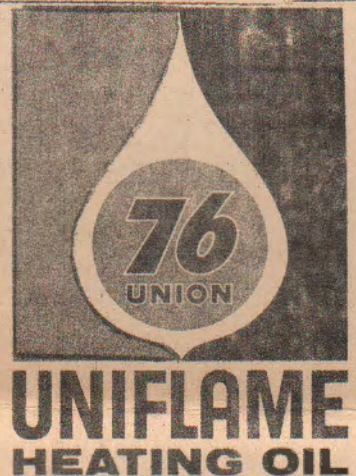
We are also studying about the Greek and Roman empire. We made pictures of Greek soldiers in art.
