

FIRELAKE HOME BURNS TO GROUND

COMMUNITY COLLEGE MAY CANCEL LOCAL COURSES

BIRCHWOOD: The Anchorage Com-munity College may cancel the four courses which were scheduled to be held at Chuglak High School this

The reason for this according to Frank Cline, Chuglak High School Principal, is the lack of sufficient students registering for the courses.

Cline said that a minimum of fifteen students is required for each of the classes before such class can be offered. According to Cline the registration for the four courses was for German 2 students turing was for German, 2 students, typing 8 students, bookeeping 4 students and woodworking and furniture making 2 students.

Cline said that he was very dis-sappointed, in view of the number who had expressed interest in the above courses in the recent survey

Cline added that he has persuaded the Community College to extend the registration period for one more day, in hopes that enough students would register for at least one of these courses to justify the Community College sending an instruct-or here. He said that if there isn't sufficient interest shown to have at least one course at this time, it may be difficult to persuade the Community College to ever again

offer any courses here.
Registration will be held on Wednesday, January 27th, at the high school beginning at 6:00pm. Cline said that he hoped some of the students who expressed such great interest at the time of the survey will follow through by enrolling in one or more of these courses.
